SELECTION OF PROJECT

Archdale and Trinity are in a rapidly growing area outside the city of High Point, North Carolina, but in a different county, Randolph. The city of Archdale has only been incorporated for a few years.

Outside of the local schools there are no public recreational areas in the community. There are approximately 4400 students in the 6 afea schools.

Several years ago a group of concerned citizens recognized a need in the Archdale Trinity area and joined together to raise funds to build a community park. From the first the members of the Archdale Trinity Woman's Club were involved in the park project and a club member, Linda Game, served as the club's representative on the park committee. In January of 1977 the mayor of Archdale presented the plans for the park to the club.

In 1977 a local resident donated 18 acres to be used for the park and the committee applied for a federal grant to help in building the park.

In the spring of 1978 the Archdale Trinity Woman's Club had finished up their Community Improvement Project for 1976-78 and felt that work with the new park should be their project for 1978-80. We consulted with the park committee and learned that plans were being made for the ballfield, tennis courts, multi-purpose court, restrooms, and picnic area, but no one was working on a playground for the children in our community. Our club members felt that since there was no play-

ground for the over 4,000 children in our community that this was the area in which we could help the community best.

In March of 1978 we voted to adopt as our CIP project the building of a children's playground at the new park in Archdale.

Mayor Lloyd Taylor Reviews Park Plans For A-T Woman's Club

Mayor Lloyd Taylor of Archdale outlined tentative plans for a community park at the Wednesday meeting of the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club held at Holiday Inn Downtown.

Mr. Taylor displayed an architect's sketch of proposed development of the 18 acres given to the city by Bill Aldridge. The park will include a ball field, tot lot, tennis and multi-purpose courts, nature trail and family picnic areas.

Taylor said the city hopes to begin work on the park before summer, with plans to have it partially developed for use by the summer of 1978. He urged members to support the project and keep the vision alive so the park will become a reality.

Mrs. Robert Hammer, president, conducted the business session which followed lunch.

Mrs. Charles Game, arts chairman, urged members to bring crafts which they have made during the past year to the February meeting to be entered in the District 7 Arts Festive in High Point on Feb. 26. She announced that a number of students from Trinity High School will compete also. Sewing contestants will be judged at the school Feb. 3.

Members selected Mrs. John Stunda, district president, as its nominee for the Minnie Lou Parker Creech General Clubwoman of the Year Award.

Tentative plans were made for the club's annual benefit fashion show. According to Mrs. Irvin Newberry, ways and means chairman, the event is scheduled tentatively for March 17. Proceeds will be used for the club's community projects.

The education chairman, Mrs. Bobby Clodfelter, announced that the club will sponsor a contestant in the Sallie Southall Cotten Scholarship Contest.

Hostesses from the club for the Golden Age Club meeting on Jan. 26 will be Mrs. Stunda, Mrs. Darrell Frye, Mrs. Cliff Summey and Mrs. Allen Hodges.

Park Project

Park Group Opens Fund Campaign

It's been a long road since April of 1974 but last night the Archdale Community Park Committee took toward definitive steps producing a real community recreation area on the 18acre lot located just south of the Archdale City Limits, off U.S. 311 and Mose Drive. The group of concerned citizens working with the Archdale City Council's Parks and Recreation Committee began planning for construction of some of the priority projects at the site, including tennis courts, and then a ball park, multi-purpose court, restrooms and parking area.

There is about \$20,000 now available in the park fund from a federal grant of \$60,-000 and the committee lost no time in designating committee member Austin Hunt to begin plans for tennis courts, three at least, and perhaps more. According to Opal Dehart, public relations chairman, there might even be courts ready for use this

This week work resumed on the paving of access streets to the park by the City of Archdale. Bad weather had hindered progress of this part of the project earlier in the month. And soon, says Councilman Bruce Lance, the park sign will be installed on the site.

The committee was spurred to new activity in early March when a new gift was made to the city of a tract of land adjoining the site by Dixie Container Corporation. The land gift is a 75 by 200 foot tract which will serve as an entrance from U.S. 311 to the park property. (The addition is not shown on the map pictured at Left, but is directly below the area presently marked 'parking' next to the bleachers for the ballfield.)

Mrs. Swidersky, whose family plans to return to the Archdale area within a year, is as determined as ever to see her own dream for a park become reality.

"If you could see this beautiful park, it has a swimming pool, and so many other facilities. I know we can do the same in the Archdale-Trinity area." One of her ideas is to have a Park Day, where all the civic organizations in the community set up booths to raise funds, with local bands playing, and the general balloons popping, hot dogs sizzling, and of course, a parade.

Her enthusiasm, says committee member Opal Dehart, just as and contagious as it was when Mrs. Swidersky lived in Archdale. "We have all gotten excited all over again, and I know that with the help of the community we are going to have a really fine park," Mrs. Dehart said.

Besides helping to make plans for the \$20,000 now available, the committee is also laying out a large fundraising drive which will include the assistance of the Burger King on South Main Street. From May 5-11 Burger King has promised part of the profits to be turned over to the park fund.



FUND RAISING

Early projections by the Park Committee were that the "Tot Lot" equipment would cost approximately \$6,000. A federal grant had been obtained which would match any money donated or spent on the park. This meant that our club needed to raise \$3,000 in order to build the "Tot Lot".

The Archdale Trinity Woman's Club greeted their new project with enthusiasm. The Ways and Means Chairman immediately began planning a fashion show and dinner and clubmembers began selling tickets and contacting local merchants for door prizes.

The Ways and Means Committee sought to promote the new park in the community by making "A Day in the Park" the theme of the fashion show. They decorated with red and white checkered table-clothes and put a pot of red geraniums on each table.

Preliminary plans and sketches of the park were obtained and put on display to help better inform local citizens about the park. The chairman of the park committee, David Dickerson, acted as M.C. for the evening and he also gave information about the park to those attending.

We felt the fashion show and dinner not only raised money for the children's playground we were building but also increased

the community's awareness of the overall park project.

One club member, Kay McDowell, donated a crocheted afghan which she had made to be raffled off to help raise money for the project.

The event was well attended and the club raised over \$1000.00 for the project.

In 1979 the Ways and Means Committee decided the fashion show idea was a successful one and they proceeded with plans for another similar show and dinner. By this time the park had been named so the theme of the fashion show was "A Day at Creekside". Several stores from High Point volunteered to help with the fashion show and it was once again an enjoyable evening for all and another \$1,000 was raised for our project.

PLANNING THE PLAYGROUND

The project was developed by ten clubmembers who volunteered to serve on a playground committee. Chairman was Judy Millikan who was serving as chairman of the Conservation Department.

These committee members took their children to playgrounds in nearby cities and observed which equipment was most popular and best suited for their children. They worked with Archdale city manager, Dalton Fulcher, in contacting firms that sell playground equipment and they obtained catalogs and price lists from these companies. They visited the park site to see what type of terrain the playground would be on.

After studying the preliminary plans of the park and the terrain of the park site, the club members and the park committee members decided that the site of the Tot Lot should be moved away from its original site next to the access road where children might be endangered by cars entering and leaving the park. A decision was made to move the lot to an area next to the picnic area where parents could observe the playground while sitting at the picnic area. This area would also be away from traffic.

The committee met on several occasions to plan the playground and chose the equipment for it. The main considerations in chosing equipment was safety and durability. The committee received advice from the city manager before making their selections.

The committee decided that the playground should have two

main areas. One should be a play area for preschoolers with smaller equipment especially designed for them and this area should be closest to the picnic area so they could be watched by parents. The other area should have larger equipment that would be enjoyable for older children.

Equipment chosen for the toddler's area included a small swing set with 6 swings equipped with slash proof rubber seats, a toddlers slide and 4 spring horses. Also to be included in this area were a sand box and large rubber tires to be partially buried.

Between the toddlers area and the area for older children was to be placed a tilt-a-whirl and gym bars.

The playground for the older children was to include three ten foot swings and three twelve foot swings, a twelve foot slide, and a six foot wave slide, also two four unit see-saws and a physical fitness challenge course.

Equipment for the playground was to come from two companies, Mircale, Inc. and Mexico Forge. These companies were chosen because of the cost and durability of their equipment.

Creekside Park Gets

The Archdale Park Fund has a new name this week and it is also about \$3,500 richer than last.

At last week's City Council meeting in Archdale Councilman Bruce Lance announced the new name, Creekside Park, for the community park under construction off of Highway 311, south of Archdale at Aldridge Road.

Then on July 27 he announced that the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club has promised \$3,000 for the design and construction of the park's Tot Lot. Club president Sarah Newberry appeared at the Wednesday night meeting of the Creekside Park Committee to announce the club support of the project.

The club will select the

equipment to be used for the Tot Lot. It was also discussed at the meeting that the lot should be moved some distance farther into the park away from Highway 311.

According to committee secretary Barbara Hoover another area club has promised monetary support of the park. The Archdale-Trinity Jaycees have placed \$500 in their 1979 budget for the park project.

Lance reported that the grading of the park entrance is complete and that work has begun on the baseball diamond. Bids are to be let in the near future for construction of tennis courts. The committee is operating with about \$20,000 now available from a \$60,000 federal park grant.

Creekside Park

The Archdale City Council the courts should be ready in awarded two contracts Monday afternoon for building projects at Creekside Park south of Archdale.

The low bid for construction of four tennis courts was submitted by Tarheel Construction Company. The \$19,571 project should be under way within 20 days and about two months.

E.E. Younts submitted the low bid of \$33,260 for construction of picnic shelters, restrooms and maintenance building.

The park budget is a total \$120,000 and this week's outlays bring projected spending to about \$15,000 over the budget. However, according to City Manager Dalton Fulcher, spending in other areas have proved lower than expected. Grading, for example, was projected for an outlay of \$9,-000 and Fulcher said that Archdale maintenance crews have been able to complete it for about \$4,500.

There have been several gifts to the park including an initial \$1,000 by the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club.

The Community Park Fund has also managed to gather nearly all of a promised \$10 .-000 raised by various projects. According to Fulcher,

if the park committee's weekend concert Sept 23 has a good turnout, then the fund will have exceeded its goal.

Also, money earmarked for architectural planning has been dropped from the expense list. Architect Dean Spinks notified the park committee he will donate the fees he will receive for planning the park to the fund. This means that the park fund will

receive more than \$6,000 because the project is eligible for matching funds.

"We're in really good shape financially," Fulcher told the city council members Monday.

The numerous windfalls that have come to the park project were a factor in the council's decision to build four tennis courts instead of the original three courts in the plan. Coach Paul Barnes

of Trinity High School, who has worked closely with the park committee, requested four courts so that the new high school tennis team will have a place to hold tournaments.

Two remaining major expenses for the park are the ball field, with a price tag of \$6,000 and the Tot Lot with \$1,000 already donated by the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club.

PUTTING THE PLANS INTO ACTION

The Creekside Park Committee set the date of July 4th, 1979 as the date of the formal dedication of the new park. Our Playground committee chairman ordered the playground equipment through the city of Archdale and when it arrived it was stored in the city barn. City maintanence workers put some of the equipment together at the barn on days when they did not have city work to do. City employees also cleared the land for the equipment and early in the summer of 1979 they erected the equipment in the new park.

Changes were made in the original plans because some equipment was not available. See-saws were not used because they are under study by federal agencies because they are not considered safe enough. The physical fitness course was eliminated because of lack of open space to put it in.

All of the equipment was paid for through the city of Archdale and the Creekside Park Committee in order to obtain the matching funds provided by a federal grant.

Total cost of the playground equipment was \$4,800.00 of which half or \$2,400.00 was paid by the Archdale Trinity Woman's Club.
