She said the actual legal existance of the town of Asheboro began Christmas Day 1796 by an act of incorporation by the General Assembly of North Carolina. In that charter the name was spelled Asheborough which has been abbreviated to Asheboro. There was not much growth in Asheboro until 1889 when the High Point, Randleman and Asheboro Railway came and promoted rapid industrial growth.

One of the oldest houses in the town was the Fisher Gate Keeper House, built by one of the Fisher brothers. The three Fisher brothers came fitorn England and created much excitement and enthusiasm in the small village of 506 population. Early last summer the Fisher property owned by Mirs. Virtle Crutchfield, was sold for a shopping center. 

With Mrs. A. J. Tobert, club president and Mrs. C. E. Hughes, Jr. project chairman, the club accepted the project of landscaping and beautifying a small area to the rear of the Charles W. McCrary School grounds at the request of some of the teachers there and the supervisor of Art Education in the Asheboro City Schools.

The award, which is engraved with the Shamrock Garden's Club name, is at the McCrary School where it will remain on display until school is out.

The one - year beautification project began on March 21st, 1964, and was completed on December 10th, 1964. The club developed a plan to show the most color during the early and late spring, late summer and early fall and plants, shrubs perennials and bulbs were chosen which would give the most beauty for minimum care. A bird bath was installed which was also included in the plan.

Mrs. W. K. Lewallen, principal of the Charles McCrary School wanted the children to feel that they had a part in the project and that it was for them and the school. 

There was not much growth in Asheboro until 1889 when the High Point, Randleman and Asheboro Railway came and promoted rapid industrial growth.

One of the oldest houses in the town was the Fisher Gate Keeper House, built by one of the Fisher brothers. The three Fisher brothers came from England and created much excitement and enthusiasm in the small village of 500 population. Mrs. Nance showed pictures of the Fisher house and the Fisher children.

Early last summer the Fisher property owned by Mrs. Virtle Crutchfield, was sold for a shopping center. The buyer and Mrs. Crutchfield offered the gate keeper house as a gift to any club that would move it. The Woman's Club, Business and Professional Women's Club and the Asheboro Junior Woman's Club owned a lot on Lanier


