When the governor handed down his stay-at-home order, I prepared.

I ended up with a tall stack of library books plus several others I ordered online. At the bottom of the stack was a lengthy novel, Hard Country by Michael McGarrity.

A quasi-western, it was not to my usual taste, but it looked interesting and atmospheric.

Alas, as I cycled through Michael Connelly and W.E.B. Griffin and Owen Laukkanen and the new Harlan Coben and others, I was holding poor Mr. McGarrity in deep reserve.

And that's where he stayed until earlier this week when...

... I received an overdue notice (!) from the library.

Long overdue.

Chagrined, I dug out Mr. McGarrity and turned him in, where he languished three more days in guarantine. Fortunately, he was not on hold for someone else.

I was not alone in my post-stay-at-home shock. When we fired up the last remaining of our daily computer system functions in late July, a stunning, four-inch high stack of overdue notice postcards emerged.

As did an unusually high count of stilloverdue items.

We have suspended both collection and accrual of overdue fines indefinitely, but we felt like we needed to alert people to return overdue books, DVDs and audiobooks that might have been overlooked, before those items ticked over to "lost" and did accrue a fee.

So we resumed routine daily overdue alerts by phone or email, and mailed the huge stack of postcards.

What we overlooked was that some of the cards contained dire "final notice" wording — return the material or else! We received a number of phone calls from borrowers concerned that the library indeed might be, like the difficult terrain of Mr. McGarrity's novel, a hard country.

As was the case with many other aspects of our recent lives, our computer system designers did not envision an extended shutdown and partial library service. From March 17 through June 1, the system was set in holiday mode, so nothing was due.

When we reinstituted due dates after June 1, however, the march of days toward overdue status restarted — but we still were not sending notices. So once we resumed the notices, some borrowers got a shock.

Never fear, though, overdue fines still are forgiven, and many of the stray books are finding their ways back in. The normal notice routine has resumed, so you'll hear from us initially, by phone or email, five days after an item is due (it's usually three days, but we have extended the time to allow for our three-day guarantine of items). There will be two additional friendly notices before the draconian "final notice."

As for Mr. McGarrity, I'm a fan of his Kevin Kearney police procedurals, so I'll probably go back to Hard Country one day. But I think he's seen enough of my bookshelf for awhile.
