

Action Of Prosecuting Witnesses Backfires

Judge Dismisses Charges Of Assault Against Cafe Operators Here

Action of two young men in signing a warrant charging two cafe operators here with assault just about backfired when the matter was aired in High Point Municipal Court this morning.

Gus Badalas and Jim Badalas, who operate the South Main Cafe, were charged in warrants secured by W. A. Morton and George Smith with assault.

On the witness stand this morning, the prosecuting witness contended that the defendants struck Smith over the head with a cue stick and shot three times at Morton during an argument that ensued when the cafe operators refused to sell Morton beer and ordered him out of the cafe.

Testimony developed, however, that both Morton and Smith were arrested on the same day shortly after the episode, charged with drunkenness and pleaded guilty when their cases were heard in court here.

Another witness testified that the defendant who fired the gun shot over Morton's head, not at him, in an effort to get him out of the establishment, then telephoned police and told them of the occurrence. She, in addition, admitted throwing a bottle of barbeque sauce through the window during the argument.

Judge D. C. MacRae, at the conclusion of state's evidence, said he felt prone to condemn the defendants rather than to condemn them for their action in refusing to sell beer to persons who were drunk.

Prosecuting Attorney Harris H. Jarrell, on the other hand, insisted vigorously that the defendant used undue force in discharging a pistol under the circumstances and that he would continue to prosecute as vigorously as possible, persons charged with shooting a pistol or a gun at persons engaged in nothing more than a social meal.

Judge MacRae, however, allowed the motion of defense counsel to dismiss the case.

Motorist Who Twice Eluded Police Caught

A motorist who twice within a period of six days eluded pursuing police officers—once at a speed in excess of 75 miles an hour and the second time at a speed of more than 85 miles an hour—has at last been apprehended and now faces charges of reckless driving.

He booked the driver as W. Hill, route three, with textile worker.

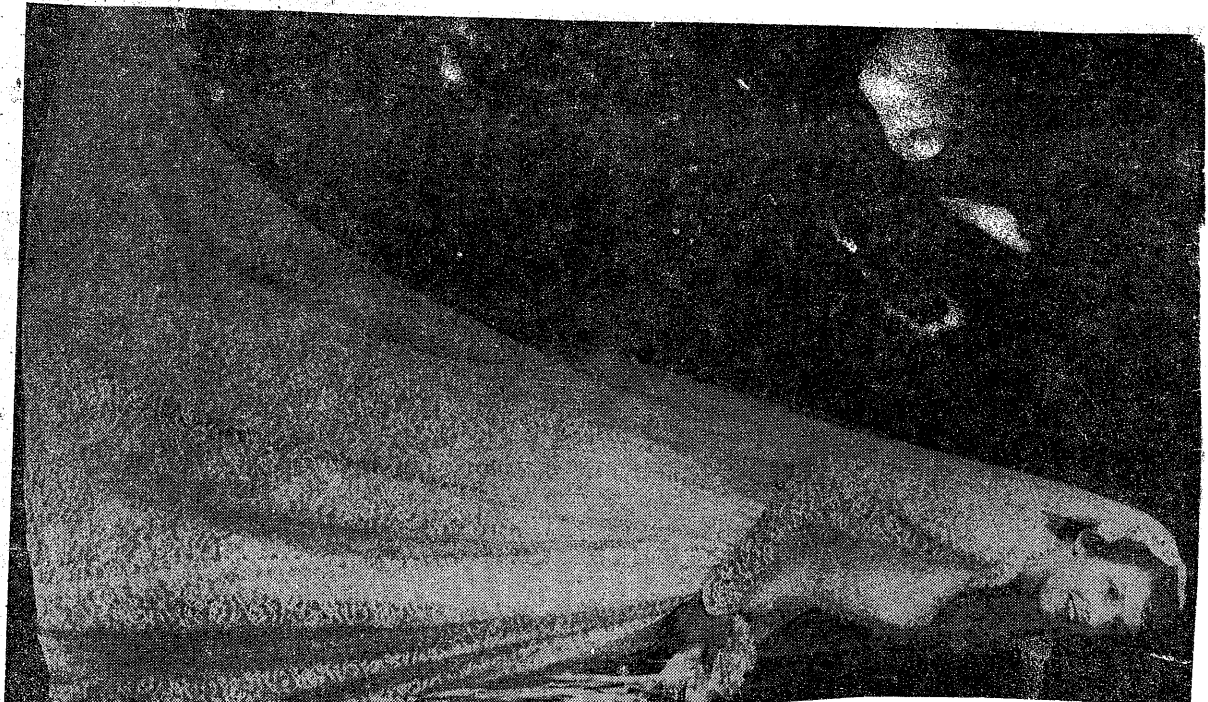

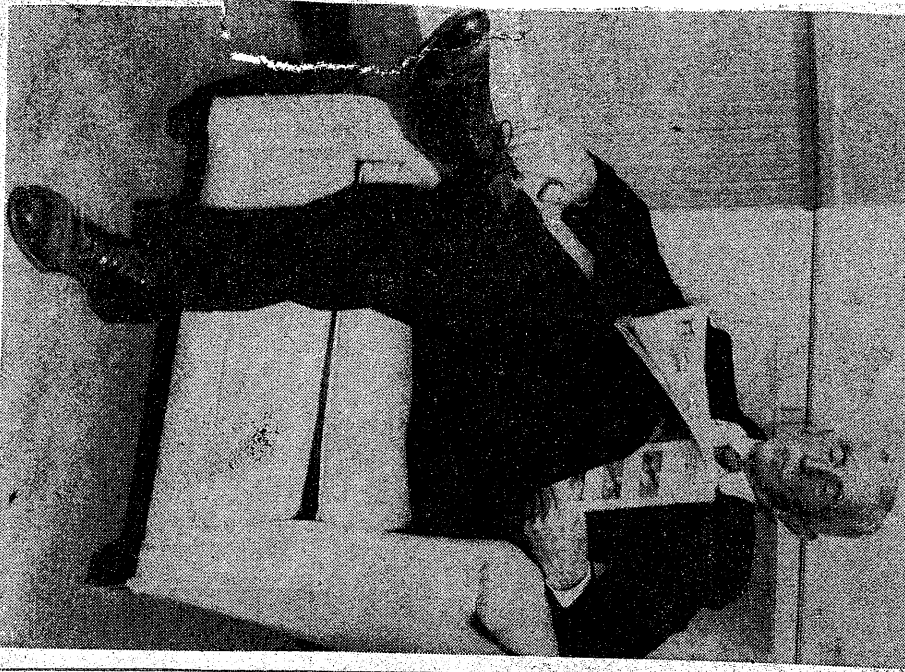
Marriage Is Announced

lives at Route 1, Sophia, and is in Thomasville this week on a visit with his son, Joel Walker, local funeral director.

Extremely spry for his age, Walker still farms, cuts wood and does odd jobs around his farm and doesn't wear glasses except for reading. Throughout his life, the elderly man has lived as a farmer and a saw mill operator, and has specialized in self education.

Asked if he ever gets lonely (his wife died 40 years ago), Walker said he keeps too busy to get lonely. The 86-year-old man says he believes that people aren't as happy now as they were when he was a boy, declaring that the fast pace at which they get around may have something to do with it.

Walker led the Sunday afternoon reunion in his usual jovial manner and laughed and joked with the smallest kid there. He is father of 18 children, 10 of whom are still living. Walker, himself, is one of 10 children born in Concord Township, below Farmer in Randolph County. He lived there until he was about 15 and for the past 71 years he had lived in the Fifth Hill section, near Sophia. At present a son and his family live with Walker at his country home, which is surrounded by a number of oak trees, and in which the elderly man takes great pride and interest.

Speaking about his age, Walker said, "My grandmother and my mother both lived to be 97. One of my sisters lacked only six months reaching a hundred, one was 97, another 90 and another 89." He said he is "shooting for" the century mark.

One of the main pleasures Walker gets out of life is visiting his old homestead, a sprawling three-story home known as the "White House." The homestead was so named by neighbors of the community because for many years it was the only painted house in that section.

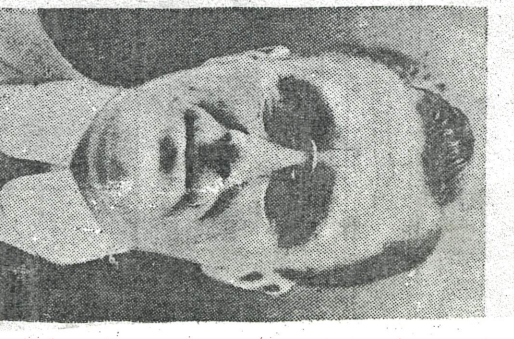
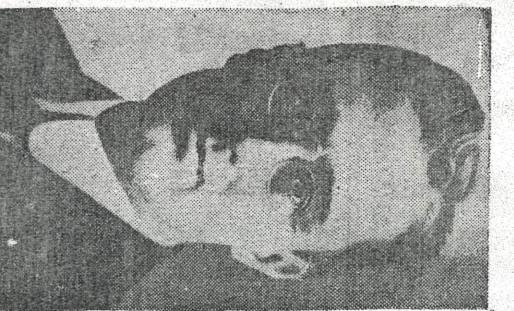

This was the second auto fatality and third accident in Randolph county this year.

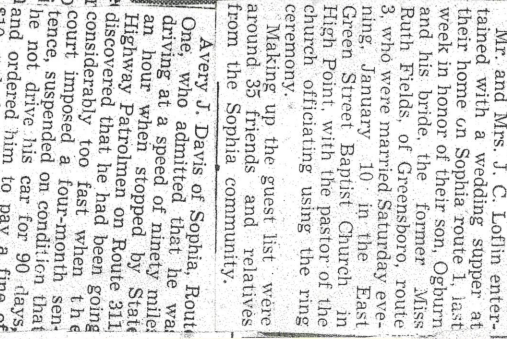
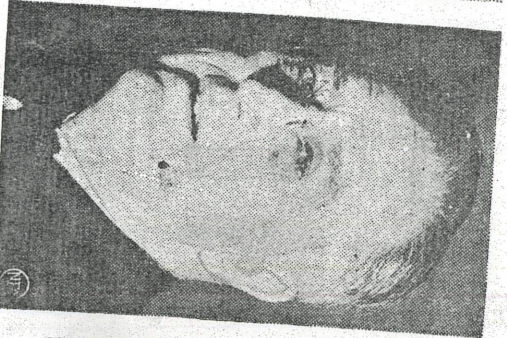
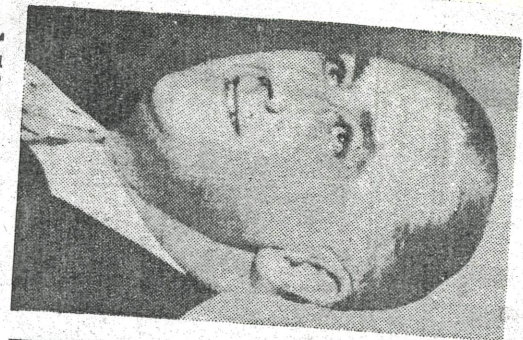

BLANKET DEFERMENT OF MARRIED MEN PROHIBITED BY DRAFT REGULATIONS

RALEIGH, Jan. 19. — (AP) — State headquarters of the Selective Service system said today that regulations prohibited the blanket deferment of married men simply because they were married and emphasized that deferments in Class 3-A must be based on dependency. The statement was designed to correct misunderstanding of the draft regulations regarding married men. Local boards have been repeatedly cautioned that individual cases be considered on their merits. "No registrant shall be placed in Class 3-A if he acquired dependency status on or after September 16, 1940 and before December 8, 1941, unless he presents information which convinces the local board when classifying him that such status was not voluntarily acquired at a time when his selection was imminent or for the primary purpose of providing him with a basis for deferment," the regulations say.

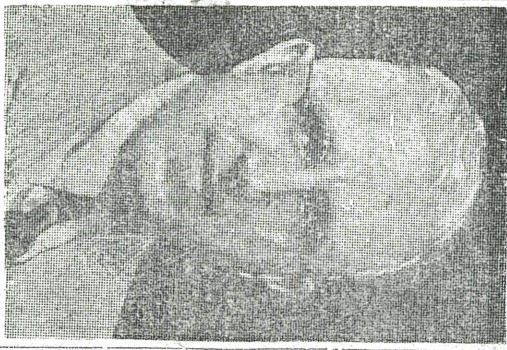

Springfield Friends Church Badly Damaged By Sunday Morning Fire

Loss Estimated At About \$25,000; Plan To Rebuild As Rapidly As Possible

Fire believed to have originated from defective wiring near the rear of the structure ruined plans for the observance of Brotherhood Day and gutted the interior of historic Springfield Friends Church, south of the city, causing damage estimated at between \$20,000 and \$25,000 yesterday.

The blaze was discovered shortly before the Sunday School was to have convened by Mrs. Ed. Millikan, who, thinking at first the leaves in the gutter were on fire, summoned the church janitor.

The High Point Fire Department was called, and Chief E. K. Ingram secured permission from City Manager E. M. Knox to take his men to the scene, although ordinarily the department does not answer alarms outside the city.

Church officials gave the department credit for saving the church from complete destruction, and expressed their appreciation to the city manager for allowing the department to answer the call.

Flame caused their heaviest damage to the area in the rear of the church auditorium and to the roof. The front of the auditorium and the huge white columns in front suffered little more than superficial damage from scorching. Neither did the flames spread to the colonnade connecting the church with the museum nearby.

Members of the congregation pitched in and aided the firemen and then remained throughout the afternoon, clearing away the debris. Hundreds visited the scene during the afternoon, and many gave donations to help repair the damage. The benches were removed from the auditorium, but many were damaged because they had to be wrenched loose from the floor.

Church officials said the structure would be repaired as rapidly as materials could be secured.

The damage was partially covered by insurance, but church officials estimated it would require at least \$25,000 to restore the damage. The Rev. Harold Hadley is pastor of the church.

The new building was erected in 1927.

Negro Church Aired In Leaked Rev. A. S. Townsend Ordered Not To Enter On Mt. Zion Church Premises Unless Elected Pastor

A church row that arose when two ministers attempted to claim the same pulpit had its ending in High Point Municipal Court this morning when Judge D. C. MacRae ordered the Rev. A. S. Townsend not to enter upon the premises of the Mt. Zion Negro Baptist Church on Taylor Street unless he was duly elected pastor by the congregation and officially notified by the board of reasons.

On the complaint of Edgar Leake, who described himself as a trustee of the church, Townsend was arrested Friday on a charge of forcibly trespassing, and yesterday morning he was arrested again for this time on a charge of interfering with religious worship.

In this morning's hearing, not only was the matter of who was pastor of the church aired, but the finances and moral character of WAS GIVEN LEAVE.

Leake said Townsend was given a leave of absence as pastor of the church a year ago and was then removed as pastor last July by the "acceptance" of his resignation. Later testimony developed the fact that Townsend himself did not resign but was "resigned" by a group of the church members.

Yesterday, witnesses said, Townsend got into the pulpit and started signing so that the Rev. F. R. Maso, who apparently succeeded Townsend as pastor, could not conduct the meeting for worship. Result was that Leake telephoned police, and then signed a warrant for Townsend's arrest on a charge of interfering with religious worship.

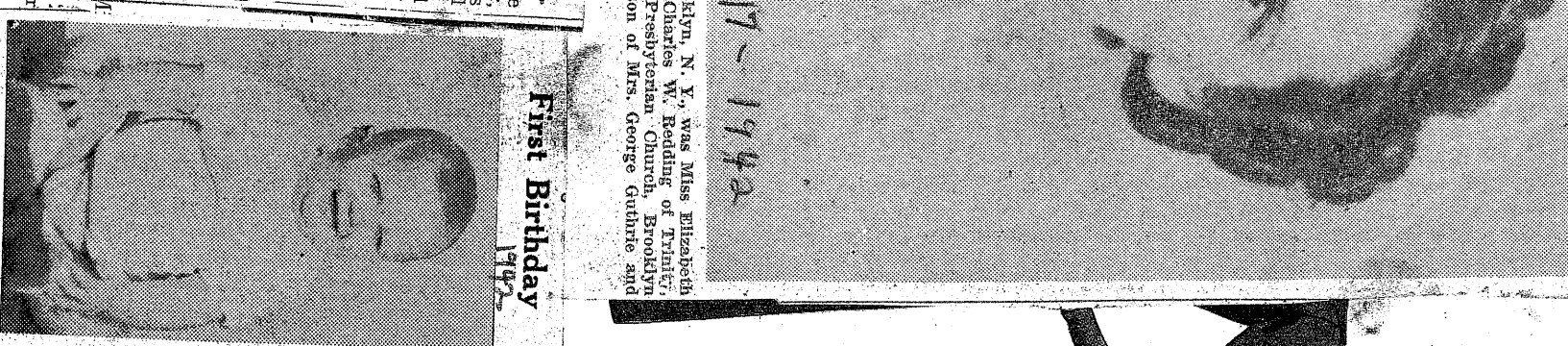

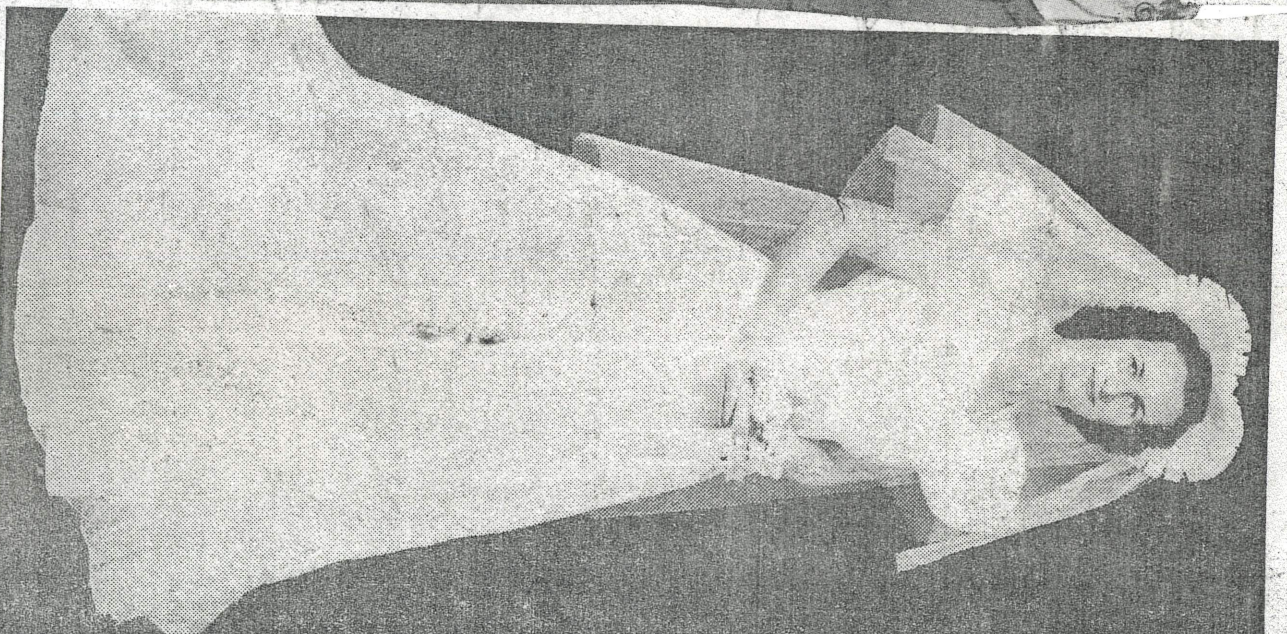
Miss Farlow Weds T. C. Andrews In Garden Ceremony at Sophia

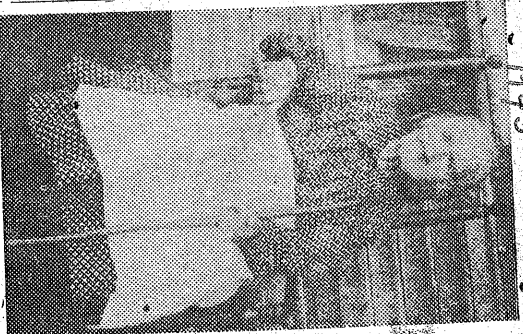

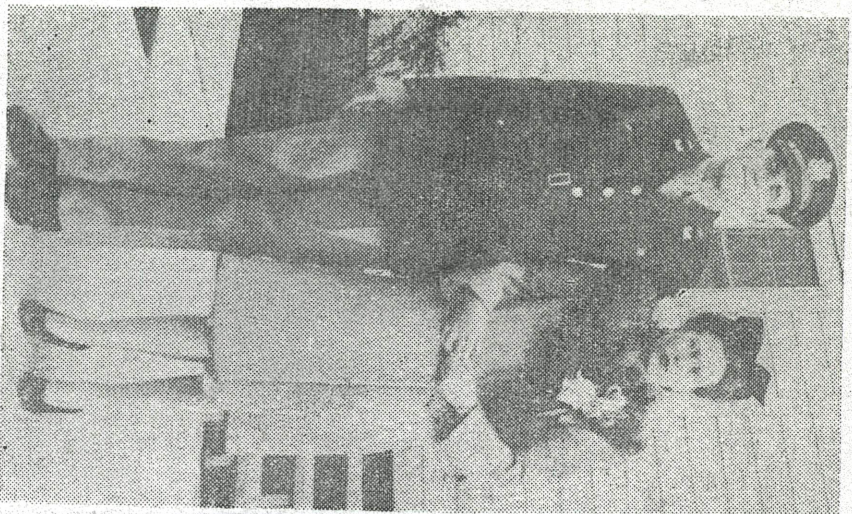

Well Known Ashboro Newspaper Woman And Writer Is Called By Death

FORMER EDITOR AND PUBLISHER OF COURIER Charter Member Church Of Good Shepherd, Interested In Civic Affairs

Funeral was held at the residence of her mother, Mrs. Willetta C. Hammer, on South Fayetteville street, Ashboro, Monday afternoon at four o'clock for Mrs. Harriette Hammer Walker, who died at 3:45 o'clock Sunday morning following an extended illness. Service was in charge of Rev. R. G. Shammouh of Pittsboro, assisted by Rev. J. W. Braxton, pastor of the Central Methodist church, Ashboro. Interment was in the family plot in the Ashboro cemetery. Pallbearers were Frank McCrary, J. D. Ross, Sr., W. A. Burns, George Burkhead, T. A. Burns, Cleveland Thayer, Reid M. Hannah and Roy Cox. Flowers were carried by members of the Friday Afternoon Book club.

Mrs. Walker was born in Ashboro on Dec. 7, 1894, and was the only child of Mrs. Minnie Hancock Hammer and the late Congressman William C. Hammer. She was educated in the Ashboro city schools, at Salem College, Winston-Salem, and at Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, Greensboro. Mrs. Walker descended from pioneer North Carolina families. Her paternal grandfather spent his life in the ministry of the Methodist church; her maternal grandfather, Major J. M. Hancock, a physician in the Confederate army, was wounded at Gettysburg. Her maternal grandfather was a member of the well known Page family.

Born in an environment of newspapering and politics, Mrs. Walker entered the same field of activity. Her father served as superintendent of public instruction in Randolph county, and later became one of the leading political figures of the state, serving as U. S. Attorney during the Wilson administration and later was a member of Congress in which capacity he was serving at the time of his death on September 26, 1930. He also owned and edited the Courier, one of the leading weekly newspapers in the state, and later by his daughter. In such environment, Mrs. Walker early turned her talents to literary and political matters. She was also interested and active in club and social affairs.

At the time of her father's death, Mrs. Walker was on the staff of the Winston-Salem Journal, but came home to be connected with her mother in editing and publishing the Courier. She later purchased her mother's interest in the paper, changing it successively to a semi-weekly, bi-weekly, and later to an afternoon daily. In 1936, hoping a rest would enable her to resume her newspaper work and writing, she sold the newspaper field for a part time in 1940, just prior to being stricken with a fatal illness. At times her condition improved, then she became worse again. She had been bedridden 18 months.

She was married to Lt. Hal W. Walker of Ashboro on April 7, 1917. Lt. Walker was an officer in Ashboro's Company K, 120th Infantry, and saw service on the Mexican border and overseas during the first world war. He died in July, 1928. To this union were born two children, Lt. Hal Hammer Walker with the U. S. Navy on duty with the Pacific fleet, and Mrs. J. D. (Jane Page) Croom, Jr., of Ashboro. Surviving in addition to these are two grandchildren, Lee Page Croom, and Elizabeth Hardy Walker.

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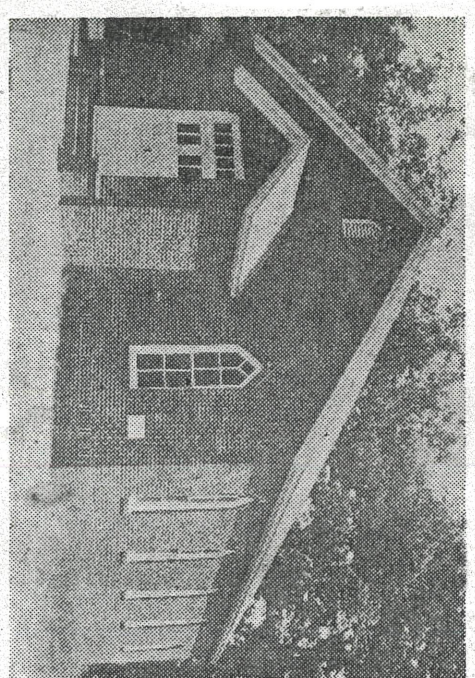
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Plan To Dedicate Bethel Friends Church With Service Sunday, Aug. 29

American Soldier Much Better Fed Than His Enemies

Atlanta, Ga., April 5.—What the Jap soldier uses for emergency rations is revealed in a report received at Headquarters Fourth Service Command, and his comparison with the American soldier's famous Type K ration draws a sharp contrast.

The Jap ration, returned from the southwest Pacific on an American transport and analyzed at a Quartermaster depot consisted of: two bottles of lactic acid health drink, a small can of wheat germ vitamin pills, and the main dish, a No. 2 1-2 sized can containing two layers of rice and bean mixture.

Each layer of the main dish, it was reported, was in four portions, and was made of cooked, partially polished rice with small pieces of a vegetable, like a carrot. It was seasoned with a soy sauce. Each portion of rice was wrapped in a sort of casing or rubbery tough batter probably made of bean curd. The can weighed 586 grams and each section of the rice food weighed 73 grams.

The health drink was described as "a thick, sticky slurry, opaque liquid of a pinkish light beige color and with a strong acid odor, resembling a mixture of pineapple and almond." Small particles sticking to the sides of the bottle were like the sediment found in canned pineapple.

The vitamin tablets came in a bottle of 300 and instructions, in English as to the dose, recommended from four to eight tablets three times a day.

The American soldier's Type-K emergency ration, weighs three and a quarter pounds. It is wrapped in three water, moisture and gas proof packages, one each for breakfast, dinner and supper.

Here's what the day's ration contains:

Breakfast: Two packages of fortified biscuits, a can of chopped ham and eggs, one fruit bar, five grams of soluble coffee, three tablets of sugar, one stick of chewing gum and four cigarettes.

Dinner: Two packages of biscuits, a can of American cheddar cheese, a package of malted milk dextrose tablets with added nutrients, a package of lemon juice powder for lemonade, three tablets of sugar, a stick of chewing gum and four cigarettes.

Supper: Two packages of biscuits, a package of beef bouillon powder, a can of beef and port luncheon meat, a two ounce bar of fortified chocolate, exceptionally rich in caloric value, a stick of chewing gum and four cigarettes.

When an American soldier eats the contents of the three packages he has consumed 4,200 calories, against 3,600 calories, the average in the three meals Army post.

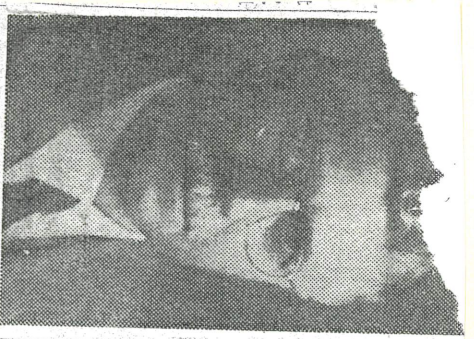

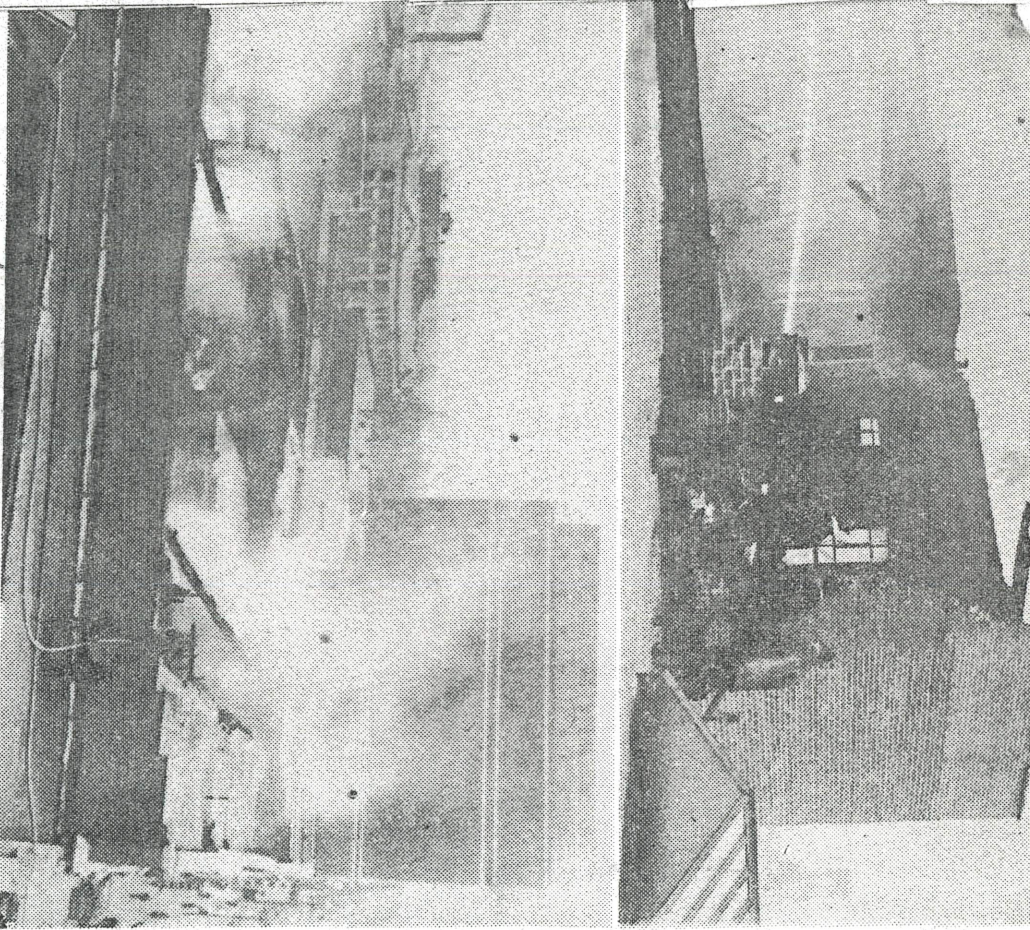
Predicts F. D. R. To Be Drafted For Fourth Term

"There is neither rule nor law against it," Mead said, "and in my opinion the present President will be drafted to serve for the duration of the war and the securing of the peace."

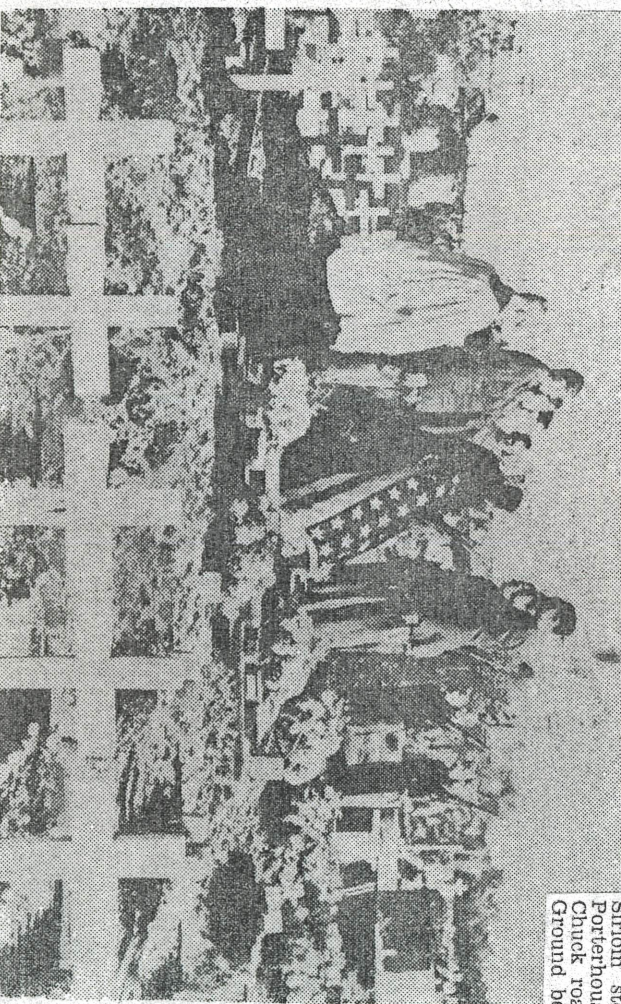

General Predicts List of Casualties Will Appal Folk

Rayway, N. Y., March 18.—Brig. Gen. Alden H. Walt of the chemical warfare service of the U. S. Army today cautioned against "smug or self-satisfied thinking about the war and added that by spring the casualty lists "will appal us."

"Before we are finally victorious war must become a way of life with every one of us," the general told listeners at an Army-Navy E award ceremony at the Standard Oil development company here.

"As yet we have not been hurt severely but we are rapidly coming to the period of blood and sweat and tears. Each day our losses grow everywhere. Each day we are called upon to give more of ourselves and our goods."

"The casualty lists are mounting. Make no mistake about it, and by spring these lists will appal us and we shall begin to realize how serious the war has become. Then the entire nation will be ready to go all out for victory and right then we shall start to win."

"You may have heard some military genius of the swivel chair variety, swivel chair or swivel mind, say that time is on our side, but it is never on the outside of the smug or self-satisfied."

"Every day we delay gives our enemies a breather and a chance."

Meat Rationing To Begin March 29

Washington, March 12.—Price Administrator Premiss M. Brown announced today that rationing of meat, canned meats, canned fish, butter, cheese, edible fats and oils will start at midnight, March 26, and that individual consumers will be allotted 16 ration points a week to cover all these foods.

As with point rationing of canned fruits and vegetables, the consumer will spend his points among the various items as he chooses.

Point values for particular products will be announced during the week of March 22.

Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, who authorized the new program, said accurate estimates of the amounts of each item a consumer will get a week are not possible. But he listed these approximate rations as the likely average in the next few weeks:

Meat, 2 to 2 1/2 pounds; butter, 4 1/2 ounces; lard, 1 1/3 ounces; margarine, 1 1/3 ounces; cheese slightly less than two ounces, and shortening, three ounces.

The office of price administration said special provision will be made under the meat-butter-cheese-fats program for ranchers, farmers, mining prospectors and others who usually buy supplies in bulk for use over long periods.

City dwellers who wish to purchase meat for storage in frozen food lockers presumably could take advantage of this provision.

The red ration stamps in war ration book No. 2 will be used for all purchases under the new program. Consumers seeking special consideration must apply to ration boards. They will receive a "bulk point" certificate allowing them to make quantity purchases, but they must first surrender* to the board the equivalent number of red stamps—before those coupons normally would become valid.

During the first five weekly periods, red stamps from ration book No. 2 will become valid and expire as follows:

March 19, A-16 points, April 30; April 4, B-16 points, April 30; April 11, C-16 points, April 30; April 18, D-16 points, April 30; April 25, E-16 points, to be announced.

Brown said meat sales will not be frozen in anticipation of the start of rationing, and it has not been decided whether to freeze other items. He added that consumers will not be asked to declare stocks on hand of the various foods, as was the case with coffee and canned foods.

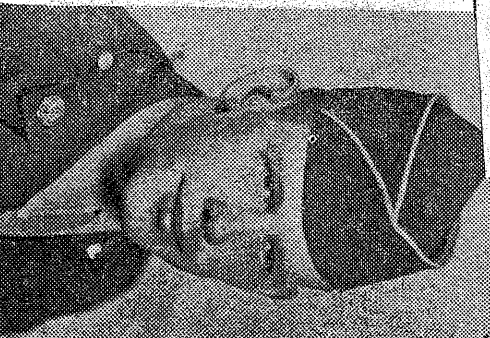
Mrs. Lewallen was one of the oldest members of Welch Methodist church, High Point, where she was a charter member and attended services there until her health would not permit.

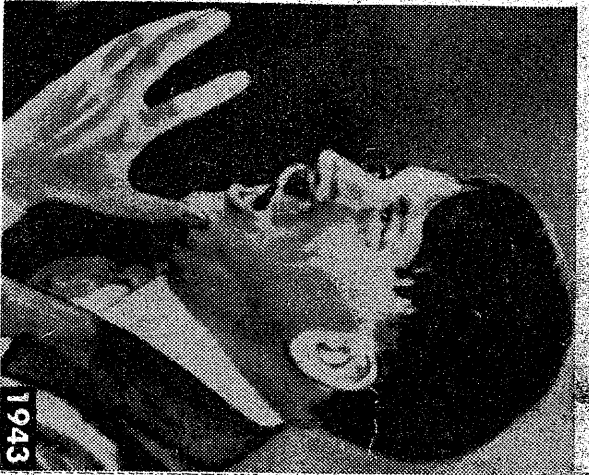

Der Fuehrer Changes Face

Ten years ago today Adolf Hitler became Chancellor of Germany. In ten years the world has changed greatly—and so has Hitler. In 1933 the man who walked into the Chancellery was trim, slender, vigorous. Now, as shown in recent photographs, he has sagging jaws, pouchy eyes, enlarged nostrils, double chin.

Hitler took office with a military record as a mere corporal in World War I. In ten years he has become the "master mind" of the German army, directing by "intuition" generals who have spent their entire lives in the study of military science.

SWATCH ON BREITEN

When Hitler wrote "Mein Kampf," he emphasized that Germany must expand at the expense of Russia. He believed a war on two fronts would be ruinous. He maintained that "there is today no longer a necessary British interest, being other war jobs. He preached in crushing Germany," and that to the benefit of the home country would be too great. He professed for in Nazi party institutions. He the most profound admiration for the importance of marriage and parenthood. But he has never married.

ENEMIES OF GOD?

After assuming power, Der Fuehrer declared that "if the German nation is to stop the rot which threatens Europe it must make enemies of God and the world." Ten years later, hostile French colla, oration, he said he had always "consciously striven to improve relations with France."

Germany had no intention whatsoever of intruding on the integrity of the "French empire."

When the Nazis came to power, Hitler preached "Kinder, kuche owned hospitals, on to give religious instructions in schools, and the Gestapo has seized numerous houses.

The modest village practitioner succumbed in a hospital five minutes after he had been admitted for treatment. He had been ill only a brief time.

Dafeo had visited his brother, Dr. William Dafeo, Toronto, on Saturday and returned to Callander Sunday. He was stricken yesterday and when his condition became critical this morning, he was taken to the hospital.

The doctor, who won the chance in a million—bringing quintuplets into the world—had resigned as the Dionne physician a year ago.

It was at 4 a. m. on the morning of May 28, 1934, when Dafeo got a hurry-up call to go to the Dionne home. He found everything in confusion with no preparation made for the confinement.

"I was astonished to find two babies already had been born," he reported later.

Two neighbors were acting as midwives and Dafeo said they were doing "excellent work." The country doctor literally rolled up his sleeves and went to work. First he scrubbed up the house, and in the meantime another baby was born, and this was followed by another.

The last two babies were born with an "Angel's veil," or a caul, covering them. In older times, an incident of this nature was supposed to bring good luck.

"In the early hours of the morning, and still sleepy from a previous obstetrical case that night, the whole situation seemed to be unreal and dream-like," Dr. Dafeo said in telling of the births. The attendants told me afterward that my eyes were bulging and with the arrival of each baby, my only word was 'gosh,' with ascending inflection."

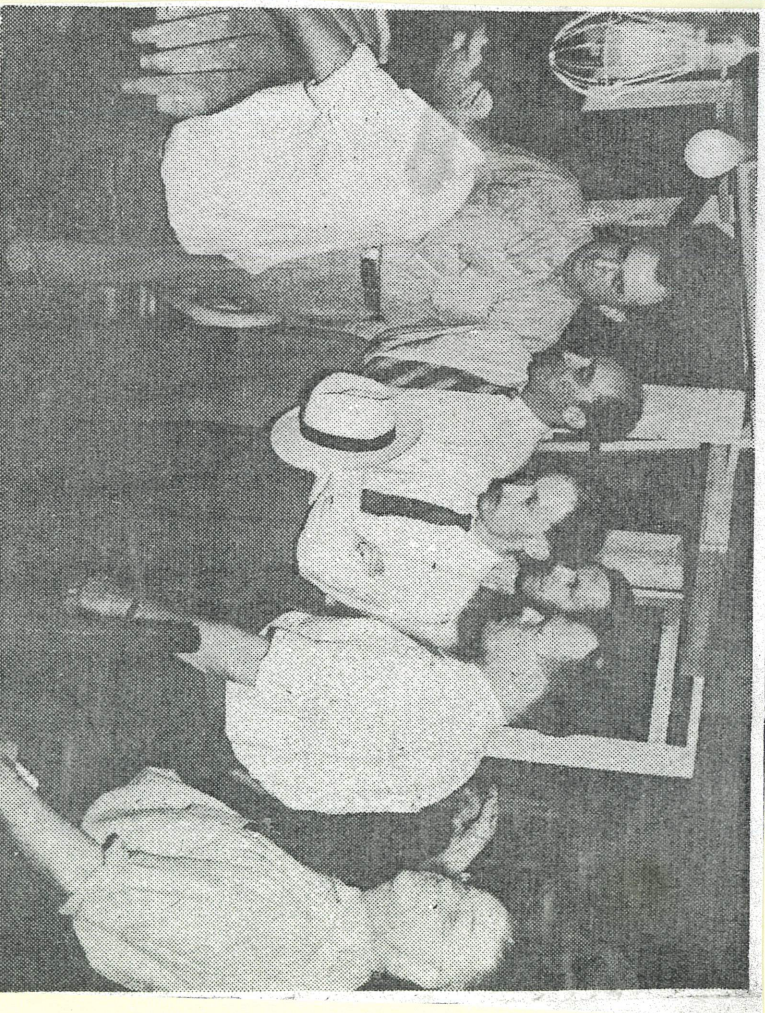

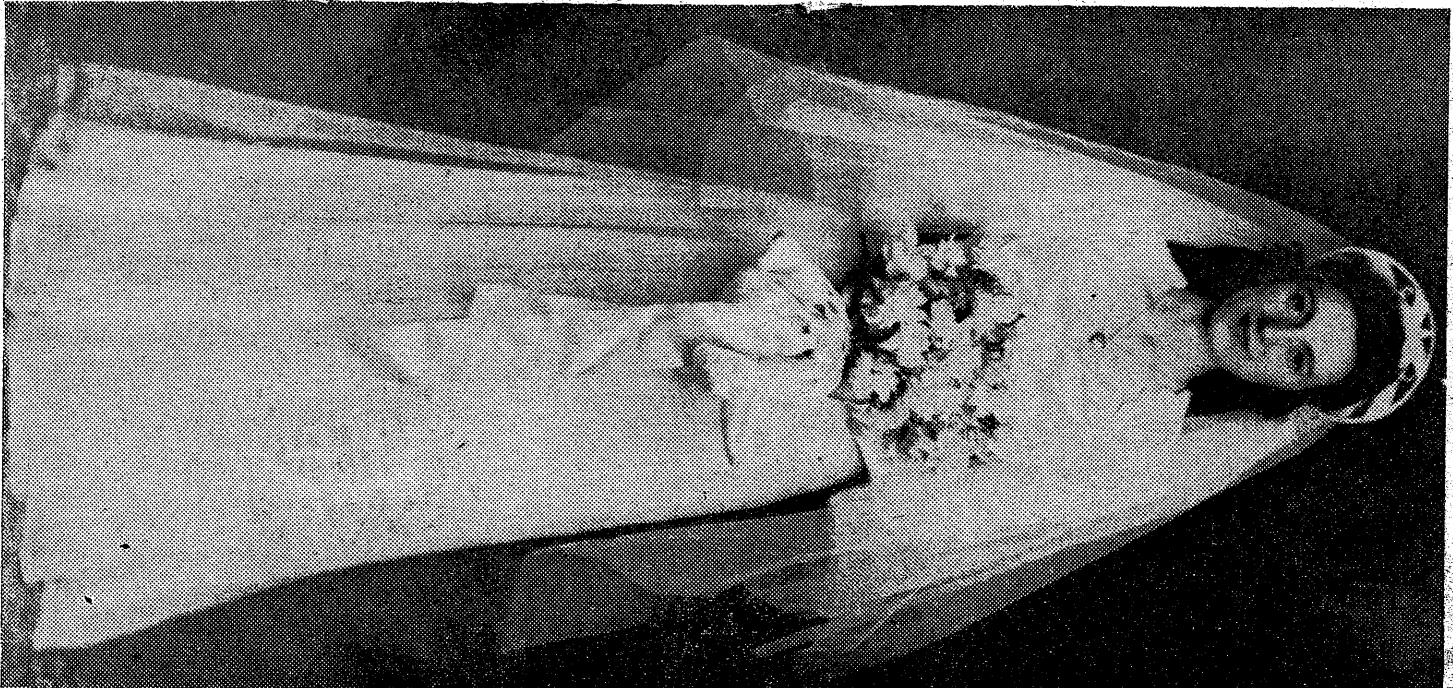
