ALA seeks library stimulus package

★ The American Library Association (ALA) is asking the federal government for stimulus funding.

Libraries across the nation are facing critical cutbacks as local funding declines due to decreased revenues. The proposed stimulus funding would assist libraries in maintaining critical services to working families such as job searches, small business development, financial literacy and other vital assistance in these tough economic times.

Many libraries are cutting hours, personnel and services due to lost revenue. Some branches are being forced to close, causing patrons to drive further for services or do without completely.

ALA President Jim Rettig notes that 73 percent of libraries nationwide provide the only free Internet access in their communities. In rural areas that number rises to 83 percent according to a 2008 report on public library funding and technology access. Libraries reported double digit growth in computer use this past fiscal year including Internet and word processing.

Funds are being requested to: expand employment activities like resume assistance and job searching; reinstate lost hours or supplement evening hours for better patron access; promote financial literacy and business development services; and acquire additional resources for economic services being requested by patrons.

Now the good news: Randolph County is financially sound thanks to good leadership at the county and city level. No library services or hours are threatened. Computer use is up substantially. Patrons are checking email, applying for jobs, taking online classes, developing resumes, and more. Some users have reported dropping their local Internet service for financial reasons.

At this time, and thanks in part to a new round of Gates Grants, public libraries in Randolph County are planning to add more Internet stations in order to give patrons better access to those services. Look for more about that later.

The price tag for the ALA stimulus package: \$100 million. But, according to economic studies, once the multiplier effect is figured, for every dollar invested in the public library, the community receives a return of from "7 to 11 times the initial investment" says Joe Matthews, an internationally recognized expert on library management.

That return includes wages paid to staff, construction costs, library purchases, etc. But it also includes enhanced services to job seekers, students and small business developers which in turn pump dollars back into the community.

How could Uncle Sam reject this win/ win deal?

A magical train ride will take kids worldwide
