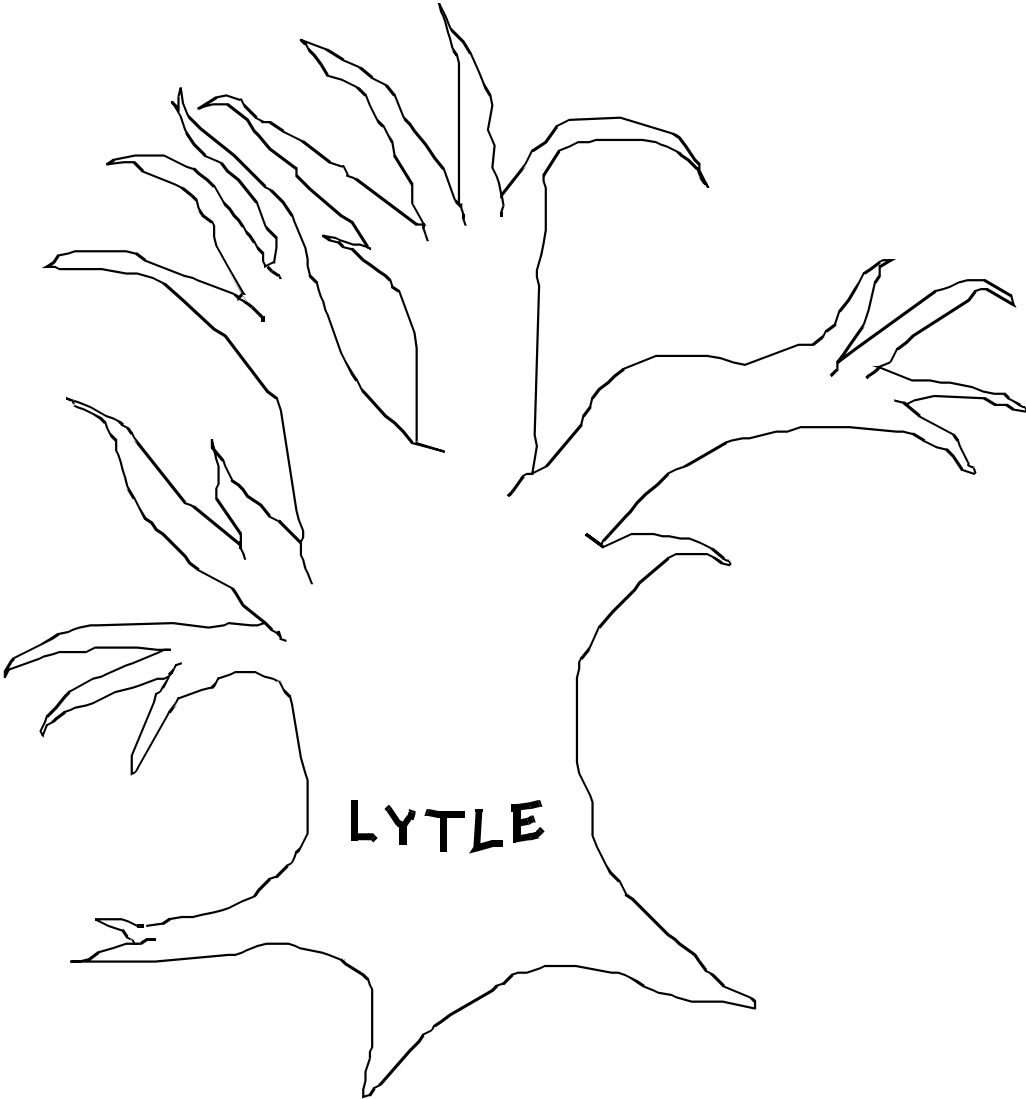


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Vacation Time!

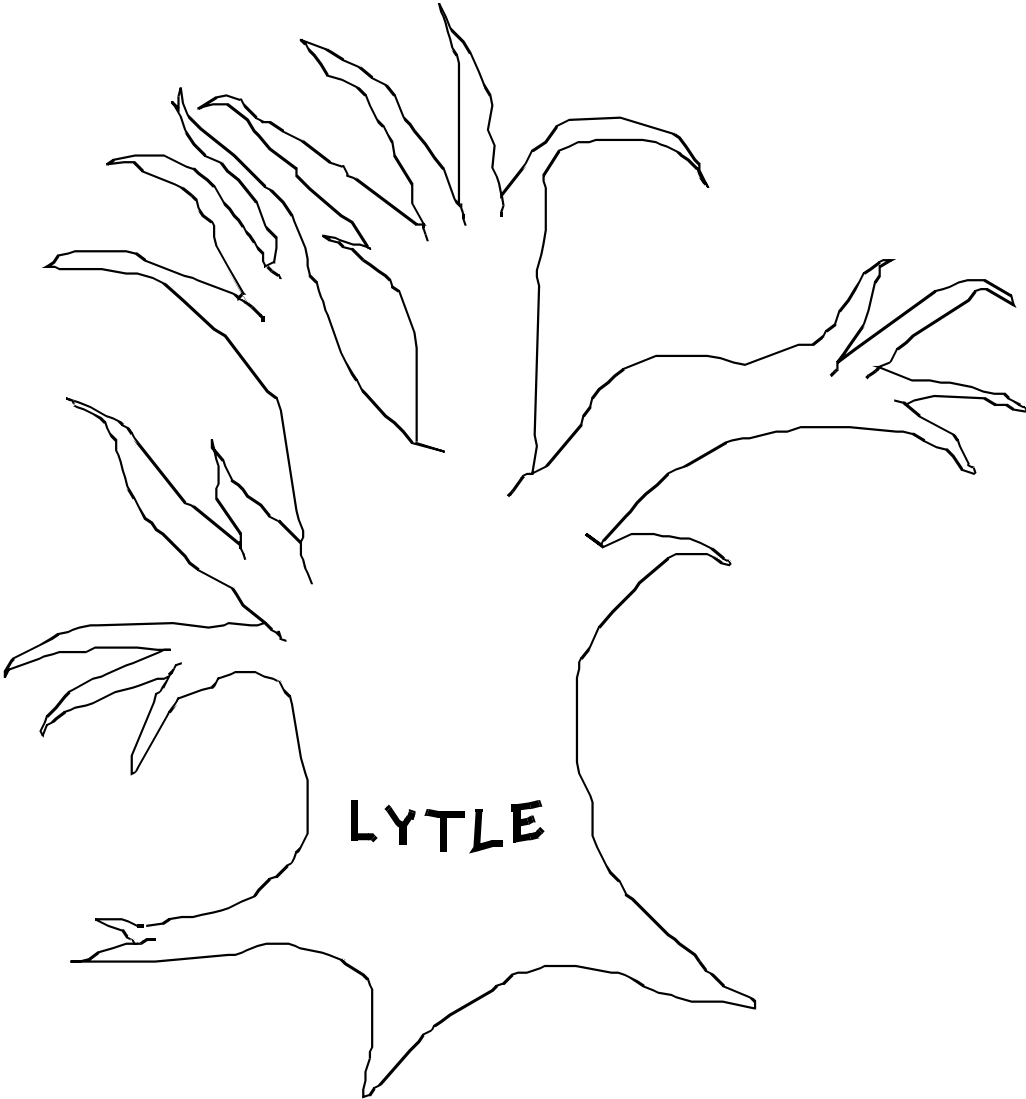

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Bulla Notes

For the Bulla descendants on the mailing list, your ancestry has been extended back a ways. This ancestry is for descendants of Francis Lytle's third wife Martha "Patsy" Bulla (1815-1854) and is valid for her descendants through children Eunice, Newton, Luke, Henry, Deborah. This lineage is likely applicable for descendants of Francis' son James through his wife Easter Bulla (Buller), though her ancestry has not been determined. Most of the ancestors listed were known or presumed to be Quakers.

With sadness I must report these deaths among family and friends.

Mildred Mae (Richardson) Kinghorn (1905-1994)

Mildred was a granddaughter of Luke Lytle by his second wife, Jenny (Brown), and daughter of Leonard and Una (Lytle) Richardson. Her entire life was spent in and around Lewiston, Nebraska. Mildred was born on a farm near Lewiston on February 10, 1905, graduated from Lewiston High School, and attended Peru State College. After her marriage to Dean Kinghorn in 1929, they farmed around Lewiston until retiring and moving to town in 1972.

Mildred passed away at the nearby Paddock Kensington center in Beatrice. She was preceded by her parents, her husband Dean, in November, 1992, one brother, Bud Richardson, and one son, Norton. She is survived by brother Gilbert Richardson, son Lamar Kinghorn, five grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, and many other relatives near and far.

Lloyd Ernest Lytle (1910-1995)

Lloyd was also a grandchild of Luke Lytle, and the last one living out of Luke's marriage to his first wife Elzira (Henson). Lloyd's parents were Henry and Blanche (Briant) Lytle. Lloyd and his twin brother, Boyd, were born in Kalispell, Montana, August 22, 1910. Their family moved to Emmett, Idaho in 1916, and Lloyd graduated from high school there in 1930. On the Lytle side, he was a third generation butcher and grocer, and worked with Joe Albertson, founder of the well-known chain of Albertson's Supermarkets.

Lloyd and his twin brother, Boyd, were always full of humor and enjoyed the pranks of twin confusion throughout their lives. Boyd passed away in November, 1984. Lloyd is survived by his wife Harriette, son Jim, daughter Mary, two grandchildren and one great-grandchild, all of Boise, Idaho.

Carolyn Neely Hager

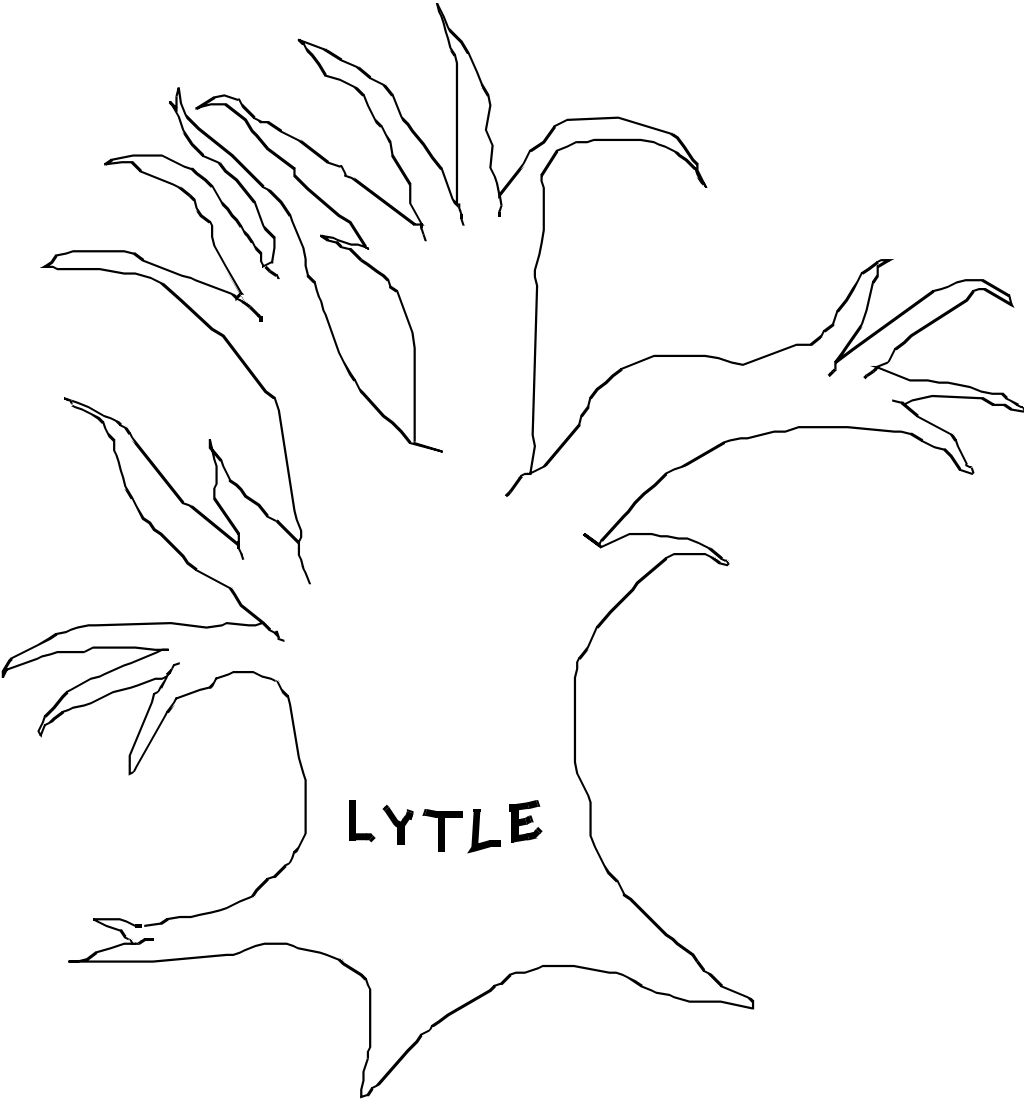
Many of the readers will remember Carolyn as our keynote speaker from our Randolph County Bicentennial Lytle Reunion this past September. As I mentioned at that time, she has been an invaluable guide in Randolph County research; not only to the Lytle family but surely hundreds of others as well. She had a great knack for putting a local and historical perspective on my thoughts and pursuits with regard to Lytles. I have referred to her as a great "Friend of the Family" and also as an honorary member. Carolyn Hager was active in many, many other public capacities as well. She retired from the Randolph Room at the Asheboro Public Library, which has just been renovated, and taught genealogy classes at Randolph Community College. She was a mother of two and a grandmother of four. She passed away March 10, 1995, in her home in Asheboro, North Carolina.

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Life of Elizabeth (Lytle) Reeder

Riverton Woman Boasts "Seven Generation Family"



Although she is 96 now, Mrs. Elizabeth Reeder of Riverton does not want to live to be 100 years old.

Her mind clear, she still assists her son, Bobby, 76, in preparing the meals, but has felt that she has been "no count" since a severe sick spell in 1932 has kept her semi-invalid.

Mrs. Reeder made her last garden (her pride and joy) six years ago when she was 90. She plowed up all the potatoes for the winter use of the family and put them away in a cave. A sever sick spell followed.

With the help of her son, a bachelor, and help from outside a day now and then, Mrs. Reeder still maintains her home, neat and comfortable. Her friends are hoping she will be well enough to make the century mark.

Mrs. Reeder says she is the head of seven generations, but friends believe six generations is more accurate as she says she counts her father and mother, the late James and Easter Buller Lytle as the first generation. Mrs. Reeder's daughter, Nettie (Mrs. Charles Green) now dead is the head of a long lineage. Mrs. Green's daughter, Mrs. Martha Sanderson, lives in Nebraska with her descendants whose addresses are not known to Mrs. Reeder.

Born March 25, 1842, Mrs. Reeder spent her girlhood in Indiana where she was married to Wm. Harvey Reeder before the Civil War. They had eight children. Jonnie was the oldest. Robert L. was next. William Tecumseh Sherman Reeder was born while his father was serving in the Civil War and was named from his father and General Sherman under whom Reeder served.

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Walter L., Oscar N., Nettie (Mrs. Charles Green), Belle and Maudie are the others. Robert lives with his mother. Walter is at Rock Port, Mo., Oscar is in California and the fourth one alive is Belle Reeder of Nebraska.

Mrs. Reeder has a sister, Mrs. Sarah Ann Van Fleet, 84, who lives at Riverton; two brothers, Samson Lytle, 81, and Billie Lytle, 72, live at Wymore, Nebr.

Mrs. Ray Cleveland of Shenendoah is a niece, and Mr. and Mrs. Thurl Purcell, friends of the Reeder, who often visit them.

Oldest Person Residing Hereabouts--

ELIZABETH REEDER DIES AT AGE 98

--Survived by Ninety-three Descendants

Survived by ninety-three descendants, Mrs. Elizabeth Reeder died at the home of her son, Walter Reeder, on Thursday, Sept. 12th, 1940, aged 98 years, 5 months and 17 days.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. D. L. McConnell at the Clifton Funeral Home on Monday afternoon. Interment was at Mount Zion (also known as Utterback) Cemetery, near Riverton, Iowa.

The deceased was by far the oldest resident of this section of the country, and probably was unsurpassed in age by but few persons in this part of the Middle West.

Mrs. Reeder was born March 25, 1842, in Wayne County, Indiana. She was the daughter of James and Easter Lytle, her father being a minister in the Methodist Episcopal church. She was married to William Harvey Reeder of Indiana on her eighteenth birthday, March 25, 1860. Soon after their marriage they came west to Fremont County, Iowa, locating near Hamburg. During the Civil War her husband enlisted in the First Iowa Battery of light artillery. He received an honorable discharge in 1865.

Her husband's war service left a deep impress on his young wife, and she was always keenly sensitive to all things patriotic. She recalled with interest marching in a Fourth of July parade in Sidney, Iowa, and helping other women carry a large flag in that parade.

After the war Mr. and Mrs. Reeder moved to this county, locating in the Linden neighborhood. Then they went to Jewell County, Kans., and later to a farm eight miles east of Hamburg. Then they came to Rock Port. Following residence here they moved to a farm in the neighborhood of Riverton, Iowa. In 1912 she moved to Riverton, where she resided with her son Robert until his death about a year ago, after which she came to Rock Port to live with her son Walter until her death.

Even until she reached her ninetieth birthday she tended her garden. She was a lover of flowers and took pride in the blooms produced in her garden. About 1931 she fell and broke her hip, and then was confined to a wheel-chair. This handicap, however, did not keep her from doing --en or her housework. She baked, did the general cooking and all the housework she could reach from the wheel-chair.

To Mr. and Mrs. Reeder were born eight children, only two of whom survive -- Walter Reeder of Rock Port and Oscar Reeder of Hollywood, Calif. The deceased are Mrs. Nettie Green and Robert Reeder of Riverton, Iowa; Mrs. Maude Tillman of Fairbury, Nebr., Mrs. Belle Grinnell of Omaha, Neb., and two young children, Johnnie and Sherman.

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Two brothers and a sister also survive--Sampson and William Lytle of Wymore, Neb., and Mrs. Sarah Van Fleet of Riverton. Two brothers, Job Lytle of Westboro and Alfred Lytle of Shenendoah, preceded Mrs. Reeder to the grave.

This woman, who in late years had expressed hope that she would not live to be a hundred, but lacked only a year and a half of attaining that age, is survived not only by her two sons, but also by thirty-one grandchildren and sixty great-grandchildren.

Though handicapped by extreme age and accidents of recent years, she retained much of her mental vigor, memory of events of many decades ago and an independence of action which was marvelous.

One's mind will almost fail to grasp the events which she witnessed during the course of her long life. Here are the presidents of the United States under whom she lived: She was born when John Tyler was president and was a child when James K. Polk was inaugurated in 1849. She lived under Presidents Millard Fillmore, Franklin Pierce and James Buchanan; was a bride of 19 when Abraham Lincoln was inaugurated in 1861 and her later life was lived under the administrations of Andrew Jackson, Ulysses S. Grant, Rutherford B. Hayes, James A. Garfield, Chester A. Arthur, Grover Cleveland, Benjamin Harrison, William McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft, Woodrow Wilson, Warren G. Harding, Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover, and Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The above accounts were taken from local newspapers. Following are articles from William Reeder's Civil War Pension file.

State Of Missouri 16 July 1901 County of Atchison In the above set out

State of Missouri 21 Nov. 1901 County of Holt

G. F. Phillips, being duly sworn upon oath says:

I am well acquainted with William H. Reeder, pensioner under Certificate No. 225685, having known him for more than one and one half years. I knew him while he resided in Pock Port, Missouri, also knew his family including his wife Elizabeth Reeder and his son Robert F. Reeder who lived at home with his parents.

Many times while passing by their house I have heard loud talking and swearing on the part of the son and his Mother, the son cursing his father and it appeared the Mother upholding him in it for the old gentleman, the said William H. Reeder, come out of the house crying, but I did not hear him say anything. I have heard many people say that if the above mentioned pensioner William H. Reeder went back home, they would have no sympathy for him and that he would be foolish if he did.

State of Missouri November 22, 1901 County of Holt

In the matter of the application of Elizabeth Reeder of Rock Port, Missouri to have one-half of pension of William H. Reeder, allowed under Certificate No. 225-685

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William H. Reeder, pensioner under certificate No. 225-685, being duly sworn upon oath deposes and says that on or about the 8th day of September 1900, I was compelled through fear of bodily injury to myself to leave my home in Atchison County Missouri. Said fear was caused by abuse and threats from my wife Elizabeth Reeder and my son Robert F. Reeder. I tried as best I could to get along with them but could not do so.

My said wife would say to me, when I would protest against their abuse and say I would have to leave unless they desisted from further abuse of me, that it made no difference to her if I did leave for she would get half of my pension anyway. For a long time prior to my having to leave home my said wife was very unkind and cruel to me and the longer I stayed at home and tried to get along with her the worse she seemed to get. She has many times cursed me and called me a son of a ____ and many more such names the like there of which are too profane and vulgar to reduce to writing. I tried very hard to do my part as her husband so we could live together and have a home but after all I could do in that way, I had to leave home while I am not old and infirm and depend on my small sum of pension money to keep me from being sent to the Almshouse. I am now living in Mound City, Missouri, not from my choice but because of the above condition existing at my house. My said wife refuses to receive anything from me for when my children and I make up anything and send to her she will inquire if I had anything to do with it and if told I had she refused to have anything to do with it or to receive it.

Comes now Maud Reeder of lawful age and says my name is Maud Reeder I am twenty two years of age. I am a daughter of the above named William H. Reeder and Elizabeth Reeder, I was present at the death of said William H. Reeder. He died in Mound City in the County of Holt state of Missouri - about 30 or 35 miles from the city of Rock Port Missouri. He died on the 12th day of December AD 1901 about one o'clock in the morning and was brought back and buried here in Rock Port, Missouri on December the 14 AD 1901. That my Mother the said Elizabeth Reeder has not married since his death.

Subscribed and sworn to before me the 5th day of December AD 1902, and I certify in my own hand writing that the said Maud Reeder is a credible person and worth of belief.

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Those who remember Elizabeth Reeder, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, most of them grandparents themselves, recall her as a very strict, stubborn, and hard to please woman. Her house was well-kept and neat, and children were not allowed in but that they should remain seated on the sofa.

In her last years, though her health declined rapidly, she refused to see doctors. Had she done so, she may have well reached the 100 year mark. Great age has come to many of the Lytle family. Perhaps her refusal to seek medical attention was part of a true desire to forgo further suffering.

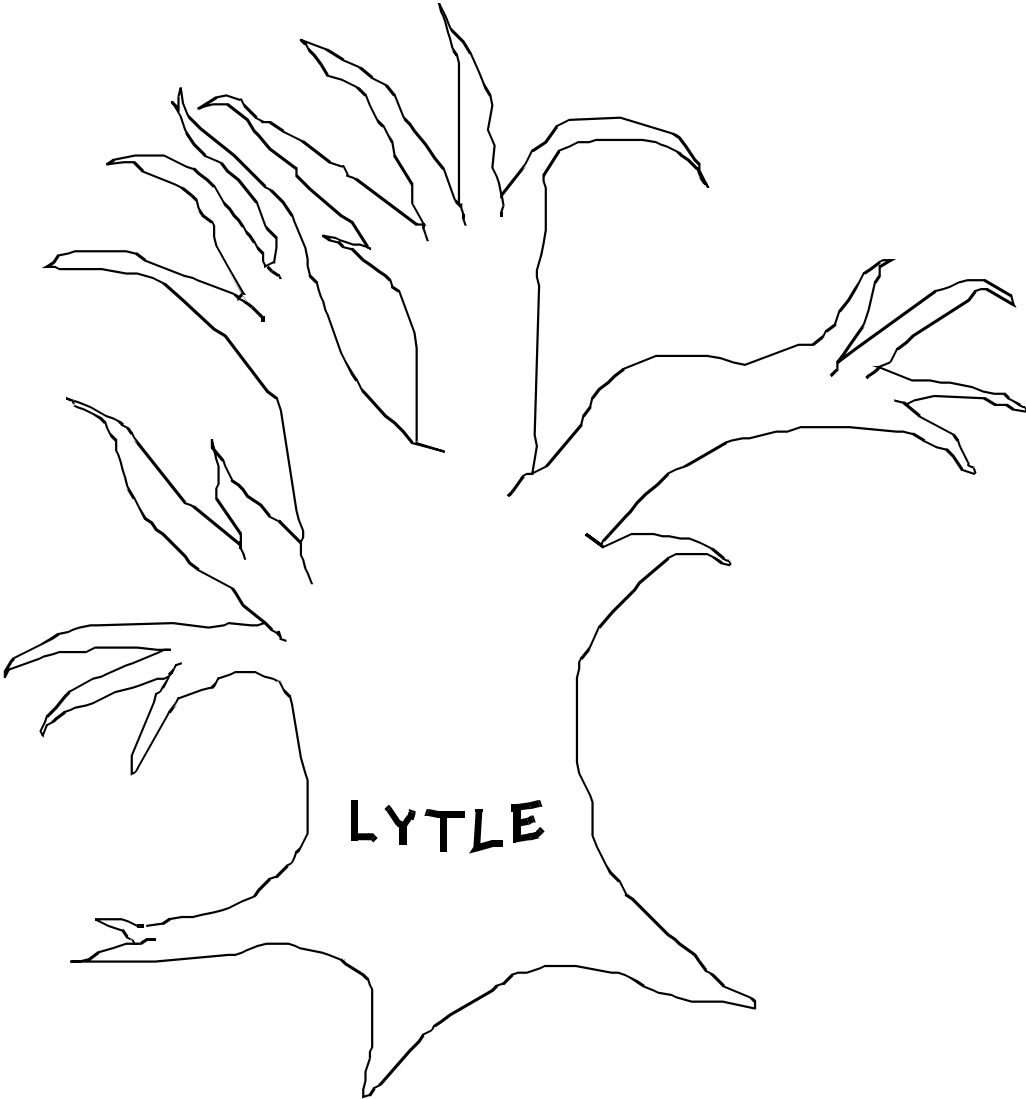
In her last days, she selected her burial attire and had her granddaughters iron it and make her final arrangements.

Now, 55 years later, her descendants and those of her siblings make up what is the largest known branch of the Lytle family. Her siblings, children of Rev. James Lytle (1818-1904) were: Mary Jane Brewer, John Lytle, Thomas Lytle, Job D. Lytle, Simon L. Lytle, Sarah Ann Van Fleet, Sampson R. Lytle, Alfred W. Lytle, and Charles William (Bill) Lytle.

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Lyttles & Quinns - Newly Found Branches

Well, it's not often we find another grandchild of Frank Lytle Sr. (1773-1869). But, one thing always leads to another. A few months back I had a new contact in my neck of the woods - Judy (Lytle) St. Onge, of Longview, Washington. Judy is the only one of her family to move away from Oklahoma, where most of her Lytle branch is to be found.

Judy is a descendant of Frank's son Albert, through his son George's second marriage, and as such was my first contact descended from that union. But it was her copy of George Lytle's Civil War pension papers that aroused the most interest. Somehow her copy is more extensive than the one I had earlier received. It names George's parents, Albert and Winney Lytle, and then also mentions a previously unknown sister, Sarah Quinn.

A quick check of the 1850 and 1860 censuses of Grant Co., Indiana, showed Sarah's family. The censuses conflict slightly, so alternative data is shown below:

Sarah Quinn, b. 1822/1826, NC

Jesse Quinn, b. 1845, NC

Albert Quinn, b. 1847, IN

Enoch Quinn, b. 1850, NC/IN

Andrew J. Quinn, b. 1853, IN

George H. Quinn, b. 1855, IA

Mary W. Quinn, b. 1858, GA

Note that all of the children's names come from the Lytle side - Sarah's father, brothers, and sister. Another interesting facet is that in the 1850 census the family is listed as mulatto. Looking back into the North Carolina censuses, the Quinns are found in Duplin County. This is quite interesting as it is now the third connection to that county. Alfred Lytle, son of Frank Sr., was last found there in 1840 but died a few years later. He was living beside Harmon Blizzard, Blizzards marrying several times into our Walden and Swaney branches (from Frank's daughters Elizabeth and Dorcas). We wonder, how many of our Lyttles may have had other connections there? Francis Lytle (1796-1880) was married first to Winnie Blizzard, whose parents appear to be Hezekiah Blizzard and Leah Carter from Duplin County.

(Side note: in 1850, the Quinns were living beside the family of Job and Mary Davis, Rev. James Lytle's in-laws. Funny that we never noticed them before, with all those family names!)

Unfortunately, I have not been able, so far, to trace the Quinns any farther forward, though the 1916 pension papers state that Sarah died "about 15 years ago" in Webbers Falls. So we suspect that Sarah's family may have come to Madison and Sebastian counties, Arkansas, around 1870 with her parents and brothers, the latter of whom also came to Oklahoma near the turn of the century. Hopefully we'll find some contemporary Quinns one of these days.
