'She Named Me Bruce' Bruce Anne Shook documents parents' WWII romance through their letters

✤ Shortly after her mother's death, Bruce Anne (Brucie) Shook discovered World War II letters between her mother in the U.S. and her fighter pilot father in Europe.

The letters tell the story of the couple's romance through 1944, when Shook's father died in a plane crash in France. She has compiled the letters in an book entitled *She*

Named Me Bruce: A Daughter's Discovery of Her Parents' World War II Romance, published in August.

Shook will talk about the letters between her father, Bruce Parcell —for whom she is named— and her mother, Frances, in a Friends of the Library program at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, November 8, at the Asheboro library.

Her appearance is free and the public is invited.

Shook was born in Statesville two months after the death of her father. She

grew up to be a junior high school English and history teacher before becoming a school library media specialist, a position from which she retired in 2005.

She now resides in Greensboro.

My sole desire now is to see the end of this war and return to you... Nothing can ever change my love for you... I love you darling, now and always.

—Bruce's letter to Frances from England, April 28, 1944

Already, NC LIVE offers 84 research databases, 194,536 ebooks, 22,186 full-text magazines and journals (with millions of individual articles), 36,610 streaming videos, • EBSCO Biography Reference Center — a and much more.

Funded by the General Assembly, NC LIVE is available to anyone with a public library card or student/faculty/staff ID in the • EBSCO NoveList Plus, a readeruniversity system, community colleges, and the state's independent/private colleges.

Resource subscriptions are re-evaluated every three years. With a selection cycle just • The Gale Testing & Education Reference completed, new resources will come online in January, with some already accessible. Most existing resources will remain even as new ones are added.

New resources available now include:

- The Historic North Carolina Digital **Newspaper Collection** — the North Carolina chunk of Newspapers.com, a boon for history/genealogy researchers;
- SIRS Discoverer articles, books, images, activities and websites curated for elementary/middle school students;
- ProQuest eLibrary Curriculum Edition magazines, journals and digital media designed with middle and high school researchers in mind;
- ProQuest Research Companion an information literacy resource designed to

guide students through the process of creating research projects and writing term papers.

New resources coming in January:

- Consumer Reports via EBSCO MasterFile the popular collection of product reviews and recommendations;
- Credo Reference a virtual reference collection including encyclopedias, dictionaries, atlases, images, audio files and videos on a wide expanse of subjects;
- comprehensive collection of full-text biographies on popular and heavilyresearched figures;
- recommendation tool that syncs up with the library catalog.

Replacements for existing resources:

- Center, a study center for standardized school and workplace tests, will replace Learning Express Library; and
- Mango Languages replaces Pronunciator as our language learning resource.

Finally, new databases provided by NC LIVE will replace some that we have subscribed to independently:

- EBSCO Automate will replace Chilton's Auto Repair;
- Cypress resume builder will replace ResumeMaker; and
- Fergusons Career Guidance Center will come under the auspices of NC LIVE. Check out all the new sparkle at our research portal, Randquest.org, or directly nclive.org.

The Asheboro library Children's Room has added a 9:30 a.m. storytime on Saturdays. Stories, finger plays, songs and more for children of all ages.


