


Unsung N.C. treasure

Library for Blind offers unique services

♣ As the holiday season approaches, I was reminded recently of another service or gift, if you will, the State Library of North Carolina makes available to the citizens of North Carolina as a return, of course, on your tax dollar.

The Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped is a special public library service that loans books, magazines and audio-visual material specially made for anyone who cannot use standard print material due to a visual or physical disability. All materials are sent to subscribers throughout the state at absolutely no charge to the patron.

The service is available to anyone whose visual impairment, be it permanent or temporary, cannot be corrected with eye-glasses. Persons unable to hold a book or turn a page are eligible as are patrons with certain learning disabilities.

Nursing homes and institutions serving people with these disabilities are also eligible.

To qualify for the service, a "competent authority" (doctor, ophthalmologist, optometrist, registered nurse, social worker, counselor, etc.) must certify need by signature. In the

absence of these, certification may be made by a professional librarian or anyone whose competence under specific circumstances is acceptable to the Library of Congress, of which the Library for the Blind is a part.

Once enrolled, patrons are sent a catalog from which they may choose book titles and magazine titles, the same as those found in any public library. Instead of being printed in regular print, they are recorded on 4 track tapes and produced in grade 2 Braille or large type.

Special cassette players are sent to patrons and are repaired as needed.

There is no charge for postage or repair of cassette players.

Please visit the website, which is in large type format at http://statelibrary.dcr.state.nc.us/lbph.htm or call the library toll-free at 1-888-388-2460. The service is available to any resident of North Carolina.

Other states have similar arrangements with the Library of Congress.

With 78 million baby boomers turning 60 last year, the Randolph County Public Library has established a goal of increasing our collection of large print titles as well as books in audio format. Look for more about that as well as programming designed to inform and entertain this huge segment of our service area.

Calling all authors!

Friends to host book fair for published local writers

♣ Anyone from Randolph County who has published a book and wants to promote it is invited to join the second annual Randolph Writers Book Fair, tentatively scheduled for Saturday, January, 26 at the Asheboro Public Library.

The event is part of Randolph County Writers Month and is sponsored by the Friends of the Library.

Any resident or native of Randolph County who has published a book can participate. "Published" means any commercially-printed, mass-produced book, whether self-published or released through a selective publishing company.

Authors of handcrafted or limited edition books are also eligible. To sign up, call 318-6801.

Each writer will be provided with a table and chairs in the library's

Reading Room. The Friends of the Library will promote the event, invite the public and provide publicity.

Light refreshments will be served. Last year's event drew 14 area writers to what has become an ongoing part of the library's annual recognition of local authors. From Mary Elizabeth Auman Adams to Ed Yowell, and from the 1700s through the present, the library maintains a list of writers and their works that now includes some 160 names: it is available at randolphlibrary.org/ randolphroom.htm.

The library also presents a display each January that includes photographs of as many of the authors as possible along with as many of the books as possible (although some books can be found only in the Randolph Room).

Library Elf

Use Library Elf (www.libraryelf.com) to get notices about holds and overdues by email. Get due date reminders before an item is due. and manage multiple library cards. (Elf is a third party service not affiliated with the library)

Email notices

Replace the library's automated phone calls with email for notifications about holds and overdues. Just call or visit your library and ask to change to email notification (you can sign up for both email notification and Elf).

Email news

Stay up-to-date on library goings on with alerts by email. Go to the library's homepage at randolphlibrary.org to sign up. You'll receive a full-color monthly electronic newsletter plus alerts about programs and other events.
