Need tech help? Call the P.R.O.S.!

♣ Need help setting up your device for ebooks, filling out an online application or learning new technology?

Meet virtually face-to-face — and share your computer or device screen for on-target assistance — with the P.R.O.S. at the Randolph County Public Library.

P.R.O.S. stands for Patrons Requesting Online Support. Reference librarians Dave Bare, Meghan Carter and Harris Mason are standing by with the library's Go-To-Meeting software (similar to Zoom) to provide one-on-one help.

Get assistance with a new device; get set up to download library ebooks, e-audiobooks and e-magazines; get assistance filling out online forms and applications; get homework or research help; get a library card; and more.

Initiate a session by calling 336-318-6801. One of the P.R.O.S. may be available to help immediately, or may set up a time for a later meeting. A link to join the virtual meeting will be sent to your email.

To access the service, you need desktop/laptop computer with camera, a tablet/iPad or a smartphone; and an Internet connection. If your computer does not have a microphone, you can call a toll-free number for simultaneous voice communication.

With your consent, the P.R.O.S. can look at your screen and advise you as you work.



Santa, Grinch to usher in holidays

♣ Kids can enjoy holiday fun with a virtual twist, including a Facebook Live version of the popular “Breakfast with Santa.”

Meanwhile, storyteller and illusionist Caleb Sigmon returns not just as the Grinch, but as Santa Claus and all the characters in *A Christmas Carol* in three YouTube performances.

“Breakfast with Santa” morphs into “Santa Storytime LIVE!” at 10 a.m. Saturday, December 19, at [Facebook.com/randolphlibrary](https://www.facebook.com/randolphlibrary), for children of all ages. Santa will report live from the North Pole and read a Christmas picture book during a very special Facebook Live streaming appearance.

He’ll also read letters he has received from... you! Mail, email or drop off (at any library) your child’s letter to Santa, who may select it to read aloud during his appearance.

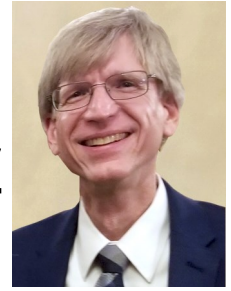

Virtual programs: here to stay

♣ **“Stick Around,”** the virtual craft program developed by Asheboro Children’s librarian **Becky Knorpp**, will be featured statewide by **UNC-TV** in February.

Focusing on creating art with found objects, “Stick Around” installments were posted on the library’s Facebook page and YouTube channel weekly during the spring and summer (it’s now on hiatus in favor of “Asheboro Art Adventures”). “Stick Around” attracted the attention of the producers of “Block Party LIVE! At Home Edition,” which airs on UNC’s digital network for children, Rootle/PBS Kids, and features learning activities available around the state.

“Stick Around” is just one of an array of fun, creative and educational virtual programs that our enormously talented staff have developed to extend service during the pandemic, and to help children cope with changed circumstances.

From March-October, 369 virtual events have been viewed 74,355 times, enabling us to reach an entirely new audience. When in-person programs return, virtual programs likely are here to stay. In addition to special events like the Caleb Sigmon performances, regular children’s programs now include:

- Archdale’s “Storytime with Ms. Carol,” posted at 10 a.m. Thursdays;
- Liberty’s “Family Storytime,” 10:30 a.m. Wednesdays;

- Randleman’s Preschool Storytime, 10:30 a.m. Fridays;
- Asheboro’s “Minutes for Mindfulness,” 10 a.m. every other Monday (quick and fun mindfulness practices for the whole family);

- Asheboro’s “Creative Writing Corner,” 1 p.m., third Monday (for kids age 10+);
- Asheboro’s “Family Sing-Along,” 10 a.m. every other Tuesday (helping kids develop early literacy skills through singing);
- Asheboro’s “What’s Cookin’? Mug Edition” (budding chefs can create delicious recipes with a mug, a microwave, and ingredients found in the home), 4 p.m. every other Wednesday;
- “Asheboro Art Adventures,” 1 p.m. every other Thursday.
- Extension Services is posting storytimes every now and then, occasionally including a sign language component.

There are virtual programs for adults as well, including the Asheboro and Liberty book clubs and events such as the live, interactive writing workshop coming up in December (see back page).

Most programs remain accessible after they are posted. Find them on library Facebook pages and the Randolph County Public Library YouTube channel.

Note: “Stick Around” returns with a special holiday edition at 1 p.m. Friday, December 18; pick up a free craft bag to follow along. Call 336-318-6804 for details.

Seagrove, Franklinville extend hours

♣ **The Franklinville and Seagrove libraries are now available morning to evening, instead of just in the afternoons.**

Seagrove is offering service 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesdays-Fridays and 11 a.m.-3 p.m. Saturdays, and is closed Sundays and Mondays.

Franklinville is offering service 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 1-5 p.m. Sunday, and is closed

Fridays and Saturdays.

Extending the daily hours meant closing one additional day each week, but making the libraries accessible in the morning as well as the afternoon was a worthwhile trade-off, says Charity Neave Johnson, manager of both libraries.

The new hours will remain the same once the libraries are fully reopened to the public.
