from the director

The jujutsu of library buildings

♣ Four years ago, we undertook a strategic facility planning process for the library system.

The idea was to ensure the viability of our buildings for the foreseeable future. Recommendations ranged from outright replacement of some libraries to improvements that would extend the usability of others.

I'm pleased to report that we have made great progress toward many of the plan's recommendations. When I say "we," in this case, I'm referring not just to the libraries but to the local governments that fund us — as well as to our support groups.

One of the main recommendations was a new library for Randleman. Thanks to the city government's commitment, plans were underway when our study was taking place, and the library opened its new facility in 2015. The building hit all the notes that the study recommended for the new library.

The study found the Archdale and Seagrove libraries well-suited for the future, but suggested automatic sliding doors and improved lighting for Archdale. Those problems were solved over this past summer when the City of Archdale funded sliding doors and building-wide replacement of old fluorescent lighting fixtures with LEDs, with some additional lighting to brighten dark areas in the stacks.

The new lighting is expected to reduce energy consumption — and cost — by some 70 percent. New carpet came along with the other work, so the library is fresh, bright, easily accessible and ready for the future.

The Asheboro library was more problematic. Although the 54-year-old building, expanded in 1994, is in good shape, the study saw the need for significant expansion of the Randolph Room and the Children's Room; a larger meeting room and more study rooms; automatic sliding doors; and alterations to the "monumental" circulation and reference desks to make them flexible and inviting.

Obviously we haven't expanded the building — but we have "expanded" the interior by prioritizing our core services and decluttering everything else. Reorganization has made the Randolph Room easier to use and has opened up floor space. Moving our copier/printer has provided an additional (and two-person) study room.

An ongoing project has been to open up space in our Children's Room. Our clever children's librarians, in their quest to refine their services, keep finding ways to accomplish this goal.

Sliding doors, funded in the City of Asheboro's 2018-2019 budget, arrived on Halloween, and LED lighting is on the way. And we're looking at those service desks....

A critical factor at Asheboro has been the Asheboro Public Library Foundation, Inc., whose gifts have leveraged other resources for maximum impact.

There were recommendations for Franklinville, Liberty and Ramseur, too, all under consideration.

Keeping our libraries fresh, inviting and useful involves a kind of jujutsu of space, resources and the changing ways people are using libraries.

LEDs for Asheboro

All light fixtures at the Asheboro library shortly will be replaced with LED lighting, thanks in part to a generous gift by the Asheboro Public Library Foundation, Inc. (APLF). The new lights will replace fluorescent fixtures.

The LED lighting is expected to save thousands of dollars each year in electricity and maintenance costs, reducing the amount of energy used to light the library by 71 percent.

The APLF gift was added to county library money to fund the project, which takes advantage of Duke Energy rebates for the conversion.


