 ★ The Friends of the Library Bookshop, closed since March due to the pandemic, has reopened from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturdays.


To keep Friends volunteers and customers safe, capacity is limited to six shoppers at one time, and all visitors must wear face coverings.

With a limited number of people allowed in the building, customers are encouraged to make their

selections in a timely fashion.

All visitors must remain six feet from others at all times.

The bookshop also will resume receiving donations of books in good condition. Due to the pandemic, the Friends are limiting donations to two grocery bags of books per donor.

Learn to play ukulele with library's new kits

✤ You too can tiptoe through the tulips just like Tiny Tim with a ukulele kit from the Asheboro library Children's Room.

Each kit includes a ukulele, a tuner, a chord chart and a case, and can be checked out for three weeks at a time. Beginner books also are available for checkout.

When a kit is returned, it is sanitized before the next use. Although the kits were developed with children in mind, they are available for all ages six and up.

To checkout one of the five kits, call the library or look up "ukulele kit" in the library catalog to place one on hold.

Libraries to maintain current level of service for now

Just when you thought it was safe...

♣ In the good ol' days of late September, we were putting the finishing touches on our plans to reopen library buildings to the public.

The number of new COVID-19 cases in the county was trending downward and the percentage of positive test results was low.

We were expecting to open for browsing and checkout, desktop computing and Internet, and, at Asheboro and Archdale, indoor WiFi/study table use.

Our priorities would be to reduce risk to the health and safety of patrons and staff by limiting the number of people in the libraries at any one time and limiting the time people would spend inside.

Because the concept of libraries and library buildings themselves are designed to do none of the above, we had developed a workable, if imperfect, system at each library to accommodate as many people as possible for as long a time as seemed reasonable at the particular library.

You would check in at a welcome station, undergo a no-contact, hand-scan temperature check, be offered a face covering if you were not wearing one, and — if spaces were available — proceed into the library.

From everything we heard from our patrons, you were willing to put up with the complexities to get back to some semblance of normal library use.

Now, for the time being, everything is on hold as COVID-19 cases spike again in Randolph County, and county government is retrenching for the health and safety of the

community. We are as eager to increase access for you as you are to visit us, but we must act in a deliberate and careful fashion.

Here are the services we are currently offering:

- Curbside pick-up of requested items;
- Curbside pick-up of computer printouts, and curbside faxing;
- Telephone reference services;
- Expanded ebook, e-audiobook and emagazine collections;
- Virtual children's and some virtual adult programming;
- Curbside pick-up of activity kits for children;
- Limited in-person outdoor children's activities;
- No-contact delivery and pick-up of materials for Extension Services clients;
- Parents as Teachers virtual home visits;
- Randolph Room researchers by appointment; and
- Parking lot WiFi.

The unusual circumstances also have given our staff the opportunity to innovate — just give a listen to the insightful new "Dave and the Borrowers" podcast, or learn to play ukulele by checking out one of the Children's Room's new kits, to get an idea of the concepts we're putting into practice.

Nevertheless, we long for the time we meet again in person, when, like the song says, "the skies will seem more blue."

★ Charity Neave Johnson, formerly manager of the Liberty Public Library, has been named branch manager of the Seagrove and Franklinville libraries.

Current Liberty children's specialist Brenda Hornsby-Heindl took over as Liberty manager on October 9.

Johnson joined the Liberty library in 2018 after 13 years with the Greensboro Public Library. Previously, both libraries had part-time managers. When both managers departed within a few months of each other, the part -time manager positions were converted into one full-time position.


