



Mary Hamilton: Pure Energy At 80

She's a petite, fragile-looking woman with a quick smile and delicate features. But don't let that fool you. Mary Wingfield Hamilton is pure energy.

"I never see a dull day," said the 80-year-old Archdale homemaker. "There's so much to do. When people tell me they're bored with life, I just can't understand it."

Mrs. Hamilton received the Madge Kivett Award for Outstanding Service in the community by a Randolph County Senior Adult at an October 11 banquet sponsored by the Asheboro Jaycettes.

"I just couldn't believe it," she said. "I looked at the list of the other nominees, and I just couldn't believe I won." The Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club nominated Mrs. Hamilton for the award, which is based on contribution to the community, evidence of leadership ability



and evidence of personal progress.

The nomination cited her years of involvement with

church and civic activities, including her contributions to the Golden Age Club, which is sponsored by the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club. "She has served the members of that club in many ways," her sponsors stated. "As president; with a telephone ministry; (she has) shared her poems and devotionals, helped to inspire seniors to stay active and interested in life and to reach out to help others"

"That's my aim — to cheer up people," said Mrs. Hamilton, who delivers lively recitations of favorite poetry during her regular visits to area nursing homes. She also keeps in touch with nursing home residents by telephone. "She's always on the phone," said her daughter, Juanita Joy Hamilton of Archdale. "She knows it means a lot to some people just to get a call from someone they know."

Mrs. Hamilton is an active member of Trindale Baptist Church, where she is assistant superintendent of the Children's Department. In 1979 she organized the Trindale Senior Club at the church and served as its president for three years. She has taught Bible classes for many years and currently heads up a Sunday school class for teenagers.

Her daughter is director of Child Evangelism in the Archdale-Trinity area.

Mrs. Hamilton is a member and past vice president of the Jolly Sixties, a group of seniors sponsored by the Salvation Army, and was the first president of the Randolph Adult Association in Archdale.

Born in Lynchburg, Va., Mrs. Hamilton traveled across the country with her late husband, Asheboro native Cecil Hamilton, and lived in Portland, Ore., before moving to Archdale, where she has lived for 32 years.

She returns to Virginia each year for her family reunion and sometimes entertains the Wingfield clan (as she calls them) with poems about the childhood experiences of her 12 brothers and sisters. "We have so much fun talking about when we were growing up," she said.

Mrs. Hamilton writes poetry often, sometimes as tributes to friends who have been especially helpful. "She's very creative," said her daughter, Juanita Joy. "She enjoys all sorts of crafts."

"Everybody should know how to do something that interests them," Mrs. Hamilton said, "so that when they get older and retire, they won't be bored. People should stay busy."

And, despite arthritis in her back, Mary Hamilton stays busy, and hopes others her age don't "lose interest in life."

"Seniors have so much to give," she said, "so much to teach others."

#### COMMUNITY SERVICE

The community service projects of the Archdale-Trinity

Woman's Club for September 1, 1982 - September 1, 1983 include:

GOLDEN AGE CLUB. The ATWC sponsors a senior citizens club in the Archdale-Trinity area called The Golden Age Club. The Golden Age Club has 20 members. Its purpose is to give the senior citizens a social outlet and to let them know there people who care about them.

Members of the ATWC take turns providing transportation to the meeting place, decorating the meeting place, seeing there is an interesting program each month, having recreation and favors for each Golden Ager every month, and giving each Golden Age member a gift at Christmas.

Twenty-six members spend approximately five hours each for a total of 150 hours to this project and we spent \$ 145.00

This year a Senior Adult Center was built at Creekside Park in Archdale. Our Club contributed \$ 500.00 to this building and also collected glass, magazines, and newspapers for this project.

CAROSUEL THEATRE. The ATWC Education Chairman served as a liason for the Carousel Theatre, which presents a series of plays each year for children. Members of the club act as clowns and go to the three elementary schools in the Archdale-Trinity area to promote ticket sale. The Education Department provided \$ 56.00 for gas to transport the students to the Carousel Theatre and also made arrangements for all third graders in the three elementary schools to attend these plays. Three club members spent 20 hours on this project.

NATIONAL EDUCATION WEEK PROJECT. Letters of appreciation were sent to the teachers at the local schools during National Education Week.

Our Sallie-Southall Cotten Scholarship winner was Eliazbeth Saunders. She was awarded \$ 100.00 from the ATWC.

Our club gave a plaque to the Best All Around Boy and Girl at the Archdale-Trinity Middle School. Five members helped with these projects for a total of 20 hours. We spent a total of \$ 195.26 in the Education Department.

CHRISTMAS TOY PROJECT. The Home Life Department and the ATWC members help the Trinity High School students collect toys for needy children in our area at Christmas. Club members get a list of children and divide them among the homerooms at the high school. The students are given the age and sex of each child. They provide toys, etc. for these children. The ATWC members pick up these gifts and deliver them to the Health Department in Archdale. A total of 60 children received these Christmas gifts.

The ATWC gave 18 fruit baskets to needy families at Christmas. We spent \$ 51.50.

TALENT SHOW PROJECT. Each year the ATWC sponsors a talent show at Trinity High School. This year we had 35 students participating. They were from ages 13 - 18 years.

They participated in three categories, vocal, instrumental, and dance.

Cash awards of \$50, \$30, And \$20 were awarded to the top winners in each category. This prize money amounting to \$ 300.00 was donated by local businessmen.

The purpose of the talent show is to raise money for a \$ 500.00 scholarship, which is given to a Trinity High School Senior planning to major in the Arts.

All members participated in this project - contributing 150 hours.

ARTS CONTEST - HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS. Each year our club puts alot of emphasis on our Arts Contest. We try to get many of the high school students to participate in this contest. We feel this one way of getting to know the students and to have them share their talents with us. This is also a good way for the students to become more aware of their talents and to get them to be very creative. We had 22 student winners in our local Arts Contest. \$ 375.00 in prize money was awarded to these winners. We had one 2nd place student winner and one 3rd place winner in our State Arts Contest, these two winners were first place winners in the District Arts Festival. Five members helped with this for a total of 40 hours.

HOME LIFE. Three of our club members helped distribute cheese to low-income families. We donated \$ 10.00 and cookies to the Leukemia Bike-A-Thon. Four members participated in these porjects for a total of 20 hours.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS. Our Public Affairs Chairman organized an outing for the Special Education Class at Braxton-Craven School to go to the zoo and lunch. Also part of our members helped with the Special Olympics. We spent \$ 10.00 and Seven people gave 35 hours.

INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS. The International Affairs Chariman arranged a luncheon at Casa Gallardo Mexican Restaurant in Greensboro for the club's April meeting. We were served a variety of Mexican food in a Mexican atmosphere. Ten members attended for a total of 40 hours.

WORK WITH JUNIORETTES. The ATWC sponsors the Archdale-Trinity Juniorettes at Trinity High School. This past year they had 54 members. Two Club members are advisors and attend all board meetings, monthly meetings, and other functions given by the Juniorettes.

The ATWC members take turns serving refreshments to the Juniorettes

at their monthly meetings. A Juniorette member is a guest each month at the Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club meeting.

Club members help with the Juniorette scrapbook and they also helped with the "Beach Bash" given for new members.

The Juniorettes spomnsored a Walk-A-Thon for the Rainbow House in Winston-Salem. Several of the ATWC members sponsored some of the walkers. Three of our club members walked in this Walk-A-Thon.

The ATWC members also helped collect toys and games for the area hospitals at Christmas. We also collected newspapers to help the Juniorettes raise money for "Save The Lighthouse".

Mrs. Jean Parsons installed the new Juniorette Officers at the May meeting of The ATWC.

Our two clubwomen who were Juniorette advisors won 2nd place for Advisor of the Year at the Juniorette Jamboree. The Juniorette president won Clubwoman of the Year, they won 1st place in Scrpabook, Conservation, International Affairs, Public Affairs, and Best Over All Department at the Jamboree. They won the Parker Morgan Award for work in fighting and preventing drug and alcohol abuse. They won the Susan B. Mills Award, granted for work with the disabled and handicapped. The Juniorettes received first runner-up for their work with their sponsoring club, The Archdale-Trinity Woman's Club.

We feel that the Archdale-Trinity Juniorette Club gives its members an insight into different community projects and needs and teaches the members how to be leaders and good citizens in their community and school.

All of our club mambers participated in this project for a total of 1,050 hours and spent \$ 52.00.

The members also won second place for their community service projects and third for their yearbook.





# NCFWC President Issues Challenge To Women






