

Librarian goes to Caregiver College

Betty Bunting participated in the Caregiver College at Randolph
Community College for the second consecutive year.

She demonstrated the actions of someone who is battling the disease and explained how it progresses. She provided many helpful hints on how to care for a loved one suffering with dementia.

In addition to Snow's presentation, a skit provided detailed

information on services available in Randolph County for the elderly, workshops on sleep disorders, safety in the home, Medicare help, costs involved with nursing home care and other subjects relevant to the aged and their caregivers. A handbook of information and resources was compiled and is available for patron use at the Reference Desk of the library.

The event drew 115 people. Betty felt that the college was "vital for anyone who works with older members of the community on a regular basis. It provided information on all the issues with which the aged are dealing in a forthright manner while giving practical tips on communicating and interacting with seniors. It definitely will help the Extension Department in our mission to serve the aged."

Next year's Caregiver's College is planned for Saturday, February 19. Mark your calendars now so you will not miss this important community service event!


She was responsible for securing the vendors for the event.

Held February 20, Caregiver College is a collaborative effort among Randolph Community College, Randolph Hospital, Hospice of Randolph County, Cross Road Retirement Community, and Randolph Public Library. Attending were representatives of Randolph Senior Adults Association, RCATS, home health agencies, Piedmont Triad Council of Government and others who served as vendors. These groups are dedicated to seeking the best care and help available for the older people in our community. Caregiver College is open to everyone but is designed especially for those who are caring for an aged loved one.

Teepa Snow, an occupational therapist currently working as a dementia care and education specialist, was the guest speaker.

Browse library shelves at your computer

♣ A new feature in the library's catalog lets you see what's on the shelf next to a book you have searched — right on the computer.

Called Shelf Browse, the new capability is part of the LibraryThing for Libraries package of enhancements that provides user-generated reviews, similar titles and tags. The expandable Shelf Browse icon appears between Copy/ Holding Information and Similar Books on the catalog page, and shows, based on

library call numbers, a few items to the left and right of the one you have selected.

You can click on one of these images to view the item's information, scroll left or right for more nearby titles, or click the Full Screen button to see a wider range. In the full screen mode, you also can track left or right to move along the shelf.

The image above shows books surrounding Thomas Friedman's *The World is Flat* (top center). Clicking on a book jacket image will take you to the item's page in the library catalog.

Randleman grant


