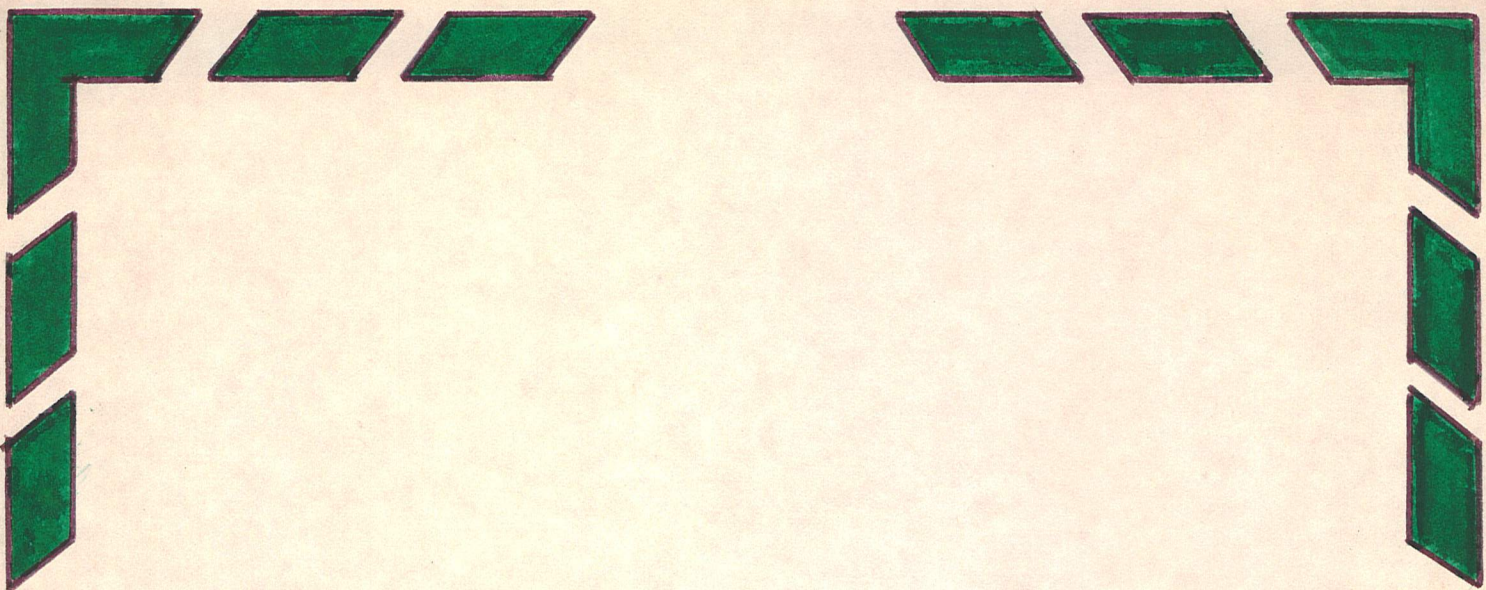

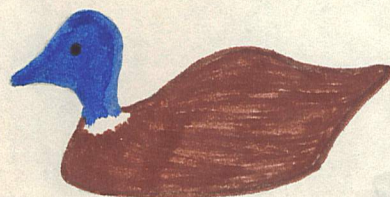

In faith and loyalty.

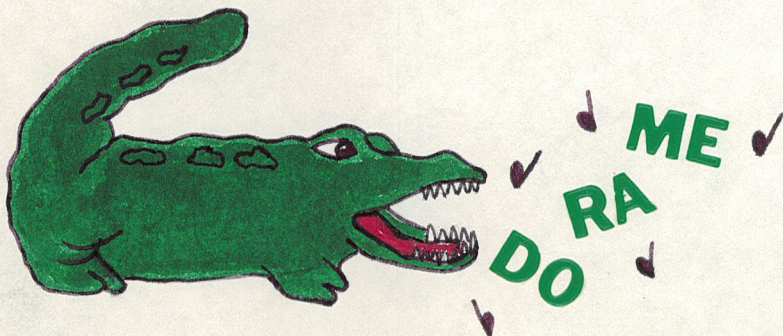
We love our work, no task we shirk,

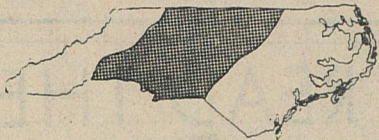
Mrs. Smith announced that Mrs. Linda Huffines, Juniors Club advisor, won second place at the State Juniors Jamboree for Advisor of the Year.

Bill McCaskill of the Randolph County Department of Social Services was guest speaker at a meeting of the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club at Colonial Country Club.

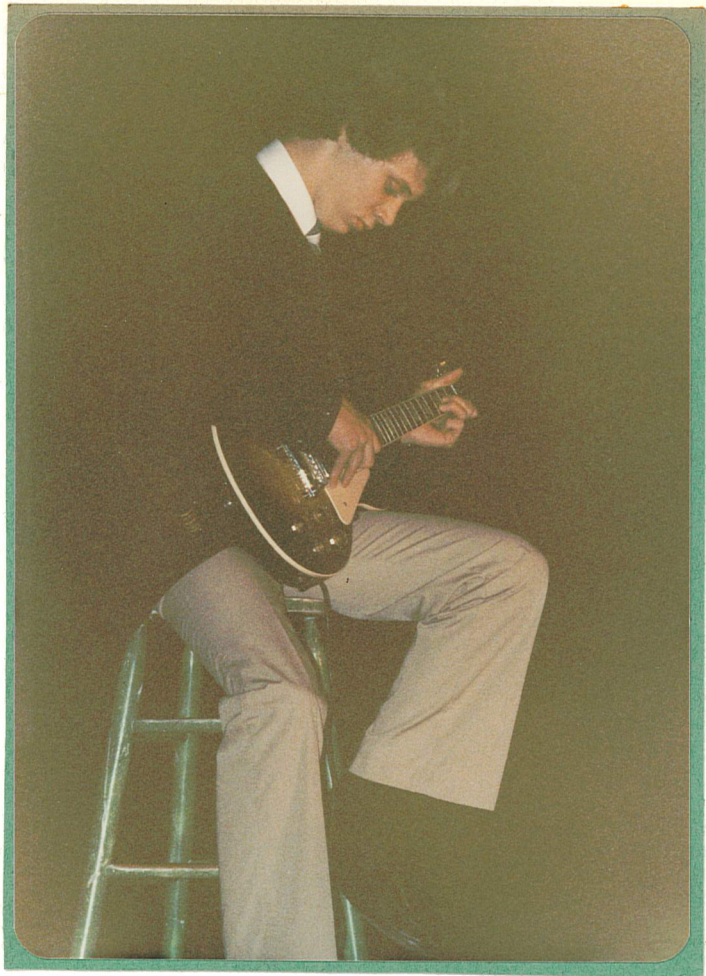

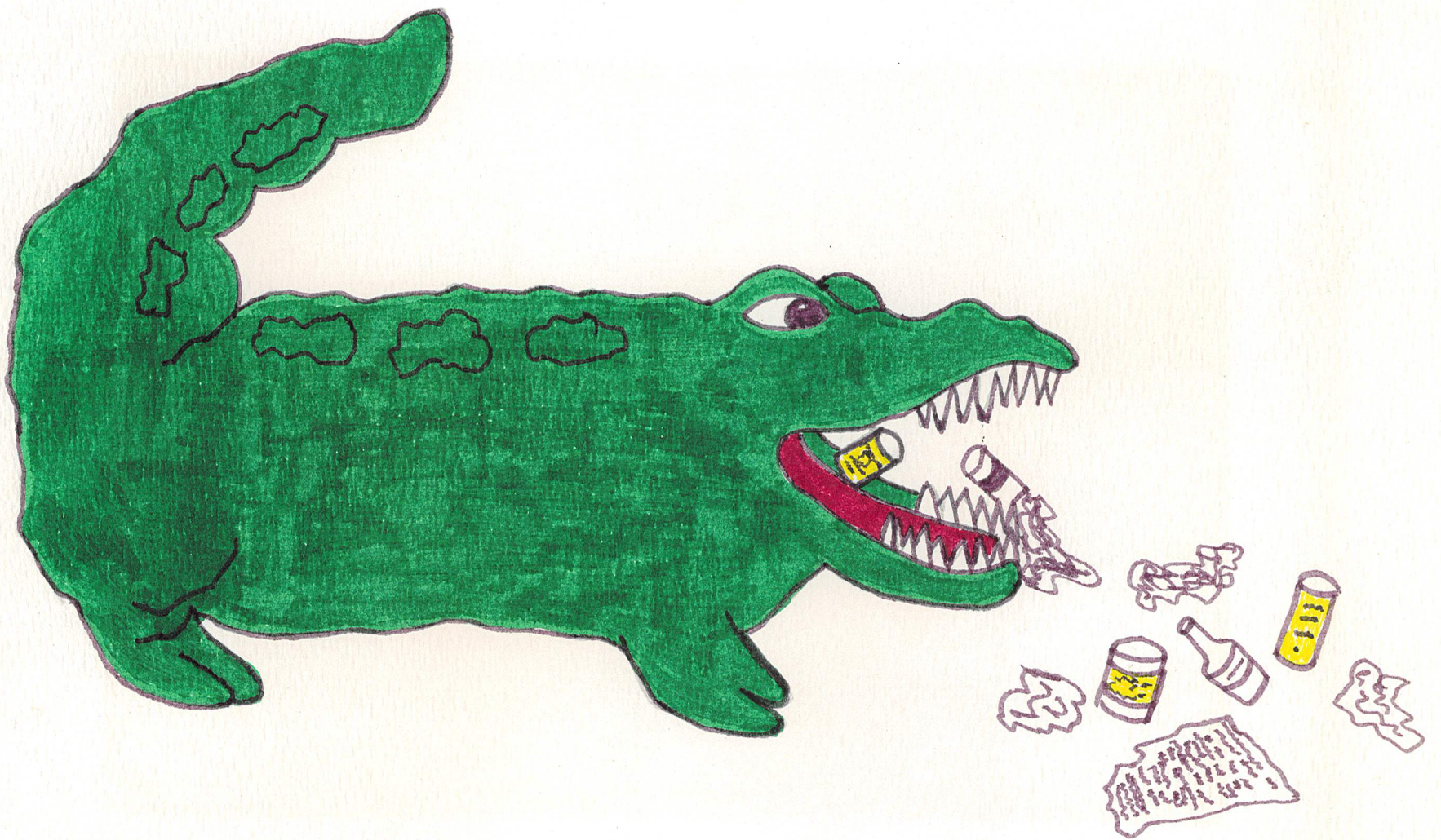

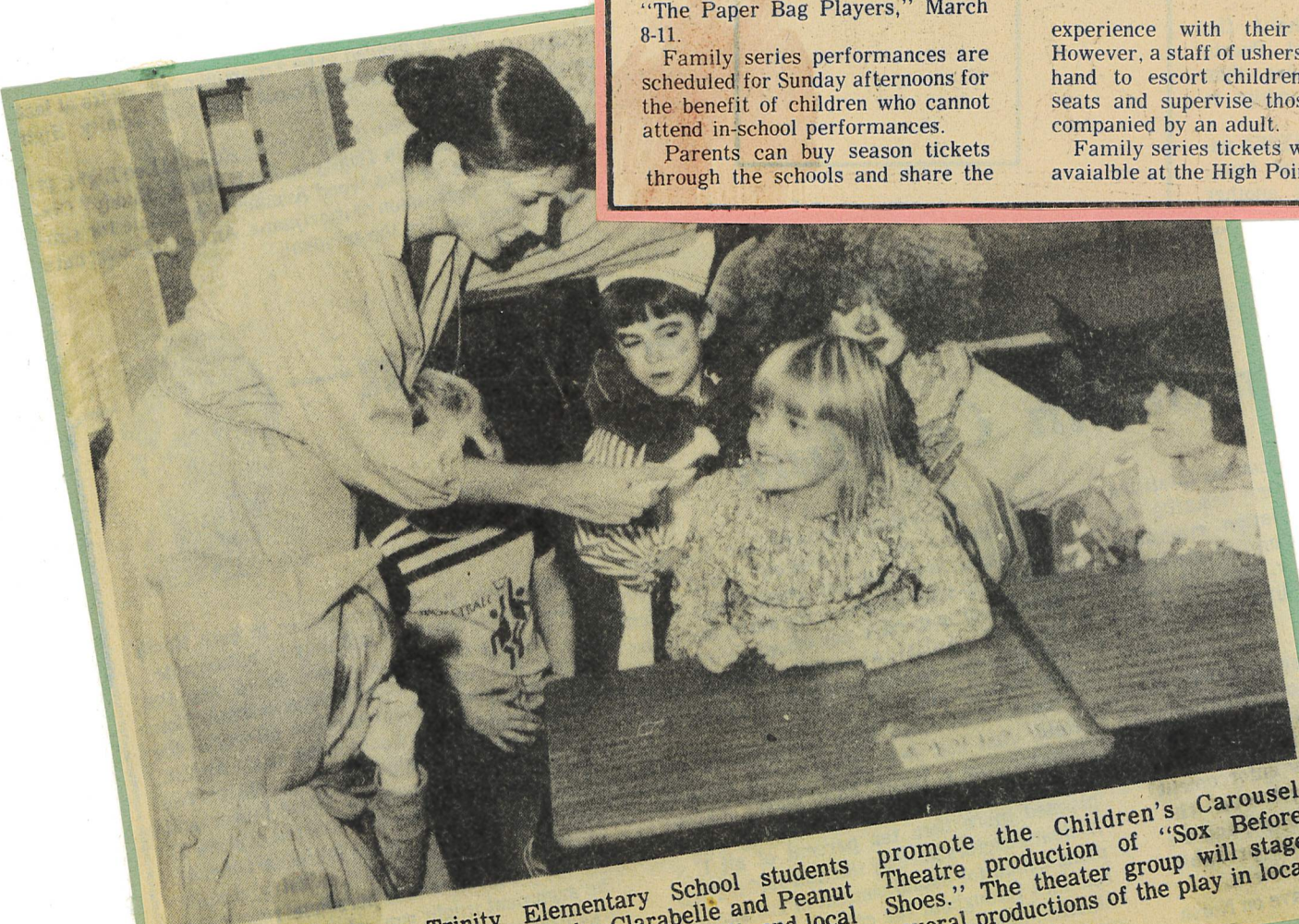
experience with their children. However, a staff of ushers will be on hand to escort children to their seats and supervise those not accompanied by an adult.



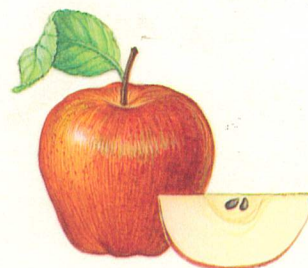

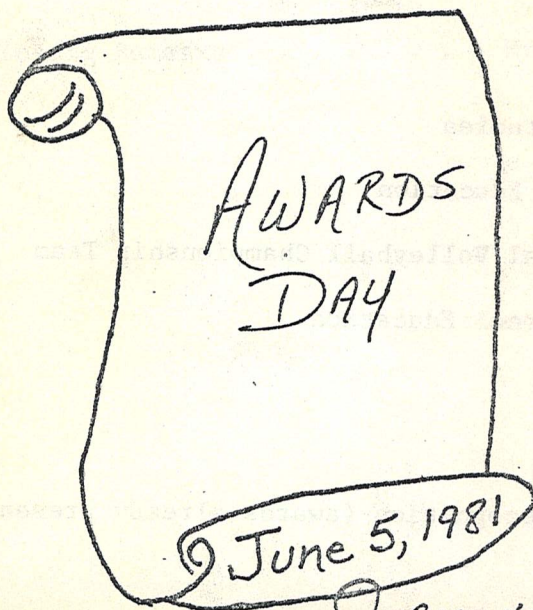
