Marine in Iraq in 2003, and shape them into Cpl Cox, a memoir about his experiences.

Cox will talk about his book and his time in Iraq at a Friends of the Library program, 7 p.m. Thursday, February 18, at the Asheboro Public Library. The program is free and the public is invited.

### This department gets high marks

At a recent County
Commissioners Meeting,
Randolph County was
recognized by the
Government Finance
Officers Association
(GFOA) with a
Distinguished Budget
Award for the sixth
consecutive year.

This awards program was established to recognize state and local governments

for presenting budget documents of the highest quality that reflect the guidelines provided by the National Advisory Council on State and Local Budgeting as well as the GFOA's best practices. County Finance Officer Will Massie credits each county department's compliance with established budget practices for making this award possible.

The Business Office at the library, headed by Linda Shirley for 29 years, has a history of excellence in budgeting. Linda, Mae Auman and Donna Brown coordinate their efforts to find the best price and most economical solution to every need.

County Manager Richard Wells says, "The library's business office is operated with great efficiency, planning and care. The budget process for the library is quite complex: county, federal and seven municipalities are part of the budget, along

Meeting the requirements of all these entities is quite a task.

Deadlines are always met. It is a professionally operated office that can serve as an example for any library system."

Linda prepares the library budget for Randolph County and Asheboro, the budgets for Archdale and Seagrove Libraries, as well as the budget for the Parents as Teachers program and Raising a Reader programs funded through the Randolph County Partnership

for Children (RCPC). She compiles annual reports required by the county, the State Library, RCPC and reports required for federal or Gates Foundation grants. She also maintains the personnel files and completes the Performance Measurement report.

Mae maintains library inventory, prepares statistics, keeps the libraries in supplies, maintains the memorial file, updates directories, prepares book billing for the libraries while cheerfully greeting visitors to the Business Office.

Donna handles overdue accounts, maintains job descriptions, does the weekly bank deposit, and prepares invoices to be entered into the county system. She also prepares the monthly reports for the RCPC programs.

The Business Department truly keeps the library in the pink — or more appropriately-in the black!

### **State of North Carolina to** libraries: "No tax forms for you!"

♣ In an effort to cut costs and encourage online filing, the North Carolina Department of Revenue (DOR) will not provide tax forms or instruction booklets for distribution through libraries this year.

Anyone with Internet access can download and print forms from the DOR website, www.dor.state.nc.us/downloads/ individual.html.

The library, meanwhile, will provide printouts of the D-400 form at a cost of 20

cents for the four page set (normally, printouts and photocopies at the library are 20 cents per page).

The reduced cost will help accommodate the many patrons who rely on the library for printed forms, while defraying the cost to the library of printing them.

All other state forms can be printed from the library's public computers or by library staff at the regular rate of 20 cents per page.


The libraries do have basic federal tax forms and instruction books to give away.

While *Cpl Cox* details Cox's experiences in the Marine Corps and in the war, it also depicts his personal struggle to come to terms with where he was and family and friends he left behind, especially his girlfriend, who he met shortly before deploying. It also sheds light on the challenges faced by members of the U.S. Armed Services worldwide, and their loved ones.

Now a Realtor in Charlotte. Cox also has opened his own publishing company and has begun work on a second memoir focusing on his difficult readjustment after returning home.


