# Charlesanna Fox: portrait of a librarian

♣ A portrait of Charlesanna Louise Fox, director of the Randolph County Public Library from 1949-1977, now hangs in the upstairs foyer of the Asheboro library, on public display.

The portrait was presented to the library by the Asheboro Public Library Foundation, Inc., the organization whose members originally founded the Asheboro Library in 1936. Formed in 1935 from a civic-minded bridge club to "procure, erect, build,

establish, maintain, conduct and operate one or more public libraries" in Asheboro, this organization continues to benefit the library by managing donations and bequests for library improvement.

Charlesanna Fox has so many accolades to her credit that it is difficult to include all of them here. A native of Asheboro, she began her working life as a teacher in Maxton. Following jobs in Washington, D.C., Winston-Salem and Knoxville, Charlesanna served her country and profession in a civilian capacity at Camp Lejeune and Pearl Harbor during WW II. She returned to Asheboro in 1949 as County Library

Director on a mission to preserve the history of Randolph County and to serve those most in need of library services. During her tenure, the modern, sevenlibrary system now in place was funded and implemented. She is fond of saving that she moved libraries for a living. The Randolph Room was established as an archive of Randolph County history and genealogy. Bookmobile service was extended to all corners of the county. Her dedication to adult education led her 1. Collect and organize information for to establish workshops in the library for storytellers and childcare personnel working in Randolph County.

She was president of the North Carolina Library Association from 1953 to 1955 and presided over the first integrated biennial conference of library personnel in the state. She was the first county chairman of the Council on Aging, a United Way volunteer, an active board member of the Randolph County Historical Society, president of both the North Carolina and the Southeastern Adult Education Associations, receiving the first annual Grumman Award for outstanding North Carolina adult educator. She received the Alumni Service Award from UNCG, "Woman of the Month" from the county Council on the Status of Women and "Citizen of the Year" in 1999 from the Asheboro/ Randolph Chamber of Commerce.

Charlesanna Fox is the consummate librarian, a public servant of the highest order, a keeper of the knowledge and

history of the community. She has devoted herself to the service of Randolph County, a job she continues to this day as she compiles memoirs and history of local institutions.

In 1963, she, along with the Randolph County Library Board of Trustees, formulated a set of objectives for the library. Though library service has changed in dramatic ways, these seven objectives still ring true. In brief, they

- the communication of ideas to promote an enlightened citizenship and enrich personal lives;
- 2. Serve as a reliable source of information;
- 3. To provide a place where inquiring minds may encounter the original, sometimes unorthodox and critical ideas so necessary as correctives and stimulants in a society that depends for its survival on free competition of ideas;
- 4. Support educational, civic and cultural activities and organizations;
- 5. Provide opportunity and encouragement for all segments of the population to educate themselves continuously:
- 6. Seek always to identify and meet community needs; and
- 7. Provide opportunity for recreation through use of literature, music, film and arts.

We continue to be inspired by these ideals. Congratulations, Charlesanna!
