The ebooks also will be added to the library catalog. A simple title

search will indicate whether a copy in ebook format is available, and a keyword search solely for ebooks also will be available.

Ebook borrowers will have to download and install a small program from the website. Then, they will be able to check out ebooks, download them and transfer them to an e-reader.

Initially, ebooks will be available for all e-readers except Amazon.com's Kindle. Kindle ebooks will be available soon, possibly as early as September.

Borrowers will check out ebooks from the Depot, a website provided by the library's ebook vendor. The website will be reachable directly, or from the

Remembering the first Asheboro librarian

♣ Blanche Walker served as Asheboro's very seldom took any annual or sick leave. first librarian. Retired Library Director Charlesanna Fox, who turns 101 this month, penned this reminiscence.

The Asheboro Librarian from 1936 until 1963 was Mrs. Blanche Cox Walker.

Cox who lived on Academy and Main Streets. This place is now owned by the Central Methodist Church. The Church and the parking lot are located where the home was originally located.

Mr. and Mrs. Cox had six daughters, one of whom was Blanche. She was a graduate of Salem College. She married James Walker. They had a son and a daughter.

The Asheboro Library Association asked Mrs. Walker to come to work after Carrie Brittain, one of their members, had to leave to go to summer school.

She began work in 1936 and was the only Asheboro Librarian until the Asheboro and the County Librarian were joined in 1963.

She was there every day from 9-6 o'clock. There was no annual or sick leave. Blanche stayed after the City Hall was closed at 5 p.m. five or six days a week and worked on Saturdays so that people who worked five days could come to the library. At times, for the Retirement Home in Southern Pines. members of the Library Association helped out.

She worked this way until 1954 when the County Library was able to employ Leota today who will remember Mrs. Walker and (Jack) Fritz to work one day a week. She

The Asheboro Public Library was on the first floor of the City Hall from 1938 until 1963 when it merged with the Randolph Public Library headquarters in a new building on Worth Street.

The library was on the first floor and has She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O.R. an entrance on the south. There was another door leading to the hall which could be locked when the library was open and the City Hall was closed. John Church was the faithful janitor for the City Hall including the library.

> The library was furnished with beautiful library furniture featuring shelving, tables, and chairs — all gifts from local civic clubs, organizations and individuals. The furniture was a lovely soft green.

After 25 years, the Asheboro Library became very crowded. There was room for only one table for children and one for adults and the charging desk and a few other things.

In 1963 the Asheboro Library was moved to the new location on Worth Street which houses the headquarters of the Randolph County Library. Mrs. Walker was made a Reference Librarian.

She was now of retirement age but she had seen the changes and growth. She left Her son had died and her daughter was married and living in Pennsylvania.

There are many persons in the county the Asheboro Public Library at the City Hall.

♣ Children's libarian Jonna Libbert retired in May after 18 years with the library.


