

Club Continues Tradition of Service

Community improvement is the goal of the Archdale-Trinity Women's Club and over the past 32 years since they were formed they have accomplished that goal over and over.

The club was organized in January 1959 with the help of members of the High Point Junior Woman's Club. The club is affiliated with the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs and the General Federation of Women's Clubs which was established 100 years ago.

Changing times has prompted the club to a new direction to accommodate the working woman. Since October the club has been meeting on the second Thursday night of each month, usually at a restaurant. Before, club members met at lunch.

Club members hope the nightly meetings will encourage young women in the Archdale-Trinity area to join their efforts. "This is a good way for working women to do community service," club president Joyce Varner said.

"We are a community service organization, but we have a good time."

The accomplishments of the club are visible in our community still today.

Education has been the theme of several projects through the years. Club members were instrumental in the formation of the Archdale Public Library and the organization of a successful vote for the Archdale-Trinity supplemental school tax. The club continues their support of the library with their current project of selling \$1 chances to win a hand-pieced quilt with cross-stitched historical sites in each square. Tickets are available by calling any club member.

Through ways and means projects, club members raise money to fund the ongoing Sallie Southall Cotten Scholarships and the Joseph P. Gamble Fine Arts Scholarship. Annually, the club gives a best-all-around award to a boy and girl at Archdale-Trinity Middle School. They sponsor the Junioresettes Club at Trinity High School.

The club organizes an annual arts festival for club members and students of Archdale-Trinity Middle School and Trinity High School.

Funds were raised by club members to purchase the playground equipment at Creekside Park. The club maintains that equipment today.

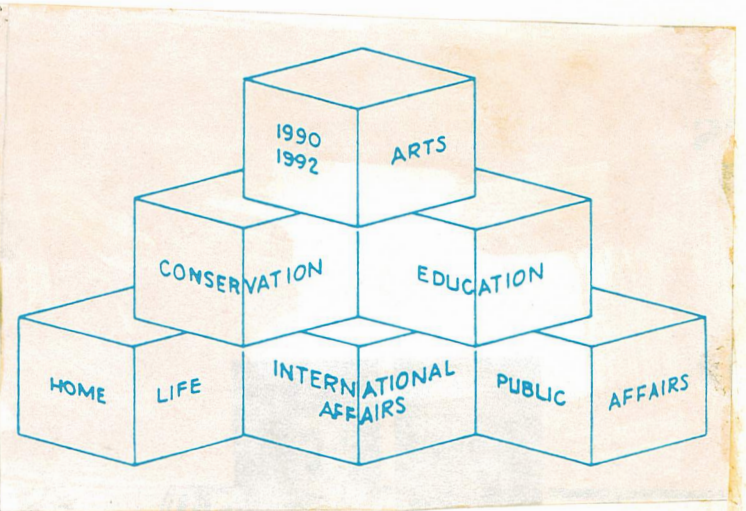
While promoting projects for younger community residents, club members take special heart with the elderly through the Golden Agers Club. Through this club, senior citizens are remembered during holidays and with special gifts throughout the year.

Through donations, the club supports the High Point Women's Shelter, the Murdock Center, Caswell Center, North Zoological Park, HeartStrides, Cancer and AIDS research, the Special Olympics and the libraries of local elementary schools.

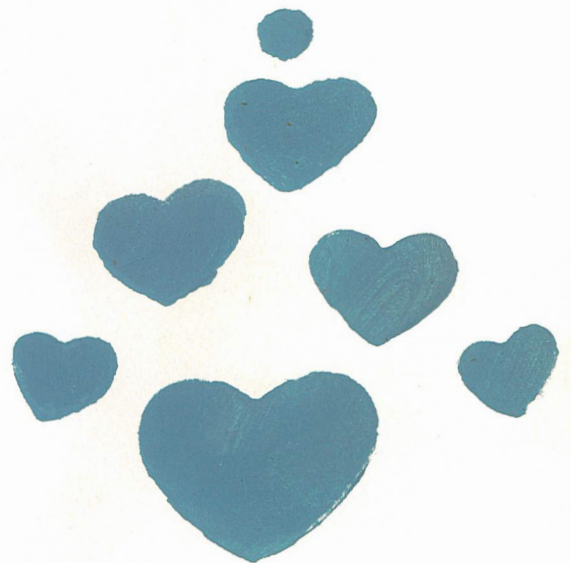

CICHLIDS -- General Fact Sheet By Jayne Owen Parker

Some animals at the State Zoo have shimmering, iridescent colors, build elaborate nests to attract their mates, lay eggs, then brook their young with the tenderest of care. If you are thinking birds, you are not even close.

One of the exhibits in the African Pavilion is an aquarium filled with African cichlids -- some of the most striking and interesting freshwater fish you are likely to encounter.

Members of this family are easily distinguished from other bony fishes in Africa, because cichlids have only one pair of nostrils. All other bony fishes native to Africa have two pair.

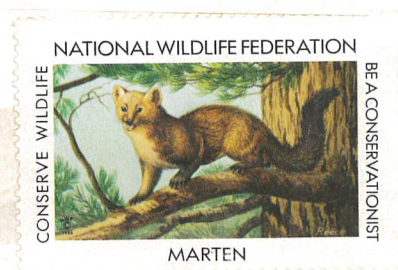
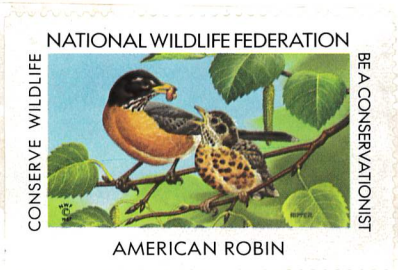
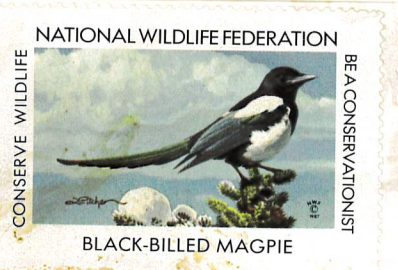
Cichlids are not remarkable for their noses, however. They are noted for the seemingly endless variety of colors, shapes, and behaviors these fishes have evolved in Africa's three great lakes.

Over 400 of the 700 known species of cichlids live in the lakes of Malawi, Victoria, and Tanganyika. And, oddly enough, each of the lakes seems to have its own distinctive group of cichlids. Most inhabit only one of these places and aren't found anywhere else in the world, not even in the rivers that flow into their habitat.

With over 700 varieties, it is not surprising that there is no such thing as a typical cichlid -- species vary as much in size and shape as they do in their way of life.

Herbivores that browse quietly on plants in open waters tend to be thick-bodies and sluggish in their movements, while those that graze on rocky ledges are usually small and elongated so they can seek food and shelter among the crevices. But the piscivores -- the ones that prey on other fishes -- take on the shape of hunters. Some stalk in open waters and are usually sleek and pointed like torpedoes, so they can propel themselves rapidly through the water. But those that stalk their prey in tall grasses are often extremely flattened from side to side, so they can pass easily between closely growing plants, and advance almost invisibly on unsuspecting prey.

The Best-All-Around male and female students were presented plaques from our club.

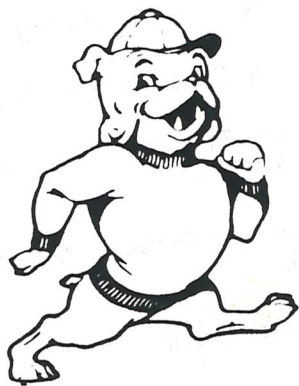

He attends school from February to November. He likes to play soccer and to ride on horses. At home, he helps hauling firewood and water and runs errands.

Jose's father is a laborer and his mother is a housewife. They live in a small house built of bahareque (roughly cut lumber) covered with mud walls, with a tile roof and dirt floor. They lack running water, electricity and sanitary latrine. They cook on a hearth. Their belongings are a table, a bed, a bench. They rent 1 manzana of land to cultivate. They have a few hens and pigs.

They have participated in PLAN's project of breeding cattle. At present, all family members are in good health. When they become ill, they visit the health center.

The father earns approximately US \$60.00 a month, which is hardly enough to provide food, clothing or other essential daily needs. They were being helped by Foster Parents who are no longer able to continue their sponsorship. Because the family situation still urgently cries for help, we hope you will want to help us to continue our services to this needy family.

The family's objectives include the purchase of land to cultivate and to continue working with PLAN's projects.

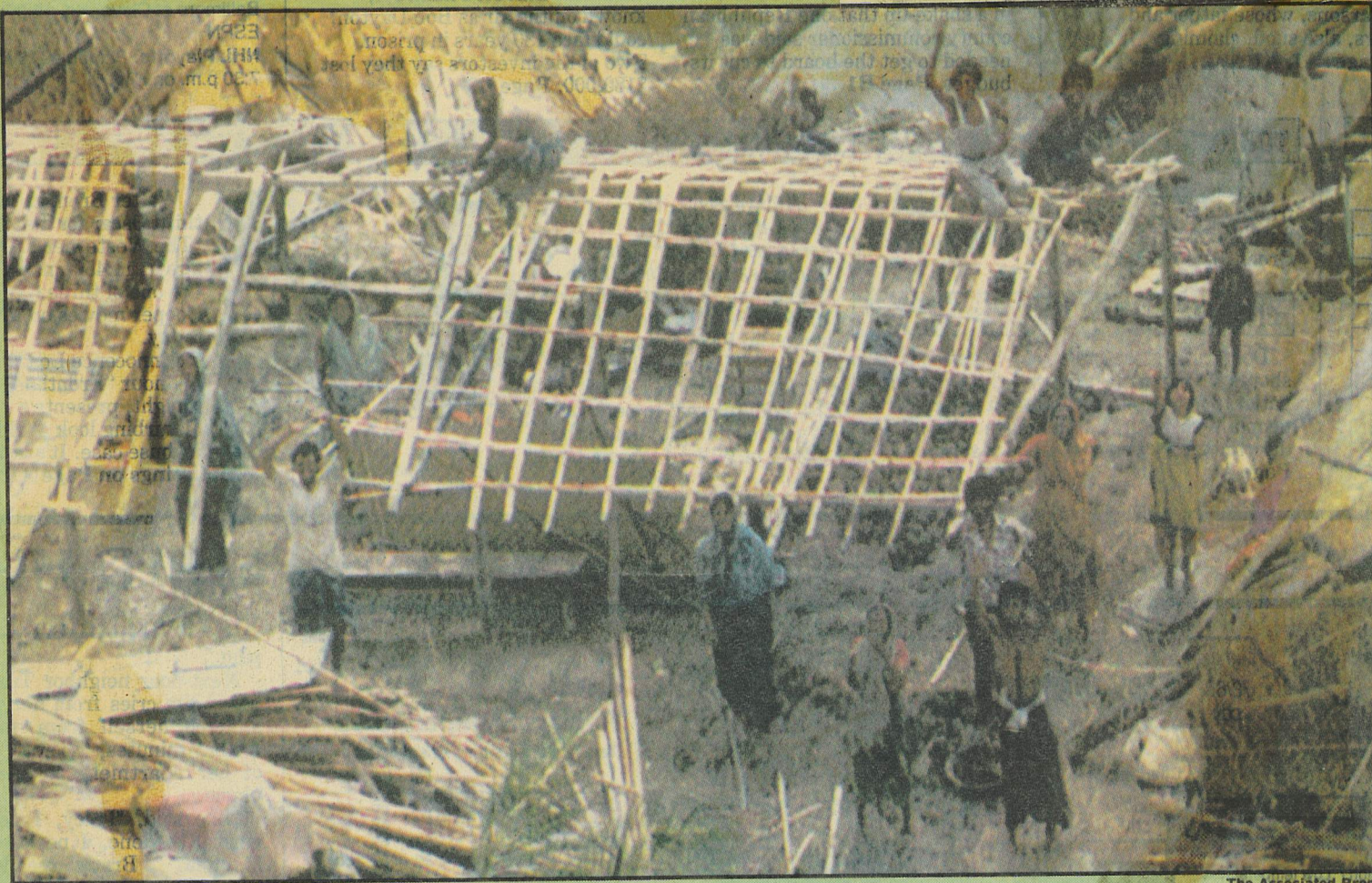

A week after a savage cyclone and tidal surge killed more than 125,000 people, an additional 4 million people are "now at serious risk" from lack of food, contaminated drinking water and disease, the Red Cross said Monday.

On Sandwip Island, where the Red Cross estimates that 35,000 people were killed, a schoolteacher said Monday that most of the bodies buried in the last two days were those of infants and children who died of diarrhea, dysentery and dehydration after the storm.

The fierce cyclone and 12- to 20-foot tidal surge, the most severe in decades, also has left the impoverished country's economy reeling after several years of nominal progress.
