years of service, but she didn't go quietly.

But then, with her boundless enthusiasm and wide-open sense of humor, she never has been quiet.

Whether as manager of the Archdale Public Library or as a children's librarian in Asheboro, Susan's absolute commitment to library users has combined with her entrepreneurial spirit to bring life-changing library experiences to the people of Randolph County, especially to its children.

Susan was hired by the City of Archdale in 1983, when the library was located in a two-story house on North Main Street. One of her first tasks was to raise funds for a new library envisioned several years in the future. Her fundraisers included a juried bake sale resulting in a cookbook which sold over 500 copies; a Tour of Homes that became an annual event for five years; and a three-foot banana split created with the help of a church youth group during an Archdale Fourth of July festival.

Susan also organized a teen volunteer group to help with the library's Summer Reading Program. Some 25 years later, one particular teenager in the volunteer program, a reluctant reader who Susan helped to become an eager reader, would inspire one of Susan's greatest triumphs in the Asheboro library Children's Room: "Max and Imaginary Friends," a highly successful monthly book club for kids in grades 2-5.

In 1996, she moved to the Asheboro library and after a stint in the Circulation Department, settled in the Children's Room

♣ Susan Coltrane retired on June 1 with 31 where she really found her niche. In addition to becoming a sought after librarian for children and parents, she helped develop the annual statewide library summer reading programs, and helped organize the yearly Public Library Quiz Bowl.

> In 2007, her inspirational planning process for our library's Summer Reading Program earned the library an Outstanding Staff Development Award from the North Carolina Public Library Directors Association.

> Former Library Director Richard Wells says serving with Susan was a privilege. He says, "Working at the public library was much more than a job or career for Susan. It was a calling and she fulfilled that duty in many capacities. But her greatest influence has to be upon the many children whom she introduced to reading through her programs and story times. How many children and adults are now lifelong readers because of Susan's care and patience and planning? Impossible to estimate!"

Retired Library Director Suzanne Tate notes Susan's work with children, both through the library and her church, and her desire to seek opportunities to enrich her knowledge and skills. Suzanne says, "She will be missed, but has so many friends and interests - she will not be quiet!"

We will dearly miss Susan as part of the library family, and so will the children and parents who come to the library for her knowledge, wit, warmth and welcome; but we take solace in the fact what whatever she does, she will continue to help people, especially children, to learn and grow.





