Food writer Sheri Castle to share Southern cooking stories

♣ Blending storytelling, humor and culinary expertise, award-winning food writer Sheri Castle will share stories about Southern cuisine and its cultural impact at 7 p.m. Wednesday, November 13, at the Asheboro library.

Her appearance is sponsored by the Friends of the Library. It's free and the public is invited.

Castle, author of *The New Southern Garden Cookbook* among more than a dozen other cookbooks, will tell stories and reflect on the roles that food traditions play in Southern families, lives, history and culture.

A contributing editor for *Southern Living* magazine who writes regularly for a number of magazines and newspapers, Castle is the subject of five short documentaries on Southern food produced by A Spoken Dish, a storytelling project of the Southern Foodways Alliance. She also is a popular speaker and demo chef at culinary events across the South and is asked to cook on television from time to time.

Her cooking classes garner a loyal following. Adventurous life inspired by library

♣ **A major gift from Betty Jean Varner Webster will enhance the Randleman Public Library's children's book collection for the next 10 years.**

Rather than earning accolades for her generosity, however, Webster wants her gift to inspire other donors to give so the Randleman library will continue to serve the community and make a difference in the lives of young people for many years to come.

Webster's \$50,000 gift will provide \$5,000 each year over 10 years for the purchase of children's books.

"Betty Jean Varner Webster's long term gift will ensure the children and teen areas of the Randleman Public Library will be consistently filled with books that will spark learning and ignite dreams in the minds of children of all ages," Randleman Library Director Donna Toomes says.

This latest donation is on top of \$15,000 in gifts Betty Jean and her husband Paul have made to the Randleman library over the last two years.

The Websters' first donation in 2017 provided an additional 750 children's books for the library and led to the creation of "Betty Jean's Corner" — a nook with cozy furniture where children can share Betty Jean's experience with books.

and a desire to ensure the library continues to have the impact on young people it had on her. Donna Toomes relates Webster's story in a narrative placed in Betty Jean's Corner (summarized here):

Through her childhood and teen years, books carried Betty Jean to a world far away. These adventures — lived out in a quiet corner of the Randleman library — ultimately led her to seek opportunities beyond her home town.

While pursuing a career in nursing, she met and married Paul Webster and their adventures in life took them to Texas, France, Minnesota, North Carolina, Georgia and, finally, Lancaster, South Carolina.

Through all of those adventures, Betty Jean never forgot the Randleman library and the role it played in her later successes and overall contentment with life. With her gift, Betty Jean wants to help today's youth have the same opportunity to see a world beyond their everyday life.

Asheboro launches in-house laptop lending

♣ **Computer users at the Asheboro library now can check out laptop computers for use anywhere in the library.**

Ten laptops are available for anyone with a library card or REAL2 student ID who is 16 or older, or 11-15 with parental authorization to access the Internet at the library. The library card or student ID must be in good standing, with less than \$5 in fees and fines.

The laptops can be checked out from the Circulation desk for the day, but must be returned by 30 minutes before closings.

Depending on how demand develops, a waiting list system may be established and stricter checkout time limits put in place.

The laptops feature WIFI printing and are available with a power cord and a mouse on request. To protect patron privacy, all information from a previous use is erased when the laptop is shut down or restarted.

Needless to say, there's a stiff fine for laptops not returned or removed from the library.

If laptop lending is well-received at Asheboro, it will be expanded to other branches.

♣ Researcher of the Bigfoot phenomenon will share findings about the presence of the elusive creature in western North Carolina, and also discuss sightings in the Uwharrie Mountains, in "Bigfoot at a Glance," 6:30 p.m. Monday, November 18, at the Asheboro library.

The talk is free and the public is invited.

John Bruner, a Bigfoot researcher for over 40 years, started Bigfoot 911 in 2014 in Marion, N.C., to document the presence of the creature in McDowell



County. He was instrumental in establishing the Western North Carolina Bigfoot Festival in Marion, now in its second year.

During the talk, he will show documents and other evidence from the Native American era to the present demonstrating the existence of Bigfoot.


Bruner will be joined by Lee Woods, a Randolph County native who has spent more than 11 years researching the presence of a Bigfoot in the Uwharrie Mountains.
