(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following was sent to members of the Randolph County Board of Education, as well as to local newspapers.)

Dear Board Members:

As residents of the Archdale and Trinity Communities, we are concerned about the lack of progress in the removal of the old Trinity High School building. We feel that the wreckage of the old building is not only unsightly, but a safety hazard to the children who attend Braxton Craven Elementary as well as to the many people who attend events at the nearby Trinity High School stadium. Also, this land is badly needed as a recreation area by Braxton Craven Elementary.

When the building was auctioned off the terms of the agreement were that the building would be cleared off in 90 days. This time period has passed, as have several more months and we see nothing to indicate that

the site will be cleared any time soon.

As members of the Randolph County Board of Education, it is your responsibility to see that this site is cleared promptly. Since the present method of removal is obviously inefficient, we call upon you to take steps to insure that this unsafe and unsightly mess is removed within the next month or at the latest before 1981.

She plans to attend Appalachian State University in the






Arts Festival
