The event is a fundraiser for the Friends.


Where there's a will there's a relative, as the saying goes, and when Starkweather's eccentric heirs learn they may be disinherited, the old man is not long for this world.



Space: The Next Generation

♣ We're good at intuiting what the library's space needs will be for the immediate future.

At the Asheboro library, for instance, we know that our Children's Room is too small, our public meeting space does not meet demand and our Randolph Room is bursting at the seams.

One thing we didn't anticipate, however, was a sudden demand for electrical outlets. More specifically, a demand for comfortable lounge and task seating near electrical outlets.

This need arose a few years ago as use of laptops and mobile devices reached critical mass and we became the community's go-to location for free WIFI.

So we called in City of Asheboro maintenance staff, who dropped electrical outlets anywhere we could place seating near open wall or column space. Now there are plenty of places to plug in.

On the other hand, there now are no more electrical circuits available in the Asheboro library building.

That's just a subtle indicator of the challenges we face as the library grows. Some libraries have bigger fish to fry.

In Franklinville, members of the John W. Clark Public Library Board of Trustees have sought a new building for the library for years. The current space, above the downtown restaurant and town hall, is too small and not handicapped accessible.

The board has some seed money and

two possible locations, with a floor plan design for one, and is discussing ways to raise funds to proceed. Other libraries have or will have space concerns of their own as usage grows and services expand.

That said, expansion may not be the answer in all cases. For example, virtual elimination of no-longer-used print reference material in Asheboro has freed space for other uses. In other words, there are plenty of unknowns and, as with the electrical outlets, unexpected needs.

That's why, this coming fiscal year — thanks to a federal Library Services and Technology Act planning grant — we will undertake a countywide Strategic Facility Planning Process to look ahead to what library users will need from the library buildings over the next 15-20 years.

Carried out by an experienced library facility consultant, the study will include a community analysis of countywide demographic and economic growth trends; assessments of each of the seven libraries; forums for public input; and conversations with library staff. It also will measure our libraries against industry standards.

The final report will serve as an aid to library administration as we look ahead, and also help make the case if we eventually seek public or private funding for a project.

The study is supported by grant funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services under provisions of the federal Library Services and Technology Act as administered by the State Library of North Carolina, a division of the Department of Cultural Resources.


