Bunker, a longtime Asheboro resident, passed away on September 8 at Well-Spring Skilled Care Center in Greensboro.

She was an avid library patron and volunteer, and served on the APLF board.

"This gift only magnifies Betty's service to the library as a volunteer and member of the Foundation," says Library Director Ross Holt.

Susan Milner, APLF president, says, "The members of the Asheboro Public Library Foundation are very grateful for this generous gift from the Bunker Trust. Betty was a

Bunker was a Cleveland, Ohio, native.
She grew up in Scarsdale, New York, and

graduated from Northwestern University. After a stint with IBM in New York, she married Robert P. Bunker in 1949. Robert worked for Klopman Mills, and was transferred to Asheboro for a career that lasted 50 years.



Archdale's Matt Shaw to retire

♣ In 1993, I attended my first North Carolina Library Association biennial conference.

One of the first people I met at the event was Matt Shaw, then working at the **Davidson County Public** Library. Like me, he had just received his Masters degree

in Library and Information Studies from UNC publishers on library purchases of ebooks. -Greensboro.



In Davidson County, Matt rose to serve as manager of the Lexington library. After a stint as a stay-at-home dad, he joined the Forsyth County Public Library in roles including administrative assistant, computer technician, and adult services librarian at the Kernersville branch and at the main library in Winston-Salem.

Along the way, he became a Master Trainer certified by the State Library of North Carolina, and in 2006 was named the library's Employee of the Year.

In 2011, we scooped him up and brought him to Archdale, where he has excelled as manager and as a community leader.

In addition to ensuring smooth operation of the library every day, he's our point-person for coordination of library services with the cities of Archdale and

Trinity, developing progress reports and presenting annual budget requests.

Matt also has taken on the unusually complex job of managing ebook collection development for the library system. A daunting task in and of itself, this process is made more complicated due to the strictures placed by

For example, one publisher allows only 26 checkouts of an ebook "purchased" from it — then the ebook disappears from the collection. Other publishers have different schemes to reduce the perceived loss of profit that might occur from infinitely reusable ebooks.

Matt must navigate all the varying restrictions, track books leaving the collection, and make decisions about repurchasing items or letting them go.

In the community, Matt has served on the Archdale/Trinity Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, and for four years served as director of the Bush Hill Festival.

Matt says, "The best part of my career has been serving and connecting with the wonderful folks who visit the library. Most often, I learn more from them than they learn from me."

With the recent departure of Library Business Manager Linda Shirley after 48 years, it's difficult to see another longexperienced library veteran go. But after his distinguished career, Matt deserves a splendid retirement.


