

## Snake Man returns with 15-foot Penelope, more

## **♣** They're not on a plane — they're... in the library!

Or will be, when Ron Cromer, The Snake Man, brings back Penelope the Python and a raft of other reptiles. "Snakes Alive," one of the most popular — and loudest — library programs, will take place at 7 p.m. Thursday, July 27, at the Asheboro library.

It's the grand finale to the Summer Reading Program, which this year focuses pets and is entitled "Paws, Claws, Scales and Tales." The program, sponsored by the Friends of the Library, is free and the public is invited.

In addition to his pet python, Cromer will bring along tamed, harmless reptiles such as box turtles and

a blue tongue skink, and of course snakes — some two dozen including king snakes, rat snakes, corn snakes, hognose snakes, garter snakes and water snakes.

Cromer, a herpetologist, spends about half of his programs focusing on the lives, habits and characteristics of reptiles, hoping to replace fear — especially of snakes — with understanding of and a healthy respect for the creatures. The rest of the presentation is hands-on, and participants have the opportunity to get up close and personal with Cromer's slithery friends.

A "snake free zone" will be provided for anyone who wants to get not so close and less personal.

## Grant buys caregiver books

♣ During May and June, the library will be displaying books designed to support the many caregivers in the county.

The acquisition of 23 books was made possible with a generous grant of \$300 from the North Carolina Family Caregivers Support Group. The grant was presented by the Rev. John Butler, program developer for the Randolph County Senior Adult Association, in May — designated annually since 1963 as "Older Americans Month."

Caregiver's Survival Guide by Kay Strom, Elder Rage by Jacqueline Marcell and Thou Shalt Honor: The Caregiver's Companion by Beth McLeod long-term care services in the U.S. and are just a few of the many titles available on the subject of caregiving, the "simple" act which has become an increasingly complex and challenging task.

Titles were selected by Charlotte Routh and Betty Bunting of the library's Extension Services Department, which provides regular delivery of library materials to the homebound, nursing homes and childcare centers. Betty has been nominated to serve on the Randolph County Aging Services Committee advisory board. Charlotte currently serves on both the Head Start and Randolph County Partnership for Children advisory boards.

All of us will most likely be caregivers at some time in our lives. It is www.dhhs.state.nc.us/aging.




