Jones to spotlight Kenya visit in new travelogue

♣ A spectacular trip to Kenya will be the subject of a travelogue by Janet Jones at 7 p.m. Thursday, January 29 at the Asheboro library.


Jones's picture-filled talk, sponsored by the Friends of the Library, is free and the public is invited.

Jones and her husband David. director of the North Carolina Zoological Park, took a Zoo Society group to the African country from August 28 to September 9.

"We landed in Nairobi and took in some of the sights before setting off to Lewa Downs, a private wildlife sanctuary in northern Kenya," Jones says. "The landscape was beautiful and alive with all sorts of African animals and birds and we even had a chance to ride a camel through the bush.

"We explored Lake Nakuru National Park, famous for the thousands of flamingos that edge the lake, giving it an amazing pink color. We journeyed on towards Lake Naivasha, staying at a ranch built during WWII with beautiful gardens sloping down to the water. Taking a boat out gave wonderful views of pelicans and hippo.

"Our last destination was the

Maasai Mara in southern Kenya where we saw part of the wildebeest migration and had the opportunity to take a balloon ride over the Serengeti plains and the Mara river. The grasslands are home to lion, cheetah, elephant and vast herds of buffalo, among many other animals."

Library projects win state awards

♣Three times a year the North Carolina Public Library Directors Association (NCPLDA) meets in a not-so-exotic location.

Plans for requesting state funding are formulated, ideas are exchanged and, in December, awards are given. This year, the library is recipient of two awards for medium sized libraries (budgets of \$1 million to \$2.49 million).

Our implementation of LibraryThing for Libraries, initiated by George Taylor and Ross Holt and integrated into the library's catalog in fall 2007, won for Outstanding Service Innovation. The service, available through LibraryThing.com, provides a terrific reader's advisory tool for patrons looking for a book in the library's collection "like the one I just read." Now patrons can check out other readers' reviews and add their own, much like Amazon.com.

The second award, for Outstanding Promotional Project, recognizes the library's email newsletter, a fully webformatted version of this newsletter delivered monthly to subscribers. It also includes links to various library information and offerings.

The e-newsletter, distributed through the web-based service iContact.com, is designed by webmaster Amy Keith Barney. It tracks ongoing events and provides a constant feed of updates, such as upcoming programs, not available to the print subscriber. Anyone can sign up to receive the e-newsletter

and alerts at www.randolphlibrary.org.

The NCPLDA enables the state's 75 public library directors "to share professional knowledge and experience for the good of all members, to serve as advocates for public libraries with the state legislature, to give voice to the aspirations of the public library community, and to serve as the primary liaison between the state library agency and the public libraries."

Among the other business discussed at the December NCPLDA meeting was State Aid, a fund begun in 1941 to help local governments offset the cost of operating a public library, and to equalize library service across the state. The fund is distributed by a formula that favors smaller, poorer counties but all the public library systems receive state funding. Each year, a recurring amount is distributed according to this formula.

In each legislative session, the NCPLDA seeks increases in the fund to keep pace with inflation. The General Assembly approved \$1 million more in non-recurring funds for this fiscal year, but the fund has been reduced by five percent as per the Governor's request of all state agencies.

On advice from our library advocate in Raleigh, Theresa Kostrzewa, NCPLDA will wait until January to assess requesting a possible increase in State Aid for fiscal year 2009-10. State budget shortfalls are expected to be serious. We may be lucky to hang on to what we have!



Writers who wish to participate can call the library at 318-6814 to sign up. Any resident or native of Randolph County who has published a book can participate.

"Published" means commerciallyprinted, mass-produced book, whether self-published or released through a selective publishing company. Authors of hand-crafted or limited edition books



also are eligible.

Each author will be provided with a table and chairs in the library's Reading Room. The Friends will promote the event, invite the public and provide publicity.

Last year's event

drew 15 local writers to what has become an ongoing part of the library's annual recognition of local authors. From Mary Elizabeth Auman Adams to Ed Yowell, and from the 1700s through the present, the library maintains a list of Randolph writers and their works that now includes more than 160 names; it is available at ww.randolphlibrary.org/ randolphroom.htm.

The Library also presents a display each January that includes photographs of as many of the authors as possible along with as many books as possible (though some books can be found only in the Randolph Room).
