Bringing reading to newborns

♣ Now into its second year, Randolph Books for Babies is going strong and getting stronger.

The Friends of the Library initiative, pioneered by Dr. Frances Jones, provides for trained volunteers to deliver a specially-designed kit of early reading resources to the family of each newborn at Randolph Health, contained in a handy Books for Babies tote bag. The volunteers talk with the families about the importance of reading with the child from day one.

To date, the project has reached over 1,500 babies and their families.

The tote contains board books for the parents to read with their child; a reading blanket; a "My First Library Card" and schedules of library children's events; early literacy and health information; and more.

Partners in the program include the Friends, the Randolph County Partnership for Children, Randolph Health and the Randolph County Health Department.

The project's success is evident in a recently completed, random survey of parents of newborns receiving Books for Babies deliveries: 98 percent of new mothers surveyed reported a very positive experience with the program. Some indicated that they were not fully aware of the importance of reading to their children until talking with the volunteers.

Meanwhile, 94 percent of the moms reported that they or another family member were reading to their babies at least once each day. Almost half said they had checked out library books for the child.

One mother said she was inspired to get her GED to be better able to read to her son so he will be smart when he starts school.
