

SON IS INJURED


Henry C. Royals, 56, well known lawyer, rural mail carrier and civic leader of Trinity, was killed instantly in a head-on automobile collision about 12:40 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. His small son, Don, age eight years, riding with him, suffered a probable brain concussion and is in a High Point hornital

The accident occurred about a half mile south of Trinity on a dirt road that leaves the high-way at the Trinity school house. Mr. Royals, who was making his route, apparently had just placed some mail in a rural mall box and had started his car foward another box, when a Ford pick-up truck came over the brow of the hill and the car and truck struck head-on. The Royals car was turned around and over falling on Mr. Royals head and crushing it. Clinton Clinard, 15-year-old trinity youth, driving the pick-up truck, suffered only minor cuts and bruises.



BIG TRUYK LOAD LIQUUA IS KOUND IN TRINITY AREA

Nearly 5,000 Pints Of Bottled In Bond Seized, But Nobody Claims It

TRUCK WAS PARKED

The fact that a truck needed repairs may account for 208 cases containing 4,992 pints of the bottled and bond fluid being locked in the vaults of the county sheriff's office in Asheboro Anyway officers found a Ford V-8 truck, license No. 183796 (1942) parked in a yard somewhere in the Trinity area Tuesday afternoon late, investigated and found a veritable flood of the forbidden fluid — and no owner

Constable C. W. Watson and Patrolman Barr made the find and called the sheriff's department in Asheboro. Sheriff Bingham and called themselves away and returned, driving one of the richest loads of liquor ever found in Randolph county.

There was no one with the truck at the time, though residents in the vicinity, had noticed a driver with it some hous previously, and nobody has shown up at the sheriff's office in Asheboro to claim either the truck or its costly cargo. At present wholesale prices of liquor, the school fund is in a fair way to profit to the extent of more than \$10,000 therefrom. When officers find out whose truck it is, there'll be some explaining to do on that score, It was an "cryphaned" cargo however, when the officers got it, and still is as far as any claim of ownership is concerned.

Earlier in the week officers got some of the "smaller fry." Roby Hinshaw was arrested Sunday afternoon at his home in New Market township. Officers didn't find much liquor at the place, but they found plenty of glass fruit jars that had a few drops left in them, and they found what they identified as liquor having been poured out hurriedly. They watched through the window and saw the performance but when they got inside the forbidden fluid had been emptied. Hinshaw was given a hearing and bound over to court under \$500 bond. Hearing was before E. H. Morris, magistrate, Monday night.

The same day, Sunday, officers found three pints of liquor hidden under the floor in one room of John Beach's service station in the New Market community. An empty liquor case was found in the back yard. Beach was tried Sunday afternoon late and bound over to Superior Court under \$500 bond.







L. C. MILLIKAN DIES AT AGE 8

J. Elwood Cox, 75.

Prominent Barker, Of
N High Point, Is Dead

Leading Banker And Business Man, Former Highway Com-

ber of the state highway commission, financier and civic leader, died early Tuesday morning at his home in High Point from bronchial pneumonia. Born in Northhampton county Nov., ember 1, 1856, in moderate circumstances, it was the experience of financial and social success during his long and active lifetime, and to see the great structure which he had built crumble about him.

Beginning life as a young man, following his education at New Garden boarding school, now Guilford College, near which his partitis moved to make their thome, he worked at various fous intil he saved a competence to govinto the shuttle-block business. He married Miss Bertha Emily Snow, of Guilford Gollege, in 1878, and soay thereafter moved from Guilford-College to High Point, then a town of only 700 people. He was steadily successful in business, and in 1891 organized the Commercial National Bank, an institution which when it failed last January, was one of the largest banks in the state.

Aside from his business prominence, and he was identified with almost the entire business life of High Point and a director of the Duke Endowment, Mr. Cox was prominent in Republican party circles in the state, having run for governor in 1908. 


