♣ Helping people by helping their working animals was the focus of Janet and David Jones's recent trip to Egypt.

But the pair also had the opportunity to visit the country's monuments and engineering feats, from the Sphinx to the Aswan High Dam.


"A Journey through Egypt" will be the topic of a travelogue by Janet Jones at 7 p.m. Thursday, January 28, at the Asheboro library. The program is free and the public is invited.

David Jones, director of the North Carolina Zoological Park, has been associated for many years with the Brooke Hospital for Animals. The charity sees to the health of working equines mostly donkeys and horses — thereby helping some of the neediest people in the world.

The hospital's 75th anniversary in the land where it was founded was the purpose of the Jones's visit.

"We had a fascinating trip using the mornings to visit local clinics and go out with the mobile clinics to the villages, to treat donkeys and some horses, and then visiting ancient monuments and temples in the afternoons," Janet Jones says.

"We started our trip to Egypt in the south at Aswan where we visited the temple of Philae, sailed in a felucca on

the Nile and also saw the High Dam and the unfinished obelisk. We moved north visiting the temples around Luxor where there are many magnificent temples that impress with their sheer size, the skill of the carving and the engineering involved in erecting them.

"We then flew to Cairo which is a

ALA president visits NC library directors

♣ Camila Alire, recently elected president of the American Library Association, spoke at the North Carolina Public Library Directors semiannual meeting in early December.

She comes highly recommended to the position. She is currently Dean Emerita at the University of New Mexico and Colorado State University. She has been director of many types of libraries including college, community college, special and school libraries.

She has been widely recognized for her role in library advocacy. She has presented workshops all across the United States on library advocacy, serving the Latino community and other timely topics. Named by *Hispanic Business Magazine* as one of the 100 most influential Hispanics in the country, Camila was named REFORMA's Librarian of the Year in 1997. REFORMA is the national association whose mission is to "promote library and informational service to Latinos and the Spanish speaking." The organization is an affiliate of the ALA.

Camila charged that the ALA is facing a "new norm" in the wake of the financial crisis and that libraries will have to fight for funding like never before. However, she strongly believes that libraries are in a unique and "nimble" position to adapt to and meet the needs of the community, regardless of what those needs are. The library plays an essential role in the life of a

community, just as vital as that of the police force and the fire department. Statistics show that two thirds of adults in the United States have a library card. Folks may use their library card every day to access services and information, while they may call on other essential services like the fire and police departments much less frequently.

The two initiatives Camila will be focusing on during her tenure will be advocacy and literacy. Advocacy because librarians can always use help articulating their library's value to the powers that be. The Literacy Initiative will be a focus because there are so many forms of literacy. Adult and family literacy is what most people associate with "literacy" but there is also information literacy, digital literacy, economic literacy and cultural literacy. All are issues that libraries can play a key role in solving. She has formed a Leadership Workgroup to identify audiences and establish goals for the two initiatives in order to address these challenges.

With Camila Alire at the helm of ALA, libraries have a capable and dynamic leader. We were fortunate to have her in Winston-Salem for not one, but two, sessions. Kudos to president of NCPLDA Mark Pumphrey, director of the Polk County Public Library, and Camila's friend and able "handler," Jackie Beach, Director of the Craven-Pamlico-Carteret Regional Library, for snaring her!

large bustling modern city contrasting with the ancient pyramids and sphinx which are in the suburbs on the edge of the desert, a truly memorable sight especially as you get close to them. kilns to unload bricks ready for baking.


