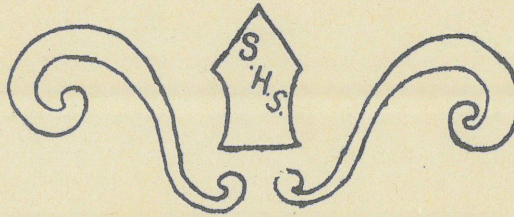

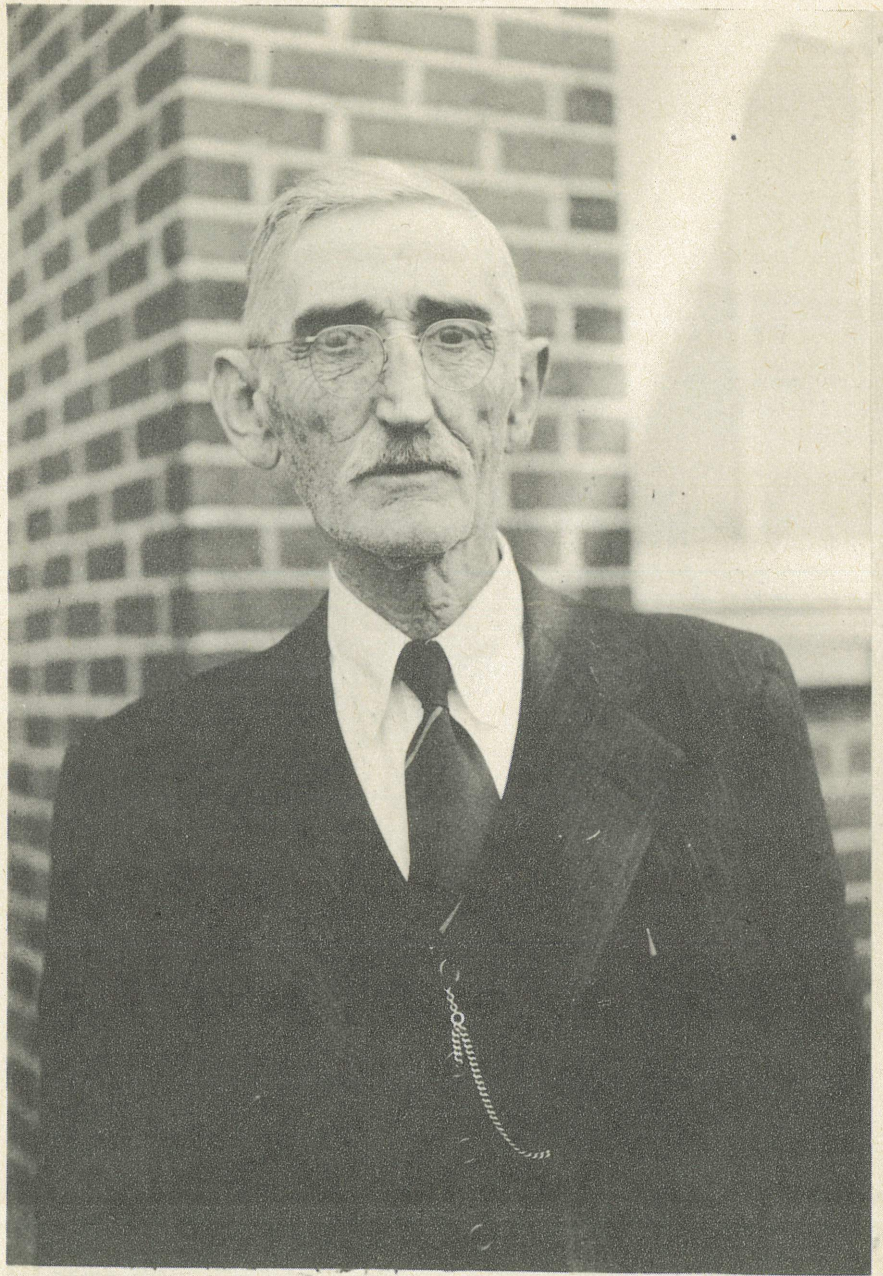

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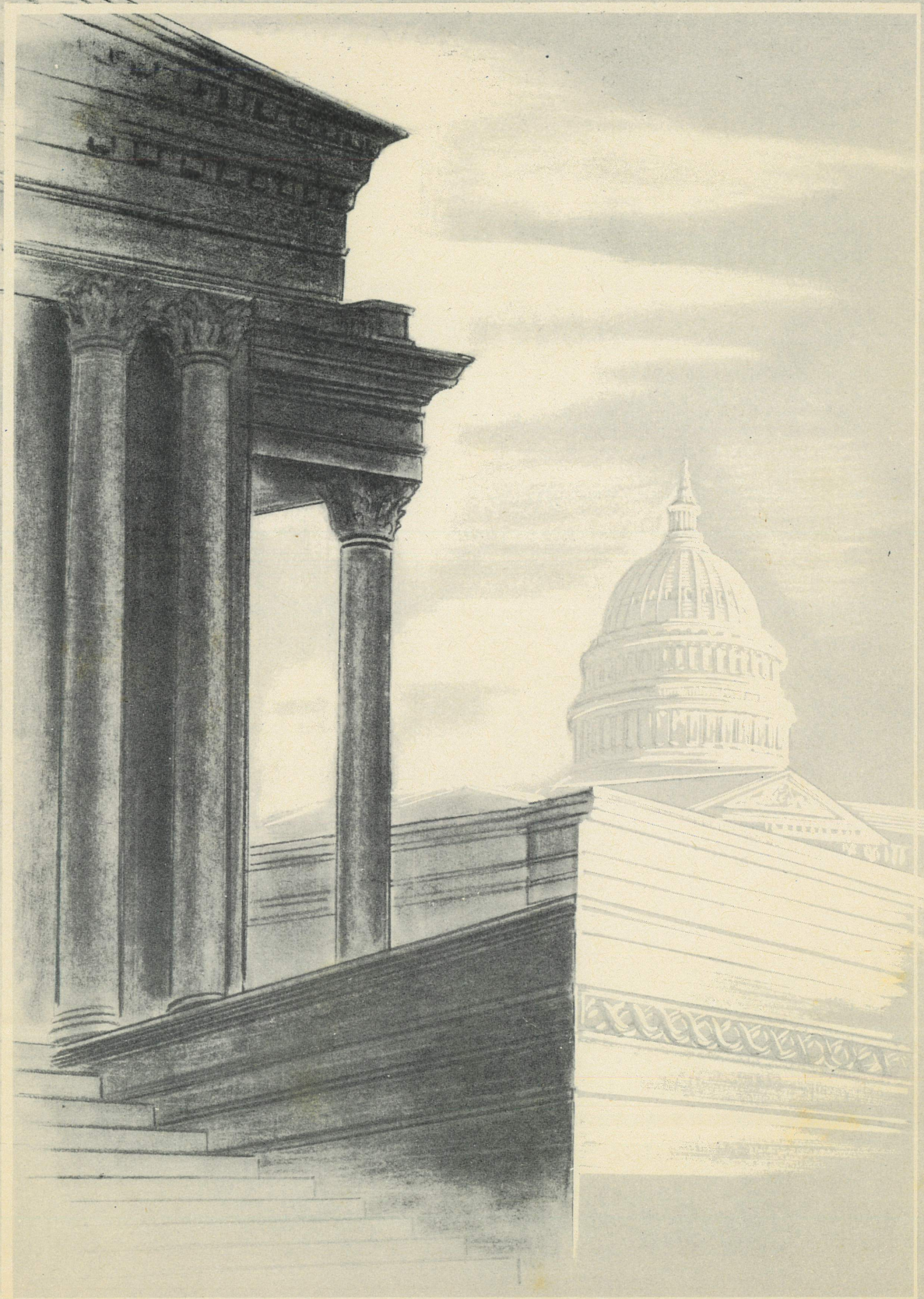
DEDICATION

Mr. Staley has been a leader in education for more than half a century. He never fails to encourage and help Staley School in any way. He has been an inspiration to both teachers and students.

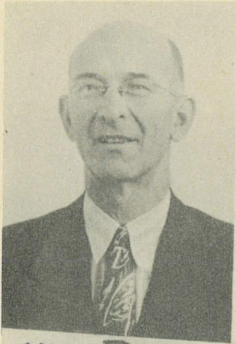
This book would not be complete without him. He is known and loved by every child in school.

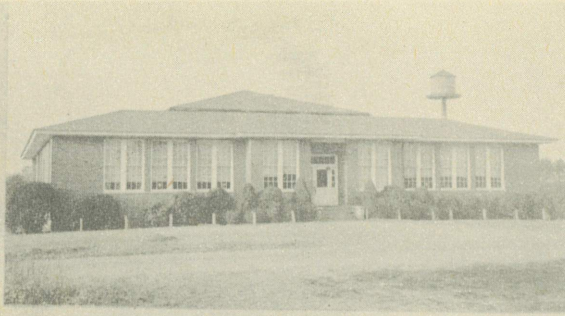
For these and other things that have made you what you are to Staley School we dedicate to you, Mr. Staley, this our 1945 Staley Reminiscences.

"Shorty"



"Smitty"





Nina Alice Teague wills her silly giggles to Gwendolyn Edwards.




As we leave our principal and other teachers, we think of the things that they have done for us. To them we are grateful. We know that there have been times when we have tried their patience.
