Library turns 75 on Sept. 1

The Randolph County Public Library celebrates its 75th birthday on September 1.

On that date in 1940, the Randolph County Board of Commissioners — at the request of citizens who had established libraries in their own communities — first appropriated funding for a county library system, and appointed a Board of Trustees.

Establishment of the county library system meant support for the libraries operating in Asheboro, Franklinville and Ramseur; for those about to come into existence in Randleman and Liberty; and for those eventually to be developed in Archdale and Seagrove. It meant professional leadership, a core collection of books shared among the libraries, and service to the entire county by bookmobile. Today, the library system consists of the seven libraries — three operated by the county with significant municipal support, and four operated by their municipalities with significant county support.

Today the citizens visit their libraries over half-amillion times each year, and check out over half-a-million items. The library has become a driving force for early childhood literacy, digital literacy, lifelong learning, workforce development and just plain reading for pleasure. Big gifts enrich library services

 ♣ After 48 years wholesaling books to libraries throughout the southeast,
Asheboro natives Bill and Elizabeth Sanders
– a.k.a. S & W Distributors, Inc. – are scaling down their business.

Their sales force, which once numbered 28 representatives, now consists of four, and they've limited their territory to mail order and areas near their Asheboro base.

The downsizing left them with a stock of new, high-quality books for children and teens that they had purchased for their sales reps as samples. And they have donated that stock — some 743 titles, mostly hardback nonfiction — to the Randolph County Public Library.

Most of the books are in the neighborhood of five years old, but reflect subjects of enduring interest to the age range for which they're written, and relevance to school curricula: animals, ecosystems, history, food and more.

Our children's librarians say most will be added to the collection, and we're delighted to receive a gift that fills such a critical need.

Get SMART with Dart

"Smartboard" has become the term of reference for a large, touch-screen computer that can be used for education and presentations. Like Band-Aid and Kleenex, however, the term is actually the brand name, SMART Board.

A longtime supporter of the Randleman Public Library, the Dart Foundation, has provided a SMART Board for the library's event space as part of the library's move

into its new home. The board can be used simply as a big computer, or can be adapted for hands-on learning games and has proven a big hit with storytime and Summer Reading audiences.

Friends, Foundation give smartboards

Recongizing the utility of the Randleman SMART board, the Asheboro library accelerated its own ongoing exploration of the new technology.

In June, the Friends of the Library and the Asheboro Public Library Foundation Inc., teamed to purchase two 70" Sharp Aquos smartboards for the Asheboro library. One is wall-mounted in the Meeting Room, and the other is upstairs and mobile.

The versatile computers already have proven immensely useful and popular for storytimes, computer classes and presentations.

The children's books and the smartboards will enrich the library experience, and we're grateful for these wonderful gifts.

Osborne to share avian influenza expertise

★ Asheboro library TeenZone Advisory Committee member Rachel Osborne will lead a workshop to educate those raising poultry about Avian Influenza, at 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 15, at the Asheboro library.

Osborne, a rising junior, will discuss the risks of Avian flu and techniques to prevent it. Her talk is free and the public is invited.

Osborne has been active in 4-H for many years, and has worked on poultry projects for seven years. She has raised several types of birds, including geese, chickens and turkeys, and has competed in several competitions.

Her workshop is based on a presentation she created for a district 4-H event, and will cover:

• What Avian Flu is and how the latest outbreak is going to affect the southeast — how does it spread, and does it really pose a threat to humans;

- How to prevent Avian Influenza along with some other common poultry diseases by using proper biosecurity methods;
- A demonstration using glitter to show how germs spread and how biosecurity techniques can stop the spread of disease.
