# Busted!

## Collection agency to pursue chronic overdue scofflaws

Beginning in December, the library will turn over to a collection agency the accounts of borrowers with fees for lost material or fines for long-term overdues.

The stepped-up pursuit of tardy material is due to losses suffered by the library — and taxpayers which amounted to \$6,000 in the first three months of this fiscal year alone. Often, material that is checked out and not returned is among the most in-demand.

Currently, the library tries three times by phone and mail to retrieve overdue material, with a final notice mailed at 60 days. The final notice includes a letter from the Randolph County attorney alerting borrowers that they may be subject to legal action.

Under the new arrangement, the library will try for 45 days to prompt return of overdue material or payment of outstanding overdue fines. At 45 days, the library will bill the borrower for the cost of the material or the outstanding fines.

If at 60 days the material remains unreturned or the lost fee remains unpaid, or overdue fines remain unpaid, the library will send the borrower's account to Unique Management Inc., an Indiana-based collection agency that specializes in library retrievals. Unique Management will make further attempts by phone and mail to reclaim the material, fees or fines, ultimately credit reporting borrowers who do not respond.

The collection agency will not handle financial transactions - borrowers will clear up their accounts directly with the library.

Only accounts with fees or fines in excess of \$25 at 60 days will be turned over to the collection agency.

## Historical house occupied library site

✤ The Randolph Public Library location at 201 Worth Street is the site of the former Worth– McAlister house, a Greek Revival

#### structure built by Dr. John Milton Worth and his wife Sarah Dicks Worth around 1855 and demolished in 1958.

For 100 years, the Worth-McAlister house was home to some noteworthy citizens who made contributions to Asheboro and Randolph County as well as to the state of North Carolina.

Worth moved to Asheboro after serving two terms in the state legislature from Montgomery County. He came to join his brother, Jonathan Worth, Governor of North Carolina from 1865-1868, in various business ventures. Dr. Worth was appointed salt commissioner during the war years, in charge of securing and rationing salt, a precious commodity at the time. After the war, he served several terms in the legislature, and was elected state treasurer for two terms. He was instrumental in construction of the Plank Road, building the Asheboro section. He founded Worth Maufacturing Company in Worthville and had a major interest in



Deep River textile mills.

After construction of the original home in 1855, a one story wing was added around 1870. In 1890, Worth's business partner

Colonel Alexander Carey McAlister and his wife, Adelaide Cornelia Worth McAlister, Worth's daughter, added an Eastlake-style porch and a polygonalbay dining room. The entrance hall, parlor and music room were enhanced with walnut wainscoting. Garlands of flowers, centered around a plaster rosette which held a brass chandelier, adorned the entrance ceiling. A most interesting feature of the house was a secret staircase, accessed through a wardrobe, which McAlister, according to local tradition, used to escape the Yankees during the Civil War.

McAlister succeeded Col. William L. Sanders in command of the 26<sup>th</sup> North Carolina Regiment of the Confederate army after attaining the rank of lieutenant colonel in the 46<sup>th</sup> Regiment, NC Infantry, in the Army of Virginia. He was acclaimed for his "cool courage under fire." Later in life, he was chairman of the Randolph Democratic Party for 25 years, chairman of the Randolph County Board of Education, and one of the

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# **New Seagrove library draws crowds**

A dramatic increase in use of the Seagrove **Public Library has** borne out the need for the new library building that opened a year ago.

Statistics from the fiscal vear that ended June 30 show a 77 percent increase in the number of visits to increase in the number of items checked out

compared to the previous year, the library's last in the cinderblock Seagrove Grange building that housed it for 30 vears.

The number of people who obtained library cards jumped by almost 20 percent over the previous year, and requests for reference assistance skyrocketed 76 percent.

The figures compare to a 2.4 percent increase in visits for the Randolph County Public Library system overall, a 2 percent decrease in the number of items checked out and a

seven percent increase in the number of library cards issued.

The Randolph County Board of Commissioners provided \$750,000 for construction of the new building on land donated by the Randolph County Schools. Seagrove area donors and other library supporters funded furnishings and enhancements.

The 5,000 square-foot facility was an expanded version of the Archdale Public Library as built in 1992. The City of Archdale donated the blueprint, and architect Dean Spinks donated the site plan.

original trustees of State Normal College. One of the McAlister sons, Alexander, was instrumental in founding Pilot Life Insurance Company, developing Irving Park and Sedgefield country clubs in Greensboro. Their daughter, May, was a charter member of Randolph Book Club, Asheboro's first General of the NC Home Guard and such organization.
