A recipe for success

★ The new Teen Corner of the Asheboro Public Library is set to open formally on Saturday, February 24.

Music, dance and food will set a welcome tone for teens to check out the expanded area. Somewhere between the joy of reading as a child and the comfort and diversion lent by adult reading, teens are lost to the library. All over the U.S., libraries are reaching out to this underserved population. Thanks to the perfect collaboration of several organizations, the library has a bold new look and mission to do just that!

Funds from an LSTA grant, administered by the State Library of North Carolina purchased marketing tools such as the new teen library card, a professionally-designed logo, brochures, bookmarks, posters, signholders, and other display items.

The Asheboro Public Library
Foundation Inc. provided \$16,500 to
furnish the area with new armchairs,
computer tables, task chairs, and display
islands. In addition, \$1000 from the
Louise Swaim bequest, administered by
the Foundation, will be used to purchase
music books and DVDs which will draw
teens to the area. Swaim was a member
of the Foundation and a well respected
music teacher in Asheboro until her
death in 1981.

The Friends of the Randolph Public Library provided funding for the painting

and wallpapering of the area. The Friends also are sponsoring Bantum Rooster, popular local band, and a group of Latino dancers, to kick off the celebration on the 24th. The Friends also commissioned a contemporary artwork by local artist Cori Cagle to be placed in the Teen Corner.

The family of Jared Haft Goldstein, a beloved family physician and ardent library user, established an endowment fund with the library in 1995 following his death. Monies from that account will be used to purchase a set of health reference books appropriate for teens. Goldstein was well known in Randolph County for his caring relationships with patients.

Thanks and kudos go to the committee members involved in the writing and management of the LSTA grant: Amy Keith, George Taylor, Ross Holt, Ann McGlohon, Arlene Smith, Lindsay Shore-Wright and Kari Baumann. A special thank you goes out to Missy Rankin, a member of the Foundation and the Friends, who lent her considerable expertise and time to the selection of colors and fabrics for the Teen Corner furnishings. Missy is a longtime supporter of the library who is always willing to lend a hand!

Join us on February 24th between the hours of 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. for music, dancing, food and fun! In a library, no less.

In the book, Cole and Foley use photographs, maps, military records, letters, first-hand accounts and even poetry to help bring the Englishman's career to life, both in war and peace.

Cole is a librarian at the Greensboro Public Library and is an archivist at the Guilford College Hege Library. He is the author of The Forest City Lynching of 1900 (2003) and other articles on Southern history.

Foley is a reference and technical services librarian at the Randolph County Public Library and is editor of The Guilford Genealogist. He recently received an Excellence in Publishing Award from the North Carolina Genealogical Society.
