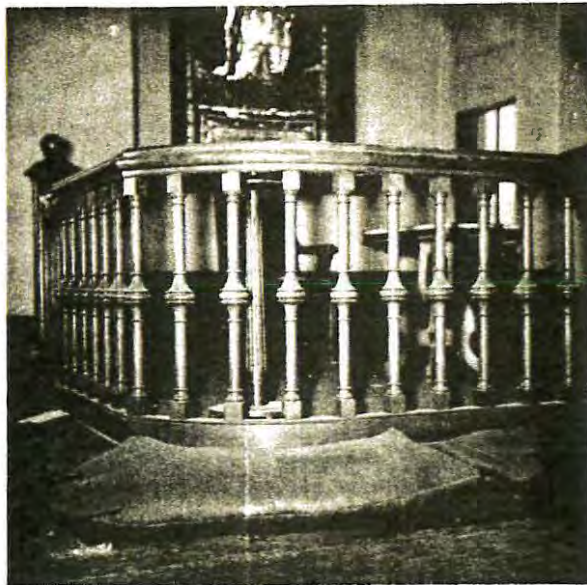

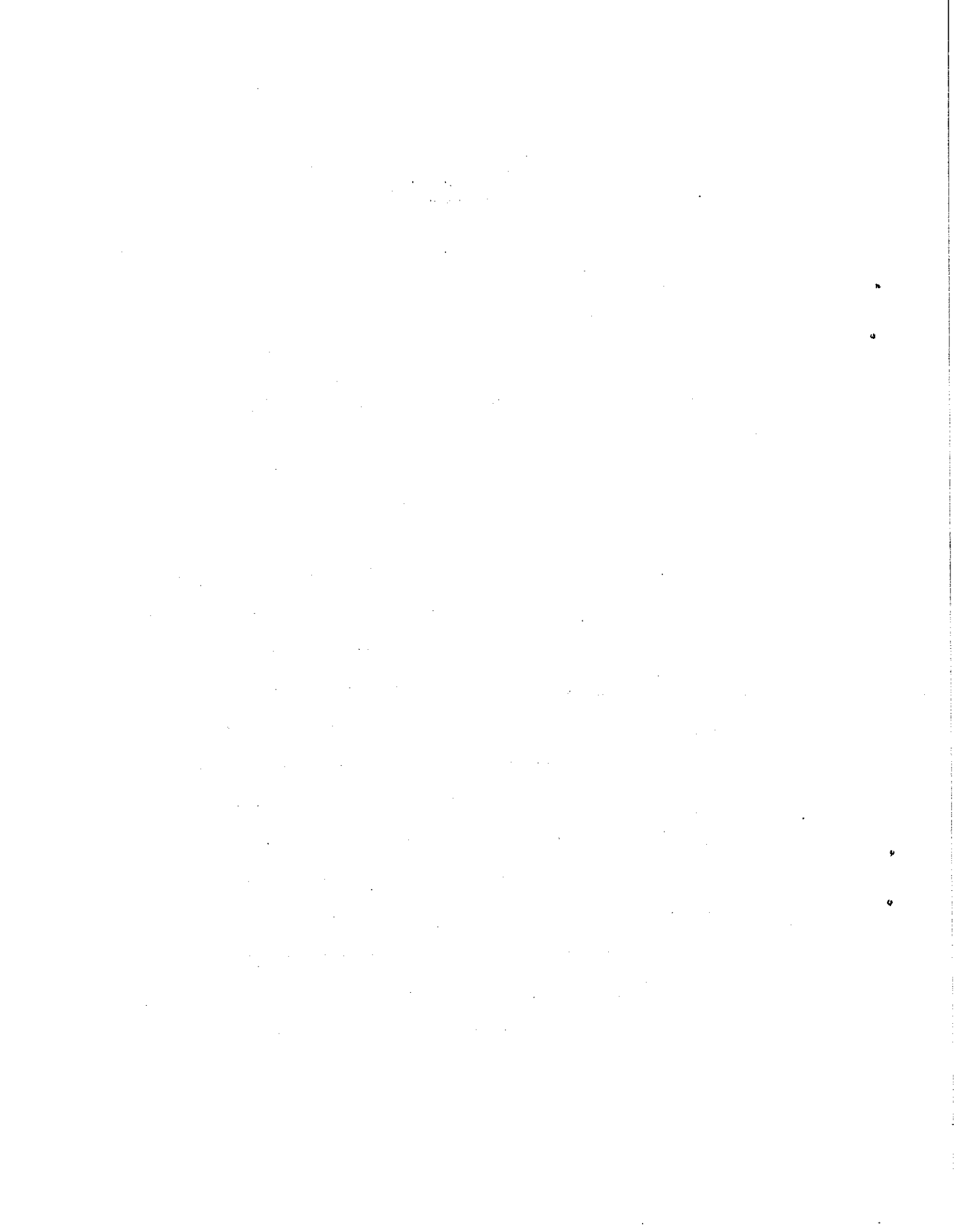

STEEDS - WINNINGHAM  
FAMILIES

Editor's Note:

The following is copied from several items presented to The North Randolph Historical Society library by two sisters, Mrs. Cora Jones and Mrs. G. C. McQueen (Winningham) in memory of their mother; Nannie Steed Winningham (Mrs. James L.) The sisters are members of N.R.H.S. They reside at: Masonic and O.E.S. Home, Greensboro, N. C. 27402. Mrs. McQueen at 82 is very active and keeps a lively correspondence going with this editor when not attending D.A.R., War 1812, WWI Meetings, writing and keeping up with the latest in all the news and events of today. We plan later to print several items written by her mother and printed in the Asheboro Courier and others. We have asked Mrs. McQueen to write of "older" days for us and hope to print them.

Report of Historian of The Winningham Family, sent for the Family Reunion, by Alma M. Winningham, Colonial Hotel, Washington, D. C. 1929 (August 4)  
Copied as written.

The Winningham family in North Carolina was founded by one James Winningham in the latter part of the 18th century. He was born in Virginia February 20, 1756, and later removed to North Carolina, where he was living at the time of the Revolutionary War. He served two enlistments in the Revolutionary War and the records in the Pension office in Washington, D. C. contain full details of his service. His declaration for a pension on file there is in substance as follows:

The declarant states that he was born in Virginia on February 29, 1756 but during the Revolutionary War was living in the County of Grantville, N.C. and that he enlisted for three months as a Private under Capt. Potter, Col. Gill and General Butler about one year before the Battle of Guilford; that he was mostly employed while in the service in the pursuit of the Tories in the counties of Chatham, Randolph, Guilford, and Rowan, but was not in any battles nor did he join any company of regular troops. He was honorably discharged by his Captain, Abram Potter, at the end of his term of service in the County of Granville.

Later he was drafted in the foot service in the County of Granville about two months before the Battle of Guilford, but was permitted by finding his own horse to enter a company of calvary under the command of Capt. John Henderson, Maj. Pleasant Henderson and Col. Halberdy, who was a Frenchman, and Gen. Butler. He was employed in the pursuit of the Tories in the counties of Granville, Wake, Chatham, Orange, Cumberland, and Randolph, but was in no battle. He states that he was near Hillsboro under the immediate command of Capt. Henderson shortly after the battle of Guilford, at which time the town was in the possession of the British. He distinctly recollects being present at the taking of three British Dragoons near said town about this time. He states that he was not with his company at the time of the Battle of Guilford and that his absence was caused by the fact that he owned a very fleet and valuable mare, which he rode while in the service and which his Col. Harberdy (the Frenchman) had tried to get away from him, promising him his discharge

if he would give him his mare, which he most positively refused to do. On the same date of this occurrence the company marched to Col. Tining's in Orange County and it being a very wet night, Winningham and many of the other soldiers slept in the barn. In the morning he says his bridle was gone and he could not procure another, but was compelled to go on parade with a halter only on his mare and could not keep in order. The Colonel, on being informed that he had lost his bridle, ordered him to go home and get one and ordered Capt. Henderson to write him a furlough. After the furlough was written and delivered to Col. Halberdy for approval, the said Col. Halberdy directed him to wait a short time and when he returned he delivered to Winningham a sealed letter directed to Col. Litterell in Chatham County, who lived about one day's ride out of his way home, with instructions to deliver the letter in person to Col. Litterell and that if Litterell could not be found to return it. He delivered the letter to Col. Litterell and, after some detention, received from him a sealed letter to Col. Halberdy, with instructions to deliver it in person. He says that on the second day after he left the company the battle of Guilford took place and that his company was not in the battle; that after he had gone home to get his bridle, he immediately went in search of his company (they having gone in pursuit of the enemy) and overtook them near Fayetteville, where he delivered the letter from Col. Litterell to Col. Halberdy. He then went with his company to Granville County, where he was honorably discharged by Capt. Henderson.

This declaration is signed by James Winningham in his own handwriting, the name being spelled with two "n's" instead of three, and is supported by Affidavits as to its accuracy and correctness, executed by Benjamin Elliott, George Hoover, Archibald Fuller, Alexander Gray, Jonathan Worth and Thomas Fentries, a clergyman, and is certified to by Hugh McCain, Clerk of the Court for Randolph County.

The files also contain the declaration of Sarah Winningham, his widow. She states that she was married to James Winningham on the 13th day of June, 1792 or 1793, she doesn't remember which, in the County of Iredell. The reason that she doesn't remember the date is that the family Bible has been lost. She further states that her oldest child, Gaines Winningham, was born February 11, 1794, and that her husband died August 26, 1836.

This is supported by an affidavit from Alfred Marsh, in which he states that he knew James and Sarah Winningham well for many years and that they kept a tavern in Asheboro during that time.

Among other affidavits is one from Alexander Gray, dated November 16, 1854, in which he states that he is 86 years old and that James and Sarah Winningham lived in Johnsonville (which I understand was the name formerly given to Asheboro)--Ed. note: Johnsonville was above the present town of Randleman and the place is known as Brown's Cross Road. It was the site of the first Courthouse of Randolph County. No plat map has been found of the town but was said to have been laid off into 75 lots, and they kept a public tavern and shoe shop.

There is also another affidavit stating that Sarah Winningham's name before she was married was Sarah Nichols and that she was born October 18, 1769. I could not find the date of her death, although the files show that she was still living in 1861. Their oldest son was Gaines Winningham, born February 11, 1794. He married Nancy Moffitt, born November 7, 1796. Their

children were as follows: Adam, Rebecca, William, Newton, Francis, Jesse, Windie, Sarah, Marion. The family Bible in the possession of the family gives the dates of their birth. They had other children besides Gaines, but the only one of whom I can find a record is Rachel, who married a man named Gordon.

In addition to this I found a record in the Pension Office of one Joseph Wunningham, from Orange County, South Carolina, who served 11 months in the Revolutionary War.

There is also an original commission as Ensign of a Gerald Wunningham, 41 Kentucky Militia, of the War of 1812. This was signed at Frankfort, Ky. on August 28, 1813.

In the North Carolina Census of 1790 there are listed on p.99, Hillsborough District, Randolph County, "Grace Winneham" and "Richard Winniyham" and on page 99, Hillsborough District, Granville County, "John Winunham".

THE STEEDS OF KENT, ENGLAND  
FROM HASTED'S HISTORY OF KENT, PUBLISHED IN 1782

The Steed family appears to be one of the most ancient in England, antedating the invasion of William of Normandy many years, for when that mighty warrior crossed the channel with his conquering hosts, the STEEDS were among his fiercest opponents. The Doomsday Book, compiled in 1086, contained the names of many Steeds, who were among the largest taxpayers in the kingdom. In 1273 we find John Steed, of Suffolk County, a large taxpayer. In 1373 in Yorkshire lived:

ROBERTUS DEL STEEDE, LAURENCE DEL STEEDE, RICHARDUS DEL STEEDE, AND PETRUS DEL STEEDE,

The origin of the name which in ancient times was variously spelled SPEDE, STEEDE, STEAD, STEED, is "at the Stead"; a Homestead; a Roadstead; a Marketstead; a place; a station; a settlement. One who owns land and has a "permanent abiding place."

In 1460, JOHN STEED was a man of some note in the parish of Harrietsham this county (Kent), who in his last will devised his principal mansion at Steed-Street to his son WILLIAM. He likewise had a daughter, JOANE.

WILLIAM STEED, grandson of JOHN STEED above, purchased the Manor of Harrietsham and married JOAN, the daughter of JOHN PORDAGE of Rodmersham, and left issue one son, WILLIAM, afterwards Knighed, and three daughters, SUSAN, who married EDWARD PORHERICEE; JANE, who married RICHARD CULPEPER, and ELIZABETH, who married WILLIAM COVERT, all Esquires. He died on Sept. 25, 1574, and lies buried in this church under an alter-tomb.

SIR WILLIAM STEED, resided at Harrietsham, and was High Sheriff of Kent in 1614, being the 11th year of the reign of James I. He left issue by CECELIA CULPEPER, his wife, three sons, JOHN, WILLIAM, and THOMAS, and three daughters. Of the sons, SIR JOHN STEED, the eldest, became his heir and possessor of the Manor, and on which he built a handsome seat, naming it for himself and the commanding situation, STEEDHILL, in which he afterwards resided. He married ELIZABETH, one of the daughters and co-heirs of SIR JAMES CROMER (CROWNER), of TURNSTALL, and died on June 25, 1622, leaving issue by her one son, CROMER, and two daughters, CECILIA, who died unmarried, and ELIZABETH, who married CHENY CULPEPER, Esq.

CROMER STEED died without issue, upon which this Manor with STEEDHILL went by entail to his father's next brother, WILLIAM STEED, L.I.D. who dies possessed of it in the reign of Charles II. He was succeeded in it by his son, SIR EDWIN STEED, GOVERNOR OF BARBADOES, who was of STEEDHILL, of which he dies possessed on July 19, 1695, leaving his wife, CECELIA, surviving, who was the daughter of that eminent loyalist, SIR WILLIAM CLARKE, of Ford, who was killed in the fight at Croperdy-Bridge in the Civil Wars of King Charles I: and one son and one daughter, the former of whom, DUTTON STEED, Esq., possessed the Manor and resided at STEEDHILL. He was thrice married, the first to ALECIA, daughter of THOMAS CULPEPER, of Hallingsborne, Knight, who died January 12, 1710, aged 39 years, and was buried in Harrietsham Church, leaving issue one son, EDWIN and secondly, to CONSTANCE, daughter of MANICE BUCKLAND, of Willis County, who died on June 27, 1724, aged 30 years, without surviving issue. He survived both wives and upon his death in 1735, was succeeded by his son EDWIN STEED, Esq. who married ELIZABETH, daughter of WILLIAM HAMILTON, Esq.

of Chilston. He soon afterwards sold this Manor and seat to HARMORDEN TURNER, Esq., who changed the name of the seat to Harrietsham-Place, which has been called ever since to this writing. (1782)

In 1737 EDWIN STEED, ESQ., having been granted a large tract of land by his sovereign on the Roanoke River, in Brunswick County, Virginia, in our colonies, accompanied by his wife and son JOHN, he left for that distant country in the same year.

\*\*\*\*\*

JOHN STEED, ESQ., married MARY, daughter of SIMON RANDOLPH, of Burnwick County, Virginia, and had issue of sons, NATHANIEL, JESSE, MOSES, AND MARK.

NATHANIEL STEED was born in Burnwick County, Virginia, on April 20, 1740, and removed to North Carolina in 1765, settling in the central part of the state. He was accompanied by his brothers MOSES and JESSE. When the county now known as Randolph was formed, from parts of Rowan and Guilford counties, it was through his influence that the name "RANDOLPH" was given to it, in compliment to his brothers and friends in Virginia. NATHANIEL STEED took an active and aggressive part in the struggles of the colonists against England prior to the Revolution. He was a member of the famous "REGULATORS" and took part in the Battle of Alamance, the first battle of the Revolution in North Carolina. He raised a large family of sons and daughters, and his plantation of the Uwharrie River was the scene of many social and patriotic gatherings. He was married to RACHEL MORDICAI CLAYTON, in 1768, and of sons born to them were GREEN, BENJAMIN, COLLIN, ABNER, CLAYTON, and CHARLES.

CHARLES STEED, youngest son of NATHANIEL STEED, was born on May 15, 1782, and married HANNAH RAINES, daughter of ANTHONY RAINES, a member of Capt. John Hyams Company, and Co. Lytle's Regiment, N. C. Militia, on January 25, 1820. He was a member of the North Carolina Senate from 1818 to 1820, and a member of the House of Representatives from 1820 to 1822. He was the father of twelve children - nine daughters and three sons. The sons were NATHANIEL, JOSEPH WARREN, and JOHN STANLEY. The daughters were VICEY, SUSAN, NANCY, MARY, DIXIE MACY, CASSIE, VINEY, ELIZA, and SUSAN.\*

JOHN STANLEY STEED, youngest son of CHARLES STEED, was born on February 27, 1829, and died on May 1, 1899. He was married on October 7, 1852 to RACHEL DIRECTOR SWAIM, daughter of JOSHUA SWAIM and NANCY POLK SWAIM. The result of this union was eleven children, six sons and five daughters.

EMILY STEED, born August 28, 1853 died in infancy.

WILEY FRANKLIN STEED, born March 13, 1855; married ADA C. BETTS,

\*\* NANCY HANNAH STEED, born July 14, 1857; married JAMES L. WINNINGHAM, May 24, 1876.

HENRY LUTHER STEED, born March 1, 1860; married LAURA ELIZA ASBURY, December 22, 1891.

JOSHUA NATHANIEL STEED, born July 19, 1862; married EMMA (RAUM) LEWIS July 2, 1895.

JOHN STANLEY STEED, born Dec. 10, 1864; married ADELIA THOMAS WILLIAMS, Nov. 1902.

MARY CORA STEED, born Oct. 16, 1867; married ELLIS WASHINGTON PUGH, born Oct. 30, 1886; died June 24, 1904.

## SEARCH FOR TREASURE

"Uncle Nep" used to say that cousins grew so thick on his family tree down home that you "couldn't spit anywhere in the county without spatter' some."

It takes only a few generations of a single family to produce hundreds of cousins. Considering the mobility of the American people we shouldn't be surprised to find even our most distant cousins living nearby and unknown.

If we follow "Uncle Nep's" example we'll be a little more tolerant of our neighbors who may be cousins "awaiting discovery" and a little more careful where we -----?

The gold of pirates and merchant galleons is not the only treasure lost in history. A dearer treasure, just awaiting discovery is the knowledge of our ancestors, those people whose lives left us the heritage of America and a wealth of tried and proven "can do" genetic characteristics.

The facts that make up the treasure of our genealogy lie hidden in courthouse records, the National Archives, family Bibles and storied tradition, where they may be searched out and gathered together into a complete family history. This searching can give you a better understanding of human nature and a wonderful insight into history as you back track into your family's past to learn the circumstances that tested and shaped their social attitudes, character, temperament and capabilities.

### HOW TO START YOUR RESEARCH

Now, today, on a scratch pad, loose leaf notebook, Bible flyleaf or the family sheets enclosed with your first Quarterly, begin your genealogical research (some call it ancestor hunting) with these first most important steps.

1. Write down what you know now. Your name, birthdate, place, parentage, marriage date, spouse's name, your children. Add deaths, places of residence, other information that you know now for other members of your immediate family. Leave space to fill in later the information you do not have now.

2. Contact your family for help. Mothers are great sources of birthdates. Grandmothers have scrapbooks of announcements, newspaper clips, notes. Older men know the adventures, some names of distant cousins, and where people lived. Be sure to make plain the reason for your questions.

3. Confirm your data with official records. Marriage bonds, wills, probate deeds are in the County Courthouse, and you can get copies of them for \$1.00 and \$2.00. States have birth records since 1912. All records are public and you may "go searching" yourself and hunt through books or write the Register of Deeds or Clerk of Court for them.

4. Make correct notes. Copy names and dates carefully and be sure and state your sources of information (whom interviewed, date, dated letter and writer, book's title and author, document description and location.) Information from printed genealogies and partial genealogies should be checked against the original record. Take full advantage of the resources available through your local library, the County Public Library, the one in the State Library and the services of Inter-Library Loan. Many records have been printed, including some of the census. Others are available on microfilm which you rent and use in the library. (Asheboro County Library has many of these.)

Ask for the old county histories of the area in which you are interested, may have biographical sketches.

5. Advertise for help and/or join a group. Place an ad in a genealogical magazine or in the publication of your local genealogical society. (We will be glad to carry those - free - for all our members).

6. Re-make old photos for added interest. Old photos can be successfully copied, there's no harm done to the original and many people when given a photo of their ancestor will be more willing to help you as a return for the gift. Tin-types are to be treasured for they copy exceptionally well.

7. The last step. Make a readable written record of your research and place it in atleast two libraries.\* Ask your state historical society to make a note of its location in one of their publications, if there's a great family interest, you may want to print, mimeograph or photocopy a number of copies.

In any case, the fun of ancestor hunting, learning about the men and women in your past, and the satisfaction the feeling of accomplishment that goes with a good job, done, will be yours.
