'It's a What!?'

A rose, by any other name, may smell as sweet, but what IS a rose? A rose is a flower and is vital to plant reproduction.

Come learn about how plants perpetuate themselves, with a little help from the birds and the bees (and the bats and the lemurs, and the flies, and the wind), in this presentation by botanist and UNC-Greensboro biology professor Bruce Kirchoff.

Winner of the UNC Board of Governors Award for Excellence in Teaching, Kirchoff will explore the marvelously varied world of plant reproduction, from a flower that appears once in 50 years to one that cannot reproduce without a specific kind of wasp. Find out what they do, and why using native plants in your garden is so important.

'Blue Star' with poet Barbara Presnell

Poet and Asheboro native Barbara Presnell will read from her book *Blue Star*, which chronicles the impact of war on a Southern family over 100 years. The work draws on census and military records, letters, and other documents. The title refers to the stars on banners that family members hang in their windows when a son or daughter is in the service.

Cherokee Traditions: From the Hands of Our Elders

6:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 11

Learn about the Elders, 20th century artisans who have kept key Cherokee craft traditions alive, in a talk by Western Carolina University professor Anna Fariello. Focusing on the key material traditions of basketry, pottery and carving, this highly visual program recognizes the Elders and the thousands of unnamed makers who created and maintained traditions during centuries past.

Fariello is creator of the "From the Hands of our Elders" series, which includes three books and a website produced to share important archival collections of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians with the general public.

This project is made possible by funding from the North Carolina Humanities Council, a statewide non-profit and affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Friends of the Library.
