

# **Ramseur Skype initiative wins statewide award**

★ The Randolph County Public Library has received the 2014 Outstanding Library Promotional Project Award for medium-sized libraries from the North Carolina Public Library Directors Association for the Ramseur Public Library's outreach to Coleridge Elementary School students via Skype.

Ramseur librarians Sandra Livingston and Sandy Jarrell began presenting book talks and library information to Coleridge students in 2012 via the online face-toface communication tool at the suggestion of Media Specialist Christina Whitten.

The first sessions took place with fourth and fifth grade classes in fall 2012.

During the 2013-2014 school year, the librarians Skyped with fifth grade classes in October, and with the entire student body in February.

By the end of 2013-2014, the project had reached 668

students. As a result, the library saw a marked increase in use of the library by the students.

The Ramseur librarians note that often when children registered for cards, the whole family would do so as well.

The effort impressed both parents and students, Livingston says. "Patrons who are parents have commented that they saw photos of us Skyping on the school's web page and on the library's website. They were amazed that this technology was being used in this way — not just for social media," she says.

"The children recognize us at the grocery store or at church and when we are out in the community, telling their parents that we are those library ladies

they saw on TV at school. They are genuinely excited to see us. It makes our day."

The library received the award at the directors association meeting earlier this month.

# **Randleman: One for the record books**

✤ When Donna Toomes joined the Randleman Public Library staff in 2002, she never expected to have to move a library — much less plan a new one from the ground up.

But that's just what Donna, who became library manager in 2005, will have accomplished when the Randleman library reopens in its new building on February 2.

The Randleman Board of Aldermen had envisioned a library expansion for some time, and the relocation of the Richard Petty Museum moved that goal closer to reality. With the unanimous support of the alderman and Mayor Bucky Jernigan, and city administrators Ron Nyland and Nick Holcomb, the project got underway in February 2014, with construction managed by the city's Public Works Department. Library IT specialist Ian Fletcher also has provided key input as the project has progressed.

Responsibility for shaping the new library, however, has fallen to Donna. "Over the past year Donna has planned, coordinated, and executed every detail of a library expansion project," says City Manager Nick Holcomb.

"She has spent countless hours working on the building layout, material and furnishing selection, contractor bidding, coordinating with vendors, and the move itself. She has done this while balancing future library needs of the community within a budget. The City couldn't ask for more from an employee, and the new library is an asset that will be here in Randleman for generations to come."

All this meant a steep learning curve, which Donna negotiated with aplomb. Her razor-sharp mind honed in on details that could become problems if not addressed, and her experience helped find the balance between the needs of the public and the requirements of operating a library.

Working with Donna was Phillip Barton, retired director of the Rowan Public Library and a library facility consultant with over 25 years experience. Phil previously worked with us on renovation of the Asheboro Children's Room and a plan for a new Franklinville library, and recently carried out our overall strategic facility planning effort.

Completely simpatico, Donna and Phil have collaborated to create a stunning library that will surprise and delight visitors. "Working on the Randleman Library project has been a wonderful experience, thanks in large part to Donna," Phil says.

"I believe her sincere commitment to providing great library service to the citizens of Randleman and the surrounding area will be readily apparent in the new facility. The new library represents more than simply a larger building. Donna and her loyal staff have worked diligently to create an inviting, comfortable and dynamic library that will be equipped to serve citizens of all ages for years to come.

"The new library reflects the desire on the part of Donna and her staff to provide the community with something truly special. Christmas 2014 will certainly be one for the record books in the Randleman community thanks to Donna Toomes."

# **NC LIVE resources to change in January**

Many of the electronic resources available through NC LIVE and the library will change in January, but coverage provided by the powerful research tools will remain unrivaled.

The changes are due to recent purchasing decisions by NC LIVE. The state's online library reviews its databases and other electronic research subscriptions every three years.

The biggest change involves access to magazine and journal articles, language learning and auto repair. More streaming videos have been added, and several resources for elementary and middle school age students have been replaced by a single database. Some of the highlights:

- Magazine and Journal articles. Access to hundreds of thousands of magazine and scholarly journal articles in tens of thousands of publications will be provided by ProQuest Central, which replaces EBSCO Host.
- Language Learning. Pronunciator, provided by NC LIVE, will replace the library's Mango Languages.
- Auto Repair. The library will add the online Chilton Library to replace the Auto Repair Reference Center.
- K-12 research resources. The SIRS Knowledge Resource will replace a variety of databases aimed at K-12 students.

# Randleman relocation: the particulars

# What to expect while the library is closed, including due dates and holds

♣ The Randleman library will close at 6 p.m. Friday, January 9, and reopen at 10 a.m. Monday, February 2, in its new location at 142 West Academy Street, the former location of the Richard Petty Museum.

The closure will affect items checked out and items on hold as follows

- **Due dates.** No items will be due during the period the library is closed. Due dates for items checked out from Randleman that would have been due in the library's closing window will be extended until after reopening.
- **Book drop.** Material checked out prior to closing may be returned to the book drop at the new library after January 9, or to any other library in the county. No overdue fines will accrue after January 9 on items checked out from Randleman.
- Holds awaiting pick-up. All items on hold and awaiting pick-up by Randleman library patrons must be

checked out by the end of business on Thursday, January 8.

- Unfilled holds placed thru December 29. Holds placed by Randleman patrons thru December 29, but not filled by January 9, will be suspended until after February 2. The suspended holds will maintain their place in the queue, but will not be filled until the library reopens. Anyone who wants to un-suspend one of these holds and change the pick-up location must call the library prior to closing time on January 9.
- Unfilled holds placed after December 29. The pick-up location for holds placed by Randleman patrons after December 29 will default to the Archdale Public Library, 10433 S. Main St., Archdale. The pick-up location can be changed to any other library when placing a hold. The pick-up location for these holds will remain as the Archdale library or the selected library even after the Randleman library reopens.
