Library wins three state awards

♣ Three library projects have won outstanding program awards from the North Carolina Public Library **Directors Association (NCPLDA).**

Summer Reading publicity, RandQuest.org and the Liberty Public Library renovation claimed top honors for medium-sized libraries. Library staff will receive the awards at an NCPLDA meeting in December.

Publicity for the Summer Reading Program won the Outstanding

Promotional Program Award. In June, the library sent a colorful flyer home with some 17,000 K-8 students in the Asheboro City and Randolph County Schools.

The effort significantly increased participation in the Summer Reading Program, driving up the number of children obtaining library cards by 39 percent and program attendance by 34

Randquest.org, the library's research portal, won the Outstanding Service (continued on page 3)

State Library: from the gov't; here to help

♣ On November 16, State Library consultant Raye Oldham paid a site visit funded sufficiently? Do you have enough to the Randolph Public Library.

Former consultant Frannie Ashburn has been assigned to another section of the state. Frannie is director of the Center for the Book, which sponsors community reads and a statewide contest for secondary school students. Raye is the consultant for Continuing Education in the Library Development Section of the State Library.

Due to budget cuts, travel has been restricted for state employees so site visits have been limited. Nonetheless, close contact between the State Library and public libraries throughout the state is maintained through North Carolina Public Library Directors Association conferences, the North Carolina Library Association biennial conference and the many workshops that the State Library provides for library staff. Plus the consultants are always a phone call or email away for answers to perplexing library questions.

As part of the State Library's Five Year Plan, and under the direction of State Librarian Mary Boone, consultants will visit each public library and quiz staff on a number of issues. What is your community asking for that prompted a new service? What kind of support are you getting from the community, from your governing body? Are your facilities adequate to meet community needs? And, if not, what are

your building plans? Is your collection staff members, and do they have access to adequate training, to meet community needs? Is your Internet connection adequate to the demand placed on it?

All these questions are designed to help the State Library determine the needs of public libraries and how to help meet those needs.

One need under consideration is a statewide library card. In theory, a single library card would provide you with access to material in the collections of all the participating North Carolina public libraries via your local library's catalog, with delivery provided.

Plans are in the very early stages, with the focus on how a catalog shared among many public library systems might work. Georgia and Indiana already offer a statewide library card, as does a consortium of South Carolina libraries.

Assistant Director Ross Holt is part of a working group looking into the concept.

The State Library also is considering the Randolph County Public Library as one of 15 JobSearch centers in the state due to the county's large population and high unemployment rate. Via a federal grant, the library would receive laptops, fiber optic cable and increased bandwidth to further help job seekers find employment.

If the plan goes through, the JobSearch center resources would be available in midto-late 2010. Stay tuned!

Library offers weatherization talk

Weatherization to reduce energy bills by making houses more energy efficient will be the topic of a presentation at 3 p.m. Wednesday, December 2, at the Asheboro library.

Regional Consolidated Services staff will talk about how to take advantage of the program, which offers the elderly,

persons with disabilities and low-income families weatherization services at no cost.

Typical work may include caulking, insulating, sealing air leaks, installing vapor barriers, installing smoke/carbon monoxide detectors and replacing light bulbs with CFL bulbs.

Eligibility is based on combined household income.

Innovation Award. Creation of the portal, which provides easy access to the library's online research resources, led to a marked increase in awareness of the resources, more than doubling the use of some databases and racking up 3009 visits to the site between February and June.

Renovation of the Liberty library, which included new carpet and a creative reorientation of bookshelves to make the building's floor plan more open and inviting, received the Outstanding New/ Improved Library Facility award.


