



Book sale to open in **'Friends Bookshop'**

♣ The shelves will be stocked, the volunteers ready, and the Friends of the Library Bookshop will open for business at 10 a.m. Thursday, May 29, in its new digs at 226 Sunset Avenue in downtown Asheboro.



A ribbon cutting and open house featuring local dignitaries will take place at 2 p.m. Tuesday, May 27.

Regular hours from May 29 onward will be 10-2 Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 9-3 on the last Saturday of each month.

All proceeds from the bookshop go to supplement the Asheboro library's book budget. The shop is stocked with books, videos and other items withdrawn from the library collection — but also, Friends Book Sale Committee Chair Janet Jones points out, donations that include many new books.

"We have lots of fantastic books — drop in and see them," Jones says.

During March and April, the Friends, with help from library staff, community volunteers, the Randolph County Maintenance Department and trustees from the Randolph County Jail, packed and moved from the Cox Street residence that has housed the sale since 1992.

The residence and the house beside it will be removed to make way for a redesigned approach to the library that will ease access, enhance parking and feature green areas.

Franklinville gets \$20K library gift

The John W. Clark Library in Franklinville received a major boost in fundraising efforts for a new library building in February.

The library board received a check for \$20,000 from an anonymous donor to add to the \$32,000 already in

the coffers from various fundraising efforts over the past few years. Those efforts include book and craft sales, yard sales, bake sales, a thrift shop and most recently, sales from a cookbook. Recipes, Remembrances and Recollections, published in June of 2007, is a collection of recipes and historical information from the Franklinville area, complete with original sketches of historical structures from local artist Louis Brady. It is available from the library for \$20.

The John W. Clark Library began in 1924 and is the oldest public library in Randolph County. It started as the company library for Randolph Mills whose president, John W. Clark, decided his employees and the citizens of Franklinville needed a public library for their informational and reading needs. In 1963, the library moved to the second floor of Town Hall where it is currently located. In 1969, the library was enlarged, remodeled and named

> the John W. Clark Public Library following Clark's death that year. The library also houses the Parents as Teachers offices for Franklinville and Ramseur, thanks to the generosity of the Town of Franklinville and the library.

> Though the staff gladly offers "curb service" as needed, the second story location of the library poses an obvious problem for many patrons. An elevator was considered but the cost was prohibitive. Plans to move the library to a nearby location have begun but funding is needed to set the plan in motion. Lydia Craven, library board president, told the Franklinville Town Commissioners during their monthly meeting in March that "money's out there, but we've just got to find it."
