We would like to welcome as a new member Mrs. Donna Overcash.

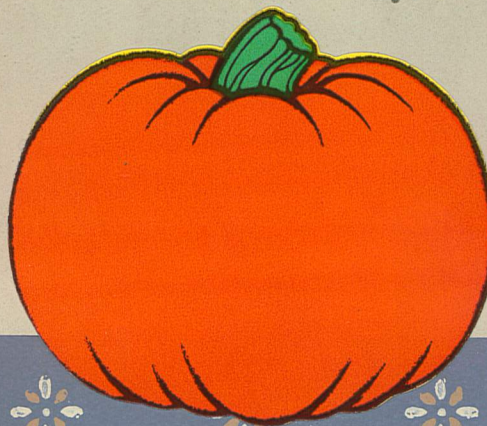

and \$20 for third. Total prize money is \$400. The money for the prizes is donated by the following area businesses, some of whom are repeat sponsors:

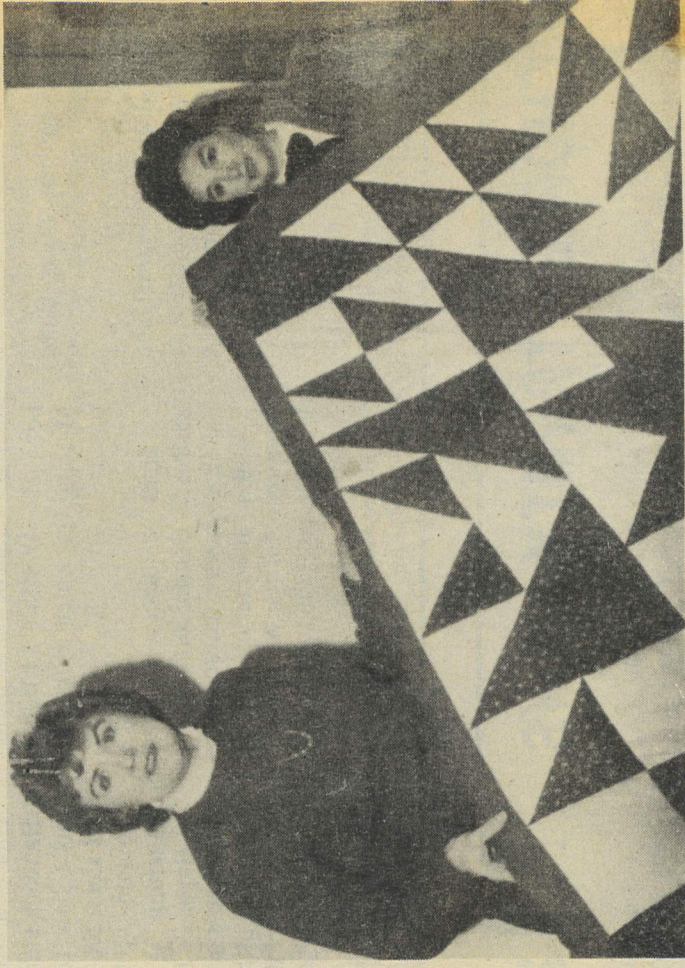

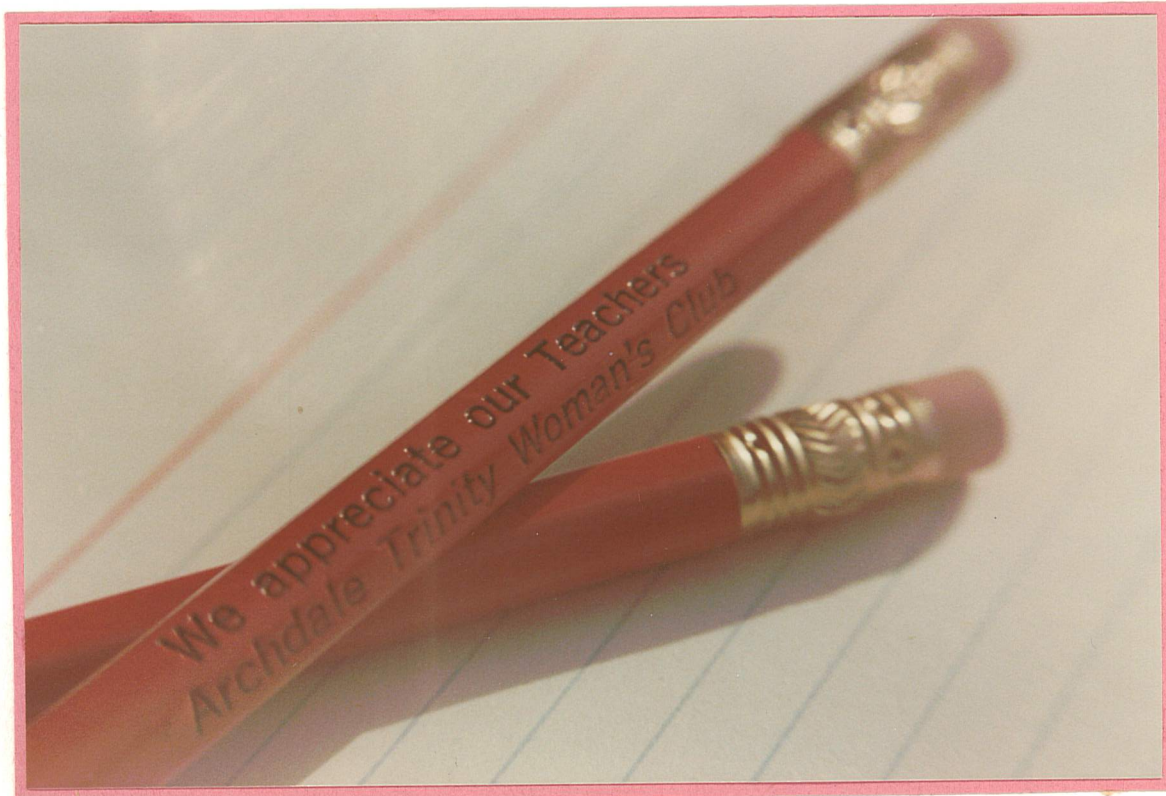
Two plaques were bought, engraved, and presented to the Best All-Around boy and girl at Archdale-Trinity Middle School on Awards Day.

A scholarship grant of \$500.00 designated for Scott Bryson was made to High Point College.



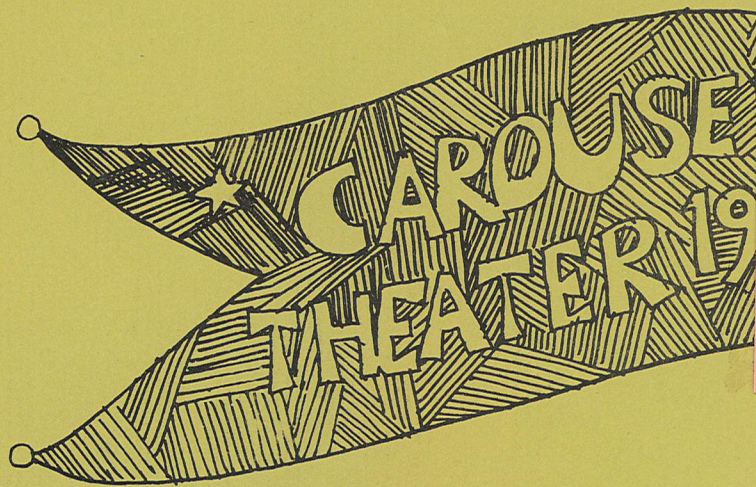

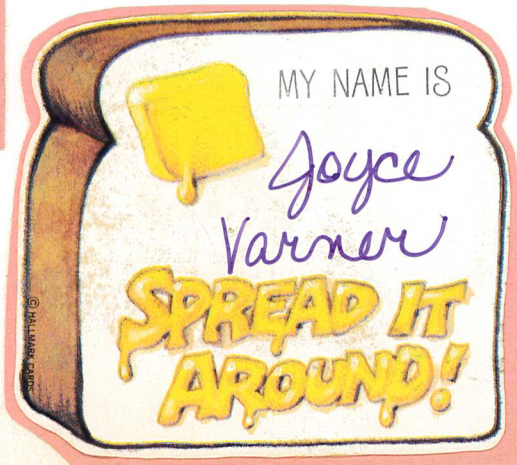
Home-life Chairman Kim Hall planned an evening of fun which included musical chairs, pin the bow on the Christmas tree, refreshments, and a visit from Santa.
