HISTORY OF THE ASHEBORO JUNIOR WOMAN'S CLUB

As president of the Asheboro Woman's Club, Mrs. Dan Burns organized a "Junior Woman's Department," which held its first meeting on October 26, 1938, at the home of Mrs. Clarence Lovett. From this nucleus of twenty-six young women grew the Asheboro Junior Woman's Club. For nearly five years the newly organized group remained a "Junior Woman's Department" within the Woman's Club. However in the years 1942-43, the club became federated and started working under its own power.

"Cooperate," this one word with the definition being "to operate together for a common cause," was the motto chosen by the original group. And through the guidance of the first junior president, Mrs. Clarence Lovett, "Cooperate" has been the key to the success of the Asheboro Junior Woman's Club through these many years.

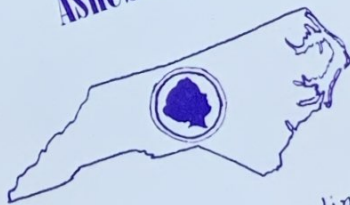
The first projects of the charter group were:

TB SEAL SALE — The first TB Seal Sale campaign, December of 1938, netted \$95.00 and has been a major project of the Junior Club ever since. By 1946-47 this project had grown in such tremendous strides, the Junior Women employed a full time secretary, Mrs. C. W. Hayworth, to assist the club in preparing the campaign. In 1951 under the presidency of Mrs. Charles McFadden, Mrs. Henry Burch as County Chairman and Mrs. Martha Thompson as Secretary succeeding Mrs. Hayworth, the Randolph County Tuberculosis & Health Association was formed. The club continued to sponsor the annual drive. On the merit of the foregoing project, the Asheboro Junior Woman's Club was awarded the Mamie Brown Latham Silver Tray at the annual NCFWC convention for "The Most Outstanding Community Service Project" by a junior club. The 1959 Seal Sale Drive netted almost \$7,000.00.

SAMARCAND — The charter members sent Christmas boxes to Samarcand. From this original project grew the now Butner-Caswell-Samarcand committee. In later years the club included the County Home as a working committee. Throughout these years the club has continued giving presents to the inmates of these three institutions and home. In 1948-49 the club "made history" with its County Home work, a major project during the presidency of Mrs. H. Q. Dorsett. A delegation from the club membership made three trips to Raleigh to appear before groups of the Legislature in a plea to remove the mentally deficient from the County Home. At first the efforts were primarily for the local Home, but as interest grew throughout the state, the plea was for more adequate facilities at the state mental institutions to care for an alarming number of improperly cared for mentally deficient all over North Carolina. This work was carried on through the leadership of Mrs. Russell Walker, chairman of the Welfare Committee and Mrs. W. P. Wood, spokesman for the groups in Raleigh. The club has done many other things to improve the conditions at the County Home including buying new equipment and replacing old equipment. As a result of the County Home project, the club was awarded first place in citizenship at the NCFWC convention in 1949. In 1950 the club won \$100 as first place in the Class C division of the national "Build a Better Community Contest" and also the Sweepstakes prize of \$200 for the best project in the state. This contest was sponsored by the GFWC and the Kroger Company and the awards were presented to the Asheboro Juniors at the NCFWC convention. Also that year two delegates from the club were sent to the GFWC convention in Boston to receive a "Certificate of Achievement" for being national winners in the "Build a Better Community" contest. The Asheboro Junior Woman's Club was one of the top 18 in the nation and the only North Carolina Club to receive national recognition.

PROVIDE MILK FOR UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILDREN — Sixteen children at the Balfour School benefited from the milk program set up by the original group. In 1951 an amount in excess of \$2300 was raised by the Juniors and given to the Asheboro City School Board to be used for the Fayetteville Street School Cafeteria.





J. Hyatt Hammond Speaks To Asheboro Junior Woman's Club

Local architect J. Hyatt Hammond spoke to the Asheboro Junior Woman's Club on "Residential Interiors" at the September meeting held Thursday night at the home of Mrs. John Randolph Ingram on Sunset Avenue.

Mr. Hammond, introduced by the American Home Committee Chairman, Mrs. William J. Trogdon, followed the evolution of modern architecture and pointed out the essentials in planning a modern, well organized home. He described the many different uses of textures and finishes that are being used today that make the modern home's upkeep at a minimum in cost and maintenance. After emphasizing the advantages of "open living" and how at the same time privacy could be obtained by the use of skillfully designed screens and folding doors, he concluded his speech with a question and answer session.

The Junior Woman's Club assisted the hospital by furnishing the help in providing the children's entertainment and purchasing or securing small articles of clothing and toiletries. Future prospect for this project is that it will be the first step in organizing a "Pink Ladies League," a hospital auxiliary for Asheboro.

The meeting was closed after the club voted to wire Miss North Carolina a telegram with the Junior Clubbers' best wishes.

United Fund Drive Extended For One Week

The United Fund of Greater Asheboro has extended its fund campaign for one week to enable volunteer workers to complete their canvassing of businesses, industries and residents of the Asheboro community.

Cleveland Thayer and Bob Cross, co-chairmen of the fund drive, said Monday that reports of progress had been received from less than one-half of the groups of workers. Reports have been submitted by 33 groups, leaving 54 yet to report.


Contributions at the Monday meeting indicated that a total of \$33,393.61 had been reported of the goal of \$52,083.64.

Bad weather which hampered workers in making contacts and the fact that a number of industries were waiting until Thursday payday to inaugurate the payroll deduction plan caused the officials to approve extension of the fund campaign.

Meanwhile, members of the Junior Woman's Club have begun a house-to-house canvass in an attempt to reach all families who have not contributed through their places of employment. All homes which are not displaying the United Fund emblem will be visited by the teams of Junior Women.

The final report for United Fund volunteers is scheduled for 11 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 26. At that time officials hope to complete the campaign.

At the same time United Fund volunteers urged all citizens of the Asheboro community to contribute generously to the fund to aid the member organizations. "We certainly would regret having to cut down on the budgetary needs of the many member agencies," they commented.



Junior Women Will Conduct UF House Drive

The Junior Woman's Club, under the direction of Mrs. William Miller, chairman of the United Fund's women's division, will stage a house-to-house drive next week, in order to give citizens not contacted during the business and industrial canvass an opportunity to contribute to the support of those agencies represented by the United Fund. The effort will probably start on October 20th, at which time the workers will call on all residences not displaying one of the United Fund stickers in the front window, Mrs. Miller said.

The United Fund stickers will be given to each contributor during the business and industrial drive which started this morning with a kick-off breakfast for workers.

Miss Harriet Thymes, Guest Speaker For Jr. Woman's Club

The Asheboro Junior Woman's Club proclaimed its October meeting, held last Thursday evening at the home of Mrs. Max Redding on High street, as "Children's Home Society Night." Guest speaker was Miss Harriet Thymes, director of the Children's Home Society in Greensboro.

A baby shower was also a main event. The club members brought nursery items and infant clothing that were placed in a large gift wrapped box that will be presented to the Children's Home later this month.

Miss Thymes, introduced by Mrs. Merle T. Kelley, state advisory committee member of the Children's Home Society, spoke to the club on the Society's service as an adoption agency.

She reported that in North Carolina that between 7,000 and 8,600 children are in the care of public and private agencies. From this alarming amount of children separated from family living, 3,500 could have been or should have been adopted. Yet, about only 1,600 will be adopted. In pointing out why so few adoptions go through, Miss Thymes gave actual case histories of the complications legal and environmental problems entail.

Miss Thymes explained how the Children's Home Society, through its 60 years of service, has given its assistance as an adoption agency. She emphasized how important volunteer help has been to the Home. Besides the free service extended to the children by the medical doctors, the Children's Home Society is one of the major state

projects supported by the more than 100 federated Junior Woman's Clubs in North Carolina.

Arrangements for this program were made by the Children's Home Society committee chairman, Mrs. Clarence C. Cranford, Jr.

Also speaking to the club were Cleveland Thayer, representing the United Fund, who instructed the group on the canvassing they are planning to do for the drive, and Mrs. Bertha Fitzgerald, representing the B&PW club, who showed the birthday calendars her club is selling.

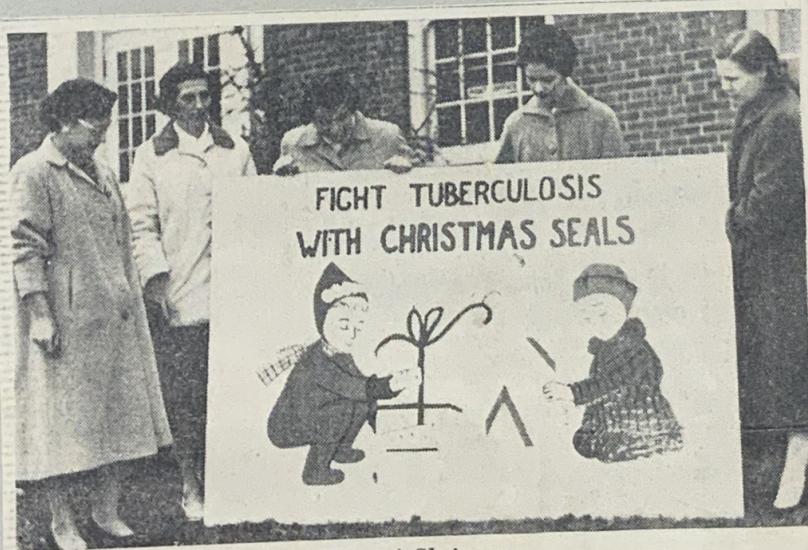

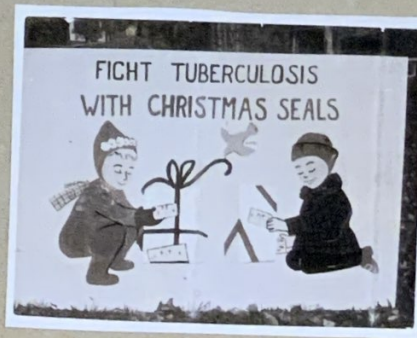

Try To Get Mentally Retarded Inmates Moved Asheboro Junior Woman's Club Takes Up 11-Year-Crusade At County Home

ASHEBORO, Feb. 17—Asheboro Junior Woman's Club has re-asserted its support to have the mentally retarded at the Randolph County Home entered in state institutions. This action came at the regular monthly meeting last night.

An all-out effort more than 11 years ago finally failed. Local women have continued their interest in Caswell Training School and now the Murdoch School at Butner. They have continued with their gifts to those who have been taken there for care and training.

Dozens of letters, three trips to the Legislature in 1949, many letters from and to governors and officials connected with the state institutions and state senators, attest to the untiring efforts of the local woman's club to gain help, for not only their own indigent people, but for those of the 100 counties in North Carolina.

Today another letter has gone forward to Gov. Luther Hodges,

following the reopening of the case on behalf of these "children" who are now more than 20 years old.

Mrs. Max H. Redding, chairman of the Caswell-Murdoch Committee has rekindled a spark of hope in the hearts of local commissioners, welfare department officials and others that perhaps this time, definite results will come from their efforts.

In 1949, three delegations from 15 to 20 women appeared before the Legislature. Some results were gained from these efforts, but not until August of 1959—10 years later, was even one of the original five mentally retarded patients, removed from Randolph County Home for the Aged.

As a result of these visits to the Legislature, County Commissioners went on record as being willing to pay \$25.00 a month toward the upkeep of these inmates in state institutions. This offer brought editorial comments from many papers, asking why a county had to pay to have its mental-

ly deficient patients properly taken care of.

Countless newspaper articles followed the crusade made by the Asheboro Club. The appropriation of \$10,500,000 was released and the 1949 General Assembly appropriated an additional \$11,387,138 for the building program for mental patients. Two buildings were built providing 400 additional beds, then three more providing 1,130 beds and 70 beds were added to Caswell Training School. Five children were admitted from Randolph but only one from those kept at Randolph Home for the Aged.

The local club women made the front cover of the North Carolina Club Woman and received the Cornelia Petty Jarman Silver Basket for their work in the citizenship department of the local club at the 1949 Woman's Club Convention in Goldsboro.

The late Gov. Kerr Scott appointed a committee to make a study of county and state conditions in order to define the responsibility for the aged as

between the state and the county.

Following these gains in their efforts on state level, these women turned their energy toward the local Home, which they had found to be in "horrible" condition. These young mothers were appalled at conditions then existing in the county home.

These young women gained help from county commissioners who painted the buildings, recovered the floors, then they refurnished and decorated the sitting room. Eventually they gave a radio, which enabled these people to enjoy music and news features, adding greatly to their enjoyment of life.

Many other projects have been carried on over the years to help these and other unfortunate peoples, but the fight to get these four children into better prepared homes, has remained just where they found it in 1949.

These young women are again asking why? What is the reason we are being turned down, not once but over and over,

Jr. Woman's Club Lends Support To Move Retarded From Home

The Asheboro Junior Woman's Club, at the regular meeting last Thursday evening held at the home of Mrs. Charles J. Bossong, pledged their full support to the Randolph County Officials in their efforts to place the mentally retarded at the County Home in the proper state institutions.

Mrs. Max Redding, chairman of the Caswell-Murdock-Butner Committee, reviewed the club's previous efforts to have these mental patients entered in the state's mental hospitals. Eleven years ago a delegation from the Junior Woman's Club appeared before the Legislature and Senate committees in Raleigh to have these patients transferred from the County Home to state facilities. Even though it was stated at these 1949 meetings that these mentally retarded persons would be taken care of

by 1950, the unsuitable situation at the County Home has not been relieved. Each year since then the club has written letters and made personal visits to state officials, yet every effort has been rejected.

Mrs. Richard Kemp, chairman of the County Home Committee, further reported on the poor situation for these patients at the home. From her committee's frequent visits to the County Home, they have found that these patients have to be confined to one room and cannot have visitors or participate in anyway with the other inmates activities. "These patients have been classified as untrainable and can only be given proper care by state institutions," Mrs. Kemp concluded.

"Not until this past week have these cases been reopened in the state press since the 1949 efforts," Mrs. Redding said. In order to keep this immediate need open to the public, the club voted to reassert their support to have the mentally retarded at the County Home entered in the proper state institutions.

The business session was presided over by the president, Mrs. Adam Beck. The club voted Mrs. Harold Briles into membership in the club. Mrs. William Young was also accepted into membership as a transfer from the Mebane Junior Woman's Club.

After refreshments, served by the hostesses, Mrs. William Ward, Mrs. Walter Ward, and Mrs. William Raker, the club discussed projects for the coming club year.

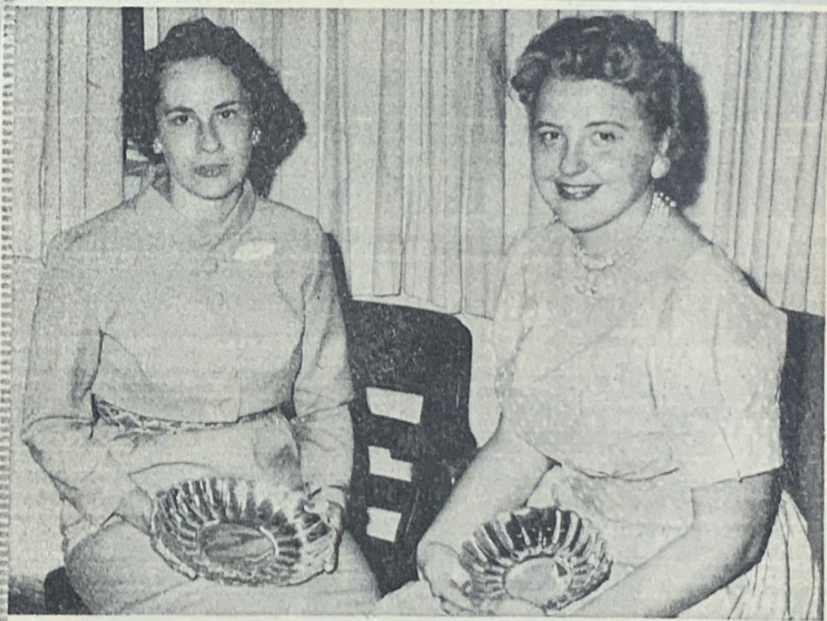
Dinner was served buffet style and the dining table was
