\$100,000 Smart Start grant to fund childrens' materials

♣ There is good news for young children, their parents and their teachers in Randolph County.

The Randolph County Partnership for Children (RCPC) — Smart Start — has awarded the Randolph County Public Library a grant of \$100,000 for the purchase of books and audiovisual material for children ages 0-5.

The RCPC realizes that the best method to get books in the hands of young children and their parents is to use the public library system. Randolph County is large geographically with its population spread all over. The seven public libraries make a library accessible for the vast majority of residents.

This unique grant also allows us to purchase books for parents and teachers of young children, an important aspect. We also will make available materials for children with special needs.

Our plan is to purchase eight copies of each title: one for each of the seven libraries and Extension Services. Extension Services visits day cares and the homebound throughout the county.

It was exactly five years ago that RCPC awarded the library a similar grant. We have tracked usage of the books and other material over the years and they have been well used by our citizens. Books for this age group are very popular.

The overall purpose of this grant, RCPC and our own children's services is simply to instill in children a love of reading. It has been proven over and over that a child who is introduced to reading at an early age is better prepared for school and life. Reading is basic and needs to be introduced early for children to develop the skills to see them through life.

The entire staff of the Randolph County Public Library is excited and pleased about this grant and the positive impact it will have on young children and their families in our county. The RCPC knows how to reach young readers and by making this grant available has fulfilled a major objective.

Look for the new materials beginning in late April.

Farlow to debut second novel; shares stage with humorists

Brouhaha, brimming with humor, suspense and a cast of deranged yet loveable characters, is one rollicking good read."

> > > Now a professor in the Cornell University English department, Morgan wrote his first story when he was in sixth grade. At N.C. State University, he intended to focus on mathematics, but that changed when he took a writing class with Guy Owen.

"He encouraged me to write stories and poems about the place and people where I had grown up," Morgan says. "One day he brought one of my stories to class, an account of visiting a great-grandmother in an old house in the mountains, and announced he had wept when he read


Sponsored by First Bank's North Asheboro branch, the concert is free and the public is invited.
