Fire Safety Is Topic For Woman's Club

Keith Eddins, a lieutenant with the Guil-Rand Fire Department, was the guest speaker of the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club, which met last Thursday at Steak & Ale in High Point. Chaplain Lala Hilton gave devotions from Psalms 106:1-2.

Public affairs chairman Belva Hancock introduced Eddins who spoke to the club on fire safety. The Guil-Rand Fire Department is working to promote this program in the community from children to older folks, Eddins told club members.

The department has approximately 1,100 calls per year, Eddins said. He encouraged everyone to look at their home as a child would, keeping items such as lighters and matches out of reach. Adults can be the cause of a fire by leaving things like irons, curling irons, food on stoves, rags from spilled gas or oil where heat builds up to start fires, Eddins said.

Another cause of fires are chimneys used year after year burning the wrong woods and

then not cleaning them. Eddins stressed the fact of not leaving items too close to hot stoves, gas heaters or fireplaces.

One way to protect our families is with fire detectors. Eddins told club members where they should be placed and to be sure to change the batteries at least twice a year.

President Joyce Varner presented a slate of officers for the 1991-92 club year: Belva Hancock, president; Frances Hall, first vice president; Joyce Varner, second vice president; Jerry English, recording secretary; Janice Smith, corresponding secretary; Rachel Booze, treasurer; Anne Whitt, historian; and Maguerite Lee, chaplain.

Residents rally to save Trindale field for future ballplayers

TRINITY — It never was pretty.

The wooden-roofed dugouts and metal scoreboard stand at the bottom of a dead-end street off U.S. 311. Metal bleachers and a cement-block concession stand ring the dirt infield. And orange plastic chairs lay askew in a wooden press box 10 feet up behind the wire-mesh back stop.

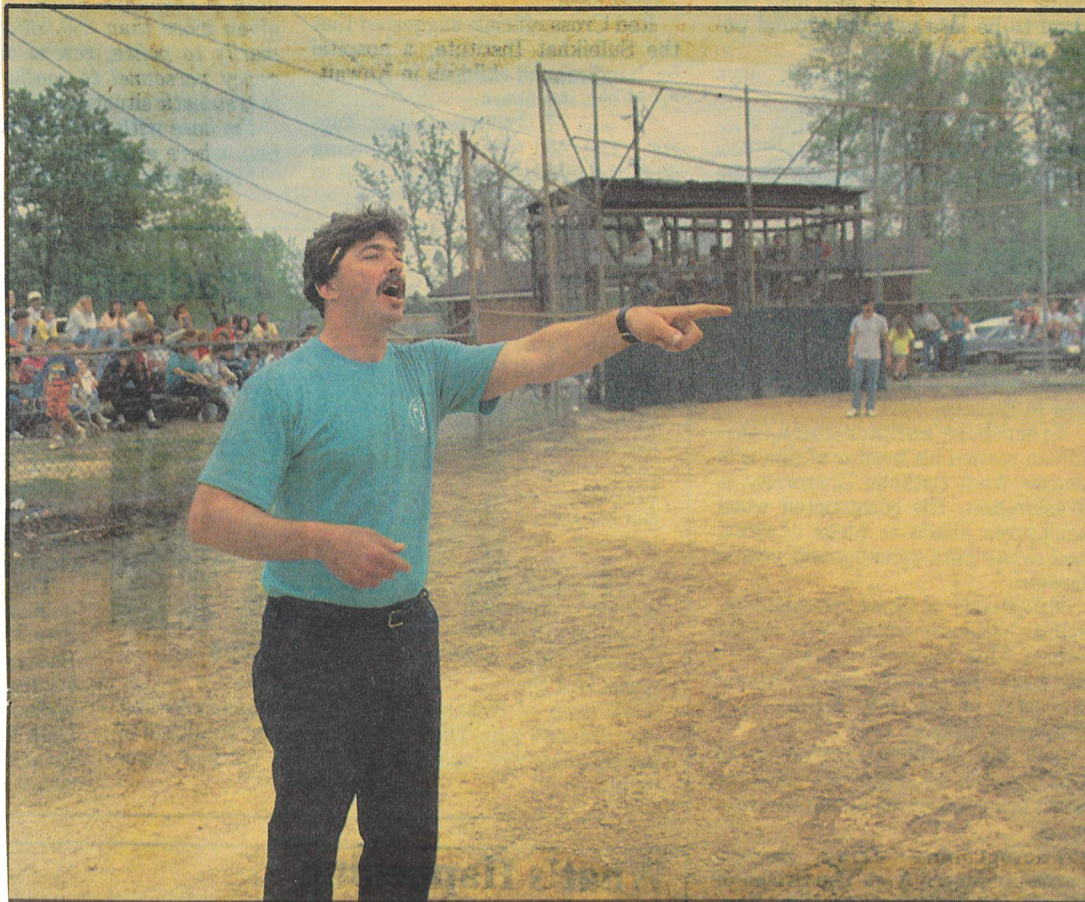
But ask anyone in Trinity about Trindale ballfield, and they'll smile. "Everybody likes this field because of the tradition," said Jeff McQuaigue, a Pfeiffer College baseball player who grew up playing first base at Trindale. "It may not have a grass infield like all the others, but everyone wanted to work hard to keep it here."

Residents in the northwest corner of Randolph County hustled for the past year to buy the 25-year-old landmark after county school officials declared the land as surplus in November 1989.

The Archdale-Trinity Little League Association convinced county officials to let them have the field for \$10,000 up front. They will pay an additional \$40,000 in two payments to prevent developers from buying it and turning center field into condominiums or single-family homes.

The association ceremoniously capped off this deal April 27. They

ated the field to W.A. "Bill" Aldridge, a time Little League supporter.

The association now faces orchestrating an aggressive fund drive to raise \$40,000. Members also must receive an additional \$20,000 to buy 400 players and 29 teams playing weekly at the park at the end of Columbus Road.

So far, it's been easy. Community organizations have started donating money, and area businesses have dishied out \$300 apiece to advertise on 4-by-8 signs that will soon line the field fence 300 feet from home plate. Residents and businesses simply describe their contributions as an investment.

"Sports is the closest thing to life," said Jake Penhamer, a coach who works in the person-department of a High Point chemical coat-company. "You get some bad calls in life, you have to pick up and go on."

For years, players have practiced anywhere they could find. Behind a hardware store. In a vacant lot. Or in Mrs. Robert Trodgon's front

yard. But when game time came around, everyone — parents, players, coaches and spectators —

headed past single-family homes on Columbus Road and wheeled their cars, pickups and station wagons into a dirt parking lot for another game at Trindale.

Spectators bought a \$1 hot dog, 60 cents worth of french fries and a 60-cent soft drink and parked themselves in the stands to watch inning after inning of memories unfold.

They had many. "I remember when I caught that ball in shallow left center and threw that guy out at home," said Gary Hill, now a food service sales representative and the association's president.

"Man, I'll never forget that," he continued. "And I know if I've got memories, I know thousands of other people do, too. We all thought if you destroy this field, you're destroying a memory."

David Barnes grew up behind the first-base line and through the woods in a three-bedroom split-level house with his two older brothers and older sister.

He watched his older brother, Daryl, play at Trindale. Then, he and his friends would gather the broken bats. They would take finishing

nails, wood glue and electric tape and put the bats back together so they could use them for their own games.

In the meantime, Barnes' cocker spaniel, Rusty, learned to chase tennis balls hit to him at Trindale. The dog later learned how to slide through the holes under the wire-mesh fence and chase baseballs during the middle of a game.

The ballfield behind Trindale School became a big part of Barnes' childhood.

Barnes' passion for baseball continued. He went on to play at Trinity High School, High Point College and a semi-pro team, the Greensboro Brewers. And nowadays, Barnes finds himself back on the field of his youth coaching varsity baseball at his alma mater.

"This field means so much to so many people," Barnes said. "People my age and older can remember all the old coaches like Paul Beck, Charles Fletcher, James Parnell. These people you looked up to and are very important in the community."

"This field represents them."

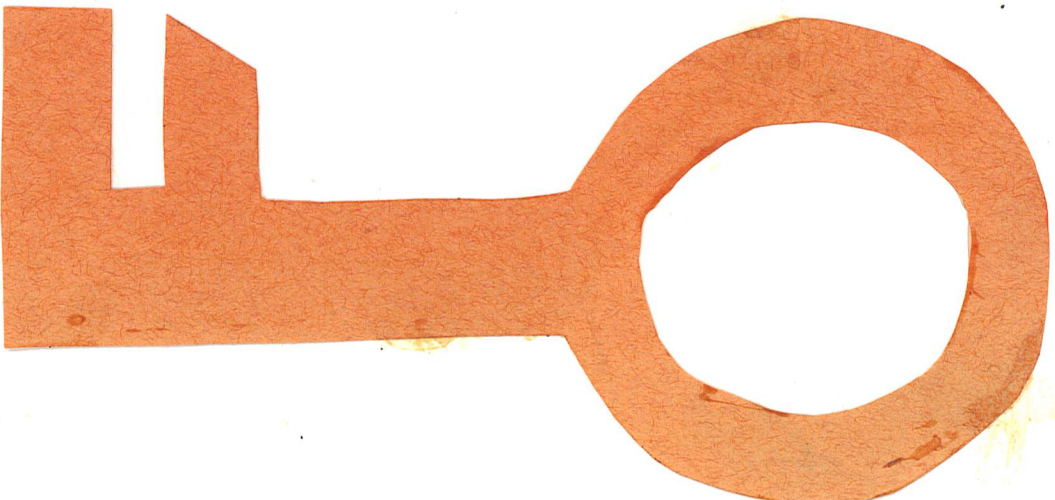

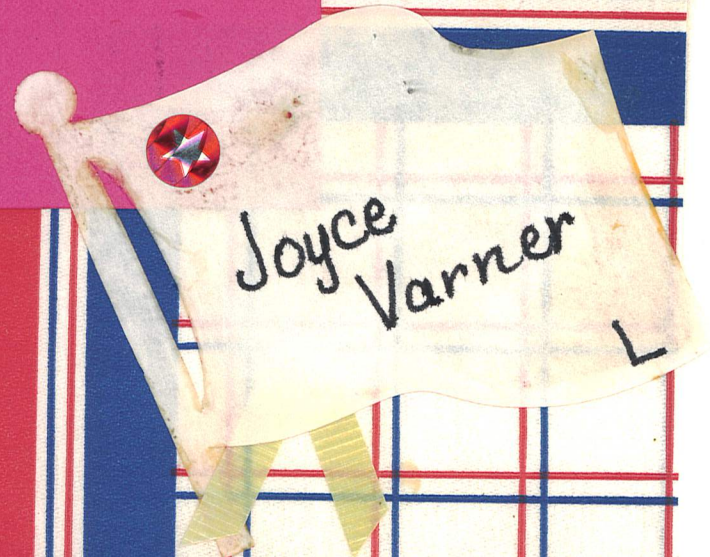

FBLA sponsored a Dress for Success Contest last week. The men's winner was Billy Batten and the women's was Labrina Peace.

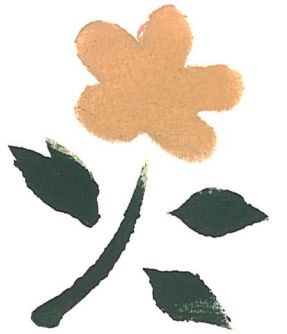

April 24, 1990 to April 24, 1991 is the designated observance. GFWC launched the celebration with our videoteleconference held on April 24, 1990, followed by the Centennial Convention in July. And now we are focusing on the future and our remaining events.

Plans are underway for the Forum for the Future to be held at the Washington Marriott in Washington, D.C. on April 24, 1991. Representatives of several women's organizations will be invited to attend, as well as GFWC members. We will present speakers and hold workshops as we plan the implementation of the agenda for women for the 21st century. The focus for the Forum will be in the six areas our clubwomen determined were of greatest importance during the 1989 Region Conferences. If the history of your state and/or your club has not been forwarded to GFWC Headquarters, please send these immediately. Every effort is being made to have these completed in the GFWC Archives. Forward them to the attention of Cindy

Swanson, WHRC Director.

Some suggestions for Centennial projects include: documenting the history of the club's development; attic archaeology - discovering interesting items in attics and closets that chronicle the history of the club/state; store-front displays using items related to club/history/accomplishments in the community; displays using clothing worn by clubwomen during various times in history; exhibits using old photographs to tell the history of the club/state; visual presentations to other organizations; lobby and shopping mall displays featuring appropriate centennial themes; poster exhibit; planting a garden with the Federation flower - the red rose; tree-planting projects.

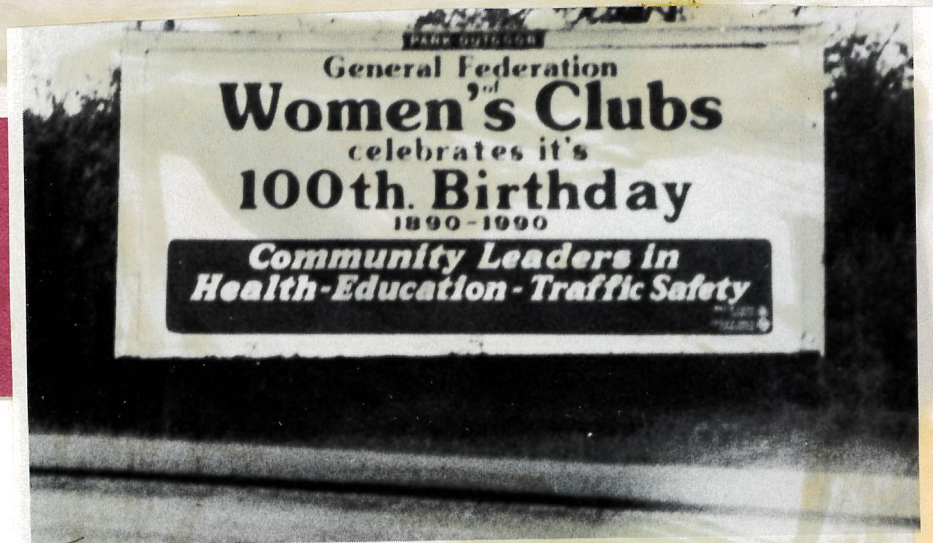

Remember to purchase a copy of *Reaching Out*, by Mary Jean Houde, an in-depth account of GFWC's first 100 years, for your local or state libraries.

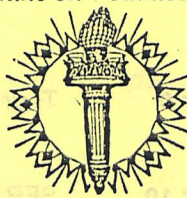

GFWC's opening Centennial Convention brought nearly 2,000 delegates to New York City from all over the United States and the world to join in celebrating the milestone anniversary of the world's largest and oldest women's volunteer service organization.

Events ranged from a solemn, yet celebratory, service at the gravesite of GFWC's founder, to a rousing, professionally produced song-and-dance revue spotlighting events from GFWC history.

While they celebrated the past and looked to the future, convention delegates also made history as they voted to alter the name of the organization (to GFWC International), elected officers for 1990-1992, posed for commemorative photographs and honored women of achievement.

It was a convention to remember,

from start to finish. Some delegates arrived early to attend a special memorial-dedication ceremony in Lakewood, New Jersey at the grave of GFWC founder "Jennie June" Croly on Saturday, June 30.

Brunch at Delmonico's

Another sort of "pilgrimage" took place the following day when over 200 members of the GFWC Board of Directors went to Delmonico's, the famous restaurant where GFWC's "mother club" Sorosis held its meetings more than 100 years ago.

August/September 1990

Delmonico's was also the site of a reception at the first GFWC convention on April 24, 1890. Following brunch, the 1990 Board held meetings in the historic, two-story restaurant. A new club was formed during the meeting: Alice's Centennial Angels, composed of the state presidents from 1988-1990.
