# **Property buy clears front of library for parking;** Friends bookshop to reopen downtown in May

♣ Visitors to the Asheboro library will have easier access, closer parking and an unobstructed view of the building's facade following the City of Asheboro's purchase of property at 146 N. Cox Street from the estate of Nettie White.

In a joint effort by the city and Randolph County, the former residence, along with the house next door now occupied by the Friends Book Store, will be demolished and a new approach to the library developed.

Parking will extend to the county-owned lot at the intersection of Cox and Salisbury streets. Landscaped areas near the library will provide closer handicapped parking, better traffic flow, two-way travel via the Cox Street driveway and easier reach for book drops.

Green areas will include benches and water fountains, and the flagpole will be moved into the new area in front of the library.

The Friends will hold the final book sale in the Cox Street house on March 29 and reopen in May with expanded hours at 226 Sunset Ave., a city-owned building near the Sunset Theatre (see the accompanying story and From the Director, page 2, for more about the book sale).

The property acquisition in essence completes the 1994 expansion of the library, which required the front of the building face the interior of the block. Previously, 152 N. Cox Street. The newly-minted Friends of the it had fronted Worth Street.

The closeness of the neighboring property left room only for a one-way driveway into the parking lot from Cox Street, no convenient place for library book drops and an awkward traffic pattern both for vehicles and pedestrians.

Work is expected to begin in April.

# Book store to move to Sunset Avenue after March 29 sale

After the grand opening, the bookshop will be open 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 9 a.m.-3 p.m. on the last Saturday of each month.

The new hours coincide with those of the Asheboro Farmers Market. located around the corner on Church Street. No book sale will be held in April as the bookshop building is renovated.

The sales, held monthly since 1996 and annually before that, feature books, videos and like items given as gifts to the library that the library cannot use, and items withdrawn from the library collection. The sales always draw crowds, and all proceeds go to the library's book budget.

The first sale in the current location, the former Whitley House, was held on September 26, 1992, and lasted six days. Previous sales were held at Randolph Mall's Center Court and in the meeting room of the library.

"It's the end of an era, really," says Janet Jones, co-chair of the Friends Book Sale committee. "We've enjoyed
