# Kids opt for library in summer

School is out, and everyone is somehow affected when school is not in session. People plan vacations: around here, that's easy to do as the coast and the mountains are only a few hours away. Even though it is sometimes quite hot and humid, one can still find some shade and possibly a breeze. It's no wonder that book publishers plan some of their more anticipated releases for the summer.

The staff of the seven public libraries in Randolph County, however, do not slow down! If anything, they are in high gear. The Summer Reading Program for children is a countywide effort that is planned for an entire year. We aim to have a good diversity of programs and events, and the creativity of this staff never fails in that regard.

I find it both amazing and rewarding that so many children participate. Coming to your local public library requires a bit of planning ahead and a small commitment. There is much competing for children's attention these days: television, electronic games, sports, the swimming pool, outdoor games. It would be easy for parent and child to opt for the more "flashy" endeavors. But they still come to the Summer Reading Program!

The Liberty Public Library's first day of events saw 267 children attend.

Ramseur had 140 children. The numbers were just as impressive at all the libraries. In many cases, it was not even "standing room only." There was no room!

And yes, they love to check out books. We can accommodate the younger set's reading needs better this summer. The Randolph County Public Library received a \$100,000 grant from the Randolph County Partnership for Children (Smart Start) and the vast majority of these books are now on the shelves for children to enjoy. How many books can you buy for \$100,000 when you factor in the library discount? I will give you a scientific answer: truckloads! And they are leaving the library by armloads.

This response to the Summer Reading Program would not be possible without the planning and preparation of the staff, and the skill and talent they possess in their fields. The books purchased by the grant would not be on the shelves without the organization and simple determination to do so by the staff. They meet important deadlines regularly and cooperate with each other, each department and each library in order to provide good service to our citizens.

Right now, many of those citizens being served are quite young, but they seem to really enjoy the results of the planning and hard work.
