That's the week of the North Carolina Library Association's (NCLA) 60th Biennial Conference, and we encourage as many of our staff as possible to attend, even if only for a day.

The NCLA is the primary professional association for librarians in North Carolina. It gives us the opportunity to exchange ideas and stay current with library trends.

It serves librarians from all types of libraries, and those involved in all types in activities in the profession, such as literacy, special collections, management, youth services and more.

Participation in the North Carolina Library Association is a tradition at the Randolph County Public Library. Former Library Director Charlesanna Fox served as president from 1953-1955, and I had that honor from 2001-2003.

Many staff have served on various NCLA sections and committees. While a librarian in Forsyth County, Assistant Director George Taylor attended and later chaired the prestigious NCLA Leadership Institute.

Former staff member Jonathan Farlow also attended the institute, and later chaired NCLA's Reference and Adult Services Section.

So when fall of an odd-numbered year rolls around, we make space in our schedule

for the NCLA conference. Writing this same kind of column 20 years ago, then-Library Director Richard Wells put it this way:

"The conference allows all the librarians in the state to meet and basically get their batteries charged. The speakers, workshops, awards, vendors and, yes, socializing, all make those who attend realize that the profession is alive and well. Upon returning from the conference, librarians bring with them ideas and opportunities for improved services."

This year's conference offers more than 100 programs over four days. The vast array of topics to choose from includes digital reference, community partnerships, new supervisors, public libraries and grade-level reading, organizing a job fair, libraries and the homeless, strategic planning and community needs analysis, fair use and copyright, emergency preparedness, innovative genealogy and very many more.

There's a session on helping patrons trace descendants of African-American Civil War veterans, and one led by N.C. Poet Laureate Joseph Bathanti on hosting poetry discussions in the library.

Not to mention a brace of famous authors and library leaders, and just the joy of basking in and soaking up the experiences, ideas and innovations of our colleagues from across the state.

So if you hear the bones of our skeleton crew clattering in mid-October, rest assured that we will return recharged with brilliant ideas and big plans.
