



American Soldier Much Better Fed Than His Enemies

January 21,

1943

Atlanta, Ga., April 5. — What the Jap soldier uses for emeagency rations is revealed in a report received at Headquarters Fourth Service Command and its comparison with the American soldier's famous Type K ration draws a sharp contrast.

The Jap ration, returned from the southwest Pacific on an American transport and analyzed at a Quartermaster depoted at a Quartermaster depoted at a Quartermaster depoted in a consisted of: two bottles of lactic acid health drink, a small container of wheat germ vitamin pills, and the main dish, a No. 2 1-2 sized can containing two layers of rice and bean curd mixture.

Each layer of the main dish, it was reported, was in four portions, and was made of cooked partially polished rice with small pieces of a vegetable, like a carrot. It was seasoned with a soy sauce. Each portion of rasing or rubbery, tough batter probably made of bean curd. The can weighed 586 grams and each section of the rice food weighed 73 grams.

The health drink was described as "a thick, sticky strupy, opaque liquid of a pinkish light beige color and with a strong acid odor, resembling a mixture of pineapple and almond." Small particles sticking to the sediment found in canned pineapple.

The vitamin tablets came in a bottle of 300 and instructions, in English as to the dose, recommended from four to eight tablets three times a day.

Dr. Charles Shober Grayson, 77, for many years a practicing physician of this city, died at High Point Memorial Hospital at 50 clock Sunday afternoon. He suffered a heart attack at his office Saturday morning, and after consulting a local physician, he was removed to the hospital, where his death occurred 28 hours later.

Dr. Grayson, was a native of McDovell County. He was born July 14, 1875; received his preparatory education in the public schools; served for several years as railway mail clerk; graduated from the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, where he took premed work; received his M. D. degree from George Washington University School of Medicine, Washington, D. C., and interned at Washington City Hospital for a year. He engaged in post-graduate studies at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, and at Harvard.

He came to High Point in 1907 and not long after his arrival became an associate of the lafe Dr. D. A. Stanton in the practice of medicine. The two had their offices above Ring Drug Store, the present Ring - Harris store, on North Main Street. There the association continued until Dr. Stanton, established a clinic on East Green Street, approximately 10 years ago. Dr. Grayson remained at the Main Street location until his final illness. He was at one time a member of the City Council and served as mayor of High Point for four terms, from May 1931 until May 1939.

Dr. Grayson was married to Miss Bertie Crawford of McDowell County June 25, 1908, they lived at 1009 North Main Street until the doctor's death.


