

Asheboro is served by two railroads - the High Point, Randleman, Asheboro and Southern Railway connecting with the Southern's main line in High Point, and by the Norfolk Southern Railway, connecting with the main line of the Norfolk-Southern at Star and the Seaboard Air Lines at Aberdeen.

Asheboro is also served by several bus lines, both local and long distance.

Five U. S. and state highways converge at Asheboro.

FINANCIAL FACILITIES

Asheboro has two strong banks, the First National and the Bank of Randolph. The combined resources of these two banks amount to \$13,000,000. Two building and loan associations are adequately equipped to finance building projects.


EDUCATION AND RELIGION
Asheboro has an accredited public school system for both white and colored children. It also has a state-wide reputation for its moral and religious standing. The following denominations are represented: Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Congregational Christian, Holiness, Friends, Protestant Episcopal, Evangelical and Reformed, Lutheran and the Church of God.

RECREATION AND SPORTS

Asheboro is fast becoming a Sports Center. The Kiwanis Club Horse Show and the State Semi-Pro Baseball and Basket Ball Tournaments bring thousands of visitors to Asheboro annually. The latest addition to Asheboro's recreation program is the Asheboro Memorial Foundation's \$110,000 gram is the Asheboro Memorial Foundation's \$110,000 swimming pool, which was opened to the public in May of this year. In addition to the bath house now in use, an additional bath house and a large auditorium have been planned. There will also be various athletic fields at the Foundation's park site which is located a few blocks from the heart of the city.

THE RANDOLPH HOSPITAL, INC.

Asheboro is exceedingly fortunate in having within its borders the Randolph Hospital, Inc. The first unit of this modern hospital was built in 1931 and was opened in 1932. Since then it has been enlarged twice opened in 1932. Since then it has been entailed twice and plans have already been made for another addition. The present plant houses ninety-nine regular beds and twenty-four bassinettes. A beautiful Solarium for convalescents adorns the hospital's roof. The hospital has the most modern equipment and is manned by a most competent staff of experts in the medical pro-fession. Graduate nurses are used in all of the departtession. Graduate nurses are used in all of the departments and these are assisted by competent nurses' aids. A beautiful home for nurses is located on the grounds near the Hospital. The Nurses' Home and Hospital is constructed of the same kind of material and the architectural design is such as to make it certain that both plants are a part of a general plan to give harmony and beauty to the entire institution.





















Aerial View of Hospital and Nurses' Home

Towering above velvety green terraces and surrounded by shade trees in the heart of Asheboro is the modern plant of the Randolph Hospital, Inc., a non-stock and nonprofit institution incorporated April 28, 1931. The first 50-bed unit and a nurses' home were opened to the public July 9, 1932, and a new hospital wing and addition to the nurses' home were opened in the fall of 1946, making available to the citizens of Randolph and surrounding counties a modern, fully accredited hospital with 90 beds and 20 bassinettes, and a nurses' home housing 40 members of the hospital staff.

The hospital was built with funds contributed by local citizens and business organizations, grants from the Duke Endowment and a bond issue from the City of Asheboro. Both the hospital and nurses' home are constructed of cream brick and trimmed in white limestone, surrounded by ample concrete driveways and parking space for 50 automobiles. At the rear of the buildings is a grove of oak trees and many colorful flower beds, creating a quiet and restful atmosphere in which patients may convalesce.

The latest in modern equipment is found throughout the building - including the air-conditioned operating room suite and delivery room. On the ground floor of the institution are located a modern emergency room adjacent to the ambulance entrance, spacious X-ray department, a fully equipped laboratory under the supervision of a registered pathologist, treatment rooms, and kitchen gleaming with stainless steel equipment and floored in spotless red tile.

The second and third floors contain wards, semi-private and private rooms overlooking lawns and gardens and flooded with sunshine. Atop the hospital is a unique feature — a luxurious solarium made entirely of special glass admitting ultra violet rays and furnished with resort type furniture.




















The brick saddle and show horse barn is one of the most modern in the country.






Sectional View of the Knitting Department.















Randleman High School. The city has one of the largest schools in the county, with a total enrollment of 900. Twelve grades are required for graduation.













FRANKLINVILLE, N. C.



COUNTY of RANDOLPH

The county ranks high in educational facilities, and has an active Board of Health with a full time physician in charge. Strict sanitary regulations are enforced throughout the county. Randolph has the efficient commission form of government, and all the various sub departments operate with a high degree of efficiency. The present chairman of the board of commissioners, G. Russell Hodgin, is one of the leading industrialists of the county, and it is due largely to his efforts that the county has instituted the bipartisan form of government. The Randolph County Tax Commission, whose purpose is to equalize the tax values in the county, is one of the most significant moves in recent years in this bipartisan movement and is establishing the property values throughout the county on an equitable and just basis.

At Trinity, settled in the latter part of the 18th century by Quakers and Methodists, is the site of Trinity College established as Union Institute in 1838, and in 1892 moved to Durham where it is now Duke

There is a 100-bed hospital at Asheboro

The county is served by the Norfolk Southern, the Southern and the A. & Y. railroads.

RECREATION FACILITIES: Tennis, golf, bowling, skating at Asheboro. In late September the annual field trials of the Fox Hunters Association of North Carolina are held in Asheboro. Fox hunts are held in the Uwharrie Mountains.

POINTS OF INTEREST: About six miles from Asheboro is the John Wesley Stand Church, established in 1837. At the Hoover Hill Churchyard is the grave of Andrew Hoover, ancestor of Herbert Hoover, 31st President of the United States. Andrew Huber came from Germany in 1774 and settled in this neighborhood where he operated a plantation and a gold mine. Some of his descendants migrated to the Middle West while others remained here.

Near Ramseur on Sandy Creek was, the home of Harmon Husband, Quaker leader in the Regulator Rebellion of 1771. Some of his de-scendants live in this section.

At Trinity is original site of Trinity College, now Duke University.

Near Glenola, a cemetery contains the grave of Martha Bell, Revolutionary heroine, who supplied information of the movements of the British in the vicinity to the American Army.

ACCOMMODATIONS: There are two small hotels at Asheboro.

FISHING AND HUNTING: Asheboro City Lake—bass, crappie, blue-gills, etc. Boats available. Deep and Uwharrie rivers—some bass, perch, catfish.

There is good quail and wild turkey hunting and some fox in the county.




