## **Owens/Owen pottery to be auctioned**

♣ Family ties and quality offerings will be foremost at a Friends of the Library program, 7 p.m. Thursday, April 29, at the Randolph Arts Guild as Holly George-Warren speaks about her recent work and her storied career as a music journalist.

Also that night, nine beautiful pieces of pottery from the Owen/Owens Family of Seagrove will be auctioned in a silent auction with proceeds benefiting the Friends of the Library.

Holly is, of course, the daughter of the late Martha George, longtime librarian, reader's adviser, teen advocate and sought-after book confidant at the Asheboro library, and the late Alvis George, architect for the original 1964 library building and its 1995 renovation. The entire George family grew up in the library and thrived in the cultural traditions associated with bibliophilia. Holly has written extensively for adults and children about several genres of music as well as penning a definitive biography of cowboy crooner Gene Autry.

The second annual Marjorie W. Memory Pottery Auction will take place that same evening. Following the death of Mrs. Memory, longtime librarian at UNCG and author of *A History of the Randolph Pblic Library, 1935-1967*, good friend and coworker Stanley Hicks, now of Enid, OK, established the auction by donating two pieces of Jugtown pottery. This year, Stanley

arranged for Earl Senger and his wife Frances Freeman Senger (formerly of Asheboro) to donate the pottery to be auctioned. The Sengers are premier pottery collectors in the Southeast. Pieces available include: a dishpan by Ben Wade Owen (1920s); a pie dish in tobacco spit glaze (1950s); two Chinese white rice bowls from Ben W. Owen, Jr. (1960s); a pitcher from M.L. Owens (1990s); a Vernon Owens blue vase (1998); a Pam Owens teapot (2003); and a bowl and vase from Ben Owen III (1999).

# **Library gets \$5K literacy grant for English language learners**

♣ The library will expand services for low-literacy English language learners thanks to a \$5,000 grant from the **American Library Association funded** by the Dollar General Literacy Foundation.

The library was one of 70 in the nation to receive an American Dream Starts @ your library grant. The funding will support an initiative focusing on Spanish speaking adults who have a low literacy level in their native language, and seek to help them learn English while increasing literacy in both languages.

The effort, called Lenguaje y Lectura @ your library, gets underway in May. The aim is to provide a sustained, hands-on, verbal and visual learning experience for participants.

Participants will practice English using the ESL/Spanish module of the library's Mango Languages online resource

(www.randquest.org), and in doing so build computer literacy skills along with language and reading skills.

In addition to online learning, participants will join with volunteers and each other in learning games, and will be provided workbooks and picture dictionaries to keep.

Activities for children also will be provided so that families can participate without worrying about child care, and some activities will include the whole family. One emphasis of the program will be assisting parents to help their children succeed in school.

Community partners assisting with advice, volunteers and material selection include the Latino Coalition of Randolph County, Asheboro Parents as Teachers, Franklinville-Ramseur Parents as Teachers, Randolph Community College Basic Skills/ ESL, Asheboro City Schools ELL Department and the Randolph County Schools ESL Parent Advocate.


