Live virtual children's activities join line-up

Science experiments and reading go live in January as children's librarians in Asheboro and Liberty introduce new interactive virtual activities for kids.

Children ages four and up, with adult supervision, can join Lexi in the Lab and learn how to conduct fun science experiments with materials already found at home, at 2:30 p.m. on the second Tuesday of each month. First up is "Elephant Toothpaste: Fun with Catalysts" on January 12.

Room at 336-318-6804 to sign up and receive a Go-To-Meeting link.

Kids age 10 and up can join in **Read with Me**. Children's Room staff member Emily Ledbetter will read passages aloud from a book and talk with participants about what

they have read together. At the end of each session, participants will vote on whether to continue the book at the next session or start a new one.

Read with Me will take place at 5:30 p.m. on the second Tuesday of each month via Google Meet; call the Children's Room to receive a link. The first session, on January 12, will feature Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone.

Every Friday, the Liberty library will host Snack and Story at 11 a.m. via Zoom. Children can grab a snack, enjoy a story and maybe sing some silly songs. Email library@ townofliberty.org for a link.

Initiative adds free WiFi in library parking lots

as part of the state's NC Student Connect partnership.

The new WiFi network is in action at Archdale, Asheboro, Franklinville, Liberty, Ramseur and Randleman libraries, with installation at Seagrove expected soon. To connect in the vicinity of a library, look for NCGuestWiFi in your device's list of available networks.

Intended to create accessible sites where students can connect to the Internet to download lessons in order to complete assignments at home, the parking lot WiFi is available 24/7 and filtered to be compliant with the Child

Stree 5G WiFi now is available in library parking lots Internet Protection Act (CIPA). Although provided primarily for students, it's available for anyone with a mobile device to access.

> Regular library building WiFi networks remain available as well, and may extend into the parking lots. At Liberty, the town also provides free WiFI covering the library/town hall parking lot.

NC Student Connect is a partnership among state government agencies to increase Internet access in underserved communities. In addition to WiFi access sites, the \$40 million project is providing 100,000 hotspots for students and remote learning professional development for educators.

NC LIVE: still the jewel in the crown

✤ I've referred to NC LIVE before as the jewel in North Carolina's library crown.

So it remains. To say that NC LIVE is the state's "online library" is not descriptive enough to communicate the value that it brings to North Carolinians.

Established in 1998 and funded by the General Assembly, NC LIVE has as its primary mission to make research resources available to everyone in the state through public libraries, universities, private/ independent colleges and community colleges. The initial concept was that even someone in the state's most remote place would have access to the research power available to a freshman at The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Through its collection of databases, NC LIVE now offers over one billion articles, streaming videos, ebooks, audiobooks and learning tools in all fields. (Did you know that you can access *Consumer Reports* reviews and ratings free through NC LIVE?)

A recent study showed that through its statewide licensing of resources and other services, NC LIVE saves public libraries *alone* almost \$18 million in costs that the libraries would have to bear if each were to obtain those resources on its own.

Every three years, NC LIVE reviews its collection with the intent of getting the most bang for its buck. I have the honor of serving as one of three public library representatives on the Resources Advisory Committee, which makes the recommendations to the NC LIVE governing group, the Librarians Council. It's time once again to usher in some exciting new resources, and say goodbye to others. Following is what's new as of January 1.

Returning after a three-year absence is Learning Express/PrepStep (formerly Learning Express Library). It's a suite of elearning solutions that provides interactive tutorials, practice tests, ebooks, flashcards and articles for academic skill building, standardized test preparation, career development and more. It replaces the Gale Testing and Educational Reference Center.

Transparent Language replaces Mango Languages. Transparent provides a fun, effective and engaging experience for learners of all levels looking to build their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in a foreign language. It offers over 110 languages, including English for speakers of over 30 languages, and includes a mobile app.

Gale In Context: Biography profiles some 600,000 individuals from all time periods and areas of study; it replaces EBSCO Biography Reference Center.

Films on Demand Just for Kids will be added to the popular Films on Demand platform. The streaming collection includes kid-safe, advertisement-free educational videos from Sesame Street, The Electric Company, Dr. Seuss, the Berenstain Bears, Franklin and thousands more.


