Jacket Catches In Belt And He Is Thrown To Ground. Death Resulting

Henry Briles, age 65, of Trinity, route 1, was killed almost instantly Friday afternoon around 4:30 o'clock in a wood saw accident. He reportedly was trying to put the belt back on the pulley of a saw he was using in his yard when his jacket caught on the belt and he was jerked up by the pulley and knocked down. His home is located about a mile from Tabernacle church. A son of the late Harris and Rebecca Briles, of Trinity, Mr. Briles was a farmer until his sudden death.

Pfc. Virgil F. Hill, husband of Mrs. Eloise Venable Hill, Trinity, route 2, was killed in action December 17, according to a message received by his family. He entered service August 20, 1943 and had been overseas since February, 1944. He was with the First Army and among the first to enter Paris and Germany. While in France in June of 1944, he received a Presidential citation for capturing a number of German prisoners and on October 25 he was wounded in Belgium. Pfc. Hill was employed by Myrtle Deal Co. of High Point, before entering the army and attending Trinity high school. He is the son of Mrs. and the late Mr. Frank Hill, of Trinity. Surviving besides his mother, and wife, are four sisters, Mrs. Ruth Miller, Miss Bessie Hill, Mrs. Eva Hill, and Mrs. Virgil Hill. Stephens, who is his twin sister.

Wright W. Jones Held For Brutal Slaying Of His Wife

Wright W. Jones, 58, remained under guard in Memorial hospital this morning suffering from self-inflicted razor wounds after police had charged him with the brutal harlot murder of his 55-year-old wife in the kitchen of her home at 507 North Hamilton street early last night.

In a sworn statement to police last night Jones admitted he killed his wife with a hatchet and a knife and then attempted to take his own life by slashing his throat and legs with razor blades.

The evidently couples son and daughter, Wendell and Celeste, body mutilated after 6 o'clock last evening and found their mother's mutilated body lying in a small hall leading to a bathroom and their father, bleeding profusely.

Authorities at Memorial hospital said at noon that the condition of Mr. Jones, who admitted slaying his wife with a hatchet and a butcher knife, was satisfactory and that barring unforeseen complications he would survive. A police guard remained at the hospital this afternoon.

Guilford County Coroner Dr. W. W. Harvey said following an investigation this morning of the brutal slaying of Mrs. Wright W. Jones that it appeared to be a "clear case of murder" and that a formal inquest would not be necessary.

In signing the death certificate Dr. Harvey listed "murder" as the cause. He said Mrs. Jones apparently died from two deep knife wounds in the chest just above the heart.

Authorities at Memorial hospital said at noon that the condition of Mr. Jones, who admitted slaying his wife with a hatchet and a butcher knife, was satisfactory and that barring unforeseen complications he would survive. A police guard remained at the hospital this afternoon.

but conscious, lying on the floor in a back bedroom.

The house was in a state of disorder, indicating some sort of struggle had taken place, and there were blood stains throughout the house.

Following discovery of the bodies last night, Mr. Jones was rushed to Memorial hospital where Dr. P. B. Davis said he had suffered 1 1/2 deep gashes below each ear and several minor cuts about the legs. Dr. Davis said there were several perforations on Mr. Jones' right arm which indicated that he had been innoculated, possibly with some form of dope. The doctor said one of the perforations looked as if it had been made in the past day or two.

Captain Johnson said a suicide note had been left on the mantel in the living room of the home in which Mr. Jones had signed but the contents of the note were not made public pending official investigation by the coroner.

In the statement which Mr. Jones signed while still under guard first aid treatment at the hospital last night, he admitted he killed his wife and had tried to end his own. "She would speak to me . . . she was in the kitchen when I hit her with the hatchet. . . . I had asked her to call a doctor for me and she refused. . . . she treated me awful. I told officers and later signed a statement to this effect.

Murder Warrant
 After attendants had removed Mrs. Jones' body from the home at 8 o'clock last night, officers issued a murder warrant for Mr. Jones and served it on him at the hospital. A police guard remained at the hospital throughout the night.

Mrs. Jones is survived by her husband, two daughters, Mrs. William Brown and Miss Celeste Jones, both of High Point, one son, Wendell of High Point, and two brothers, J. L. Millikan of High Point and Roger Millikan of Durham.

Funeral services for Mrs. Jones will be held Friday afternoon at Central Friends church, Rev. Cecil Hawthorth, the pastor, will be in charge. Burial will follow in Springfield cemetery. The body will remain at the Sechrist funeral home until the hour of the funeral. Mrs. Jones was a native of Randolph county and a member of Central Friends church. She was the former Leola Ruth Millikan, daughter of Jesse H. and Margaret Rogers Millikan.

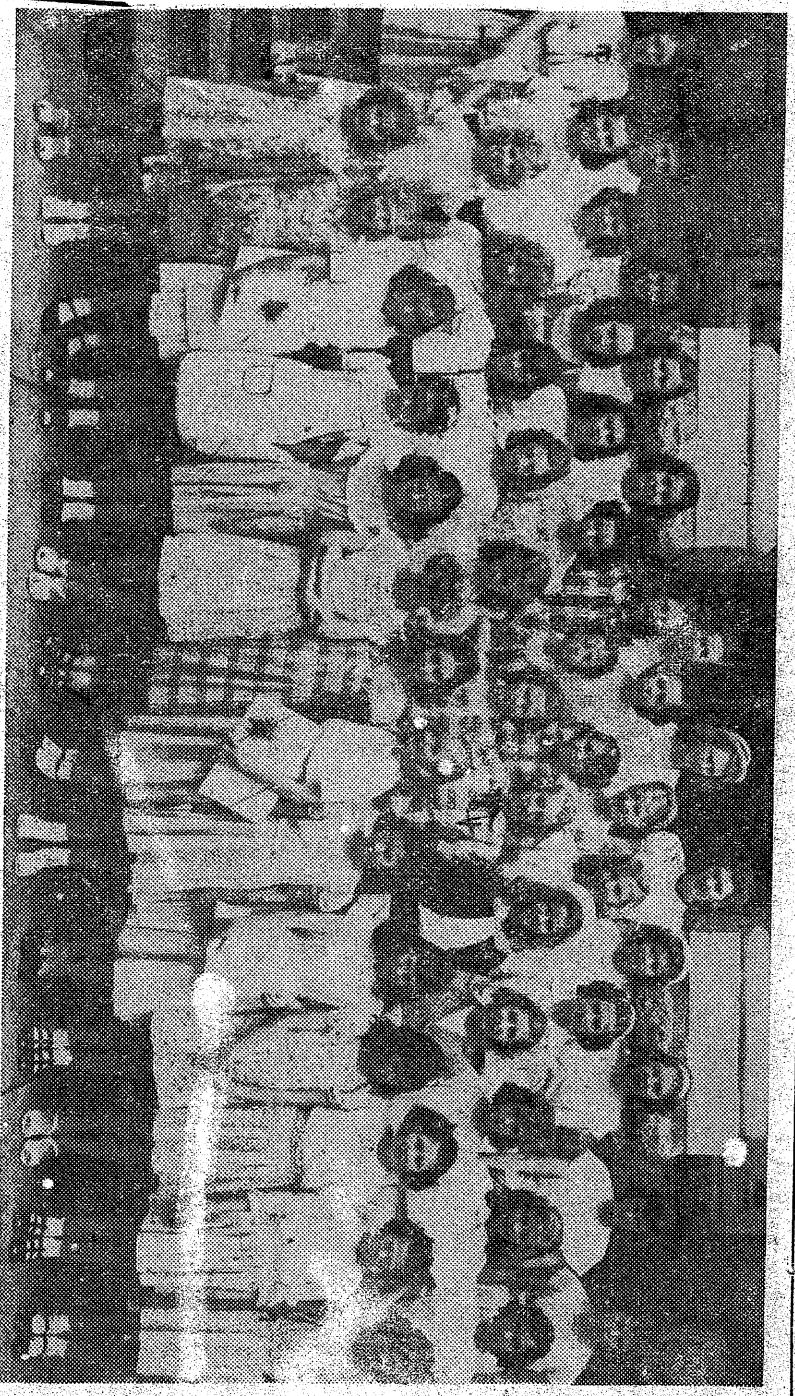

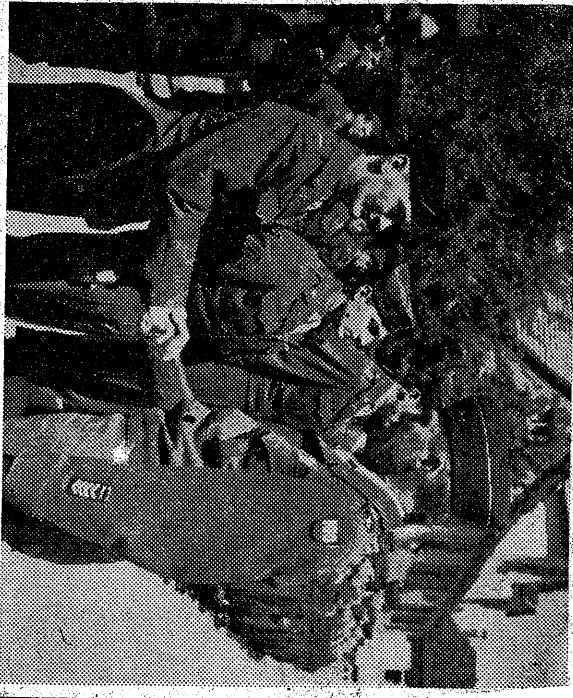

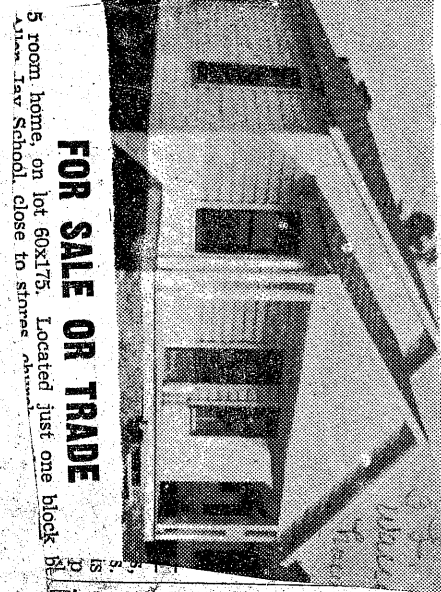

The officer said a ration book and driver's license found in the death car identified the driver as Percy R. McCleeny. He added that the ration book was issued with an Edenton address while a woman's name badge indicated that McCleeny was employed in defense work in Suffolk, Va.

The patrolman quoted the driver of the truck as saying his truck broke down approximately 10 miles south of Oxford on highway No. 15.

Williams told the investigating

officer that he had put out flares when in the truck cab when the passenger car crashed into the rear of the trailer. The accident occurred about 3 a. m. today.

As efforts were made today to establish the identity of the crash victims, Byrd related the surviving child's story, which indicated that the group had left Suffolk early Tuesday for High Point to attend the funeral of the dead woman's brother.

Directors of local funeral homes are attempting to aid officials in identifying the woman. The child able to talk is only five years old and furnished officials with the information they were coming to High Point to attend "Uncle Archie's funeral." 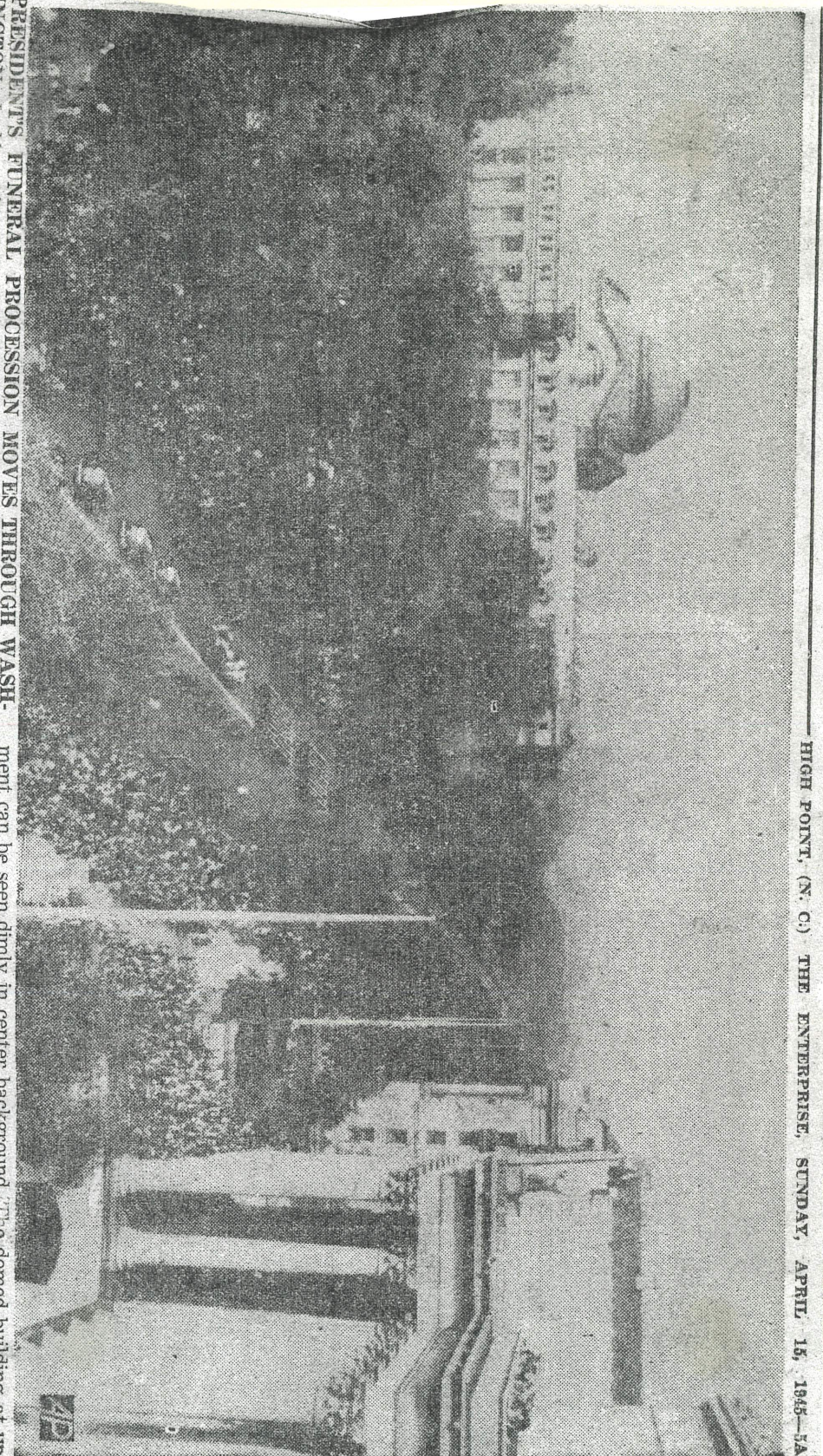

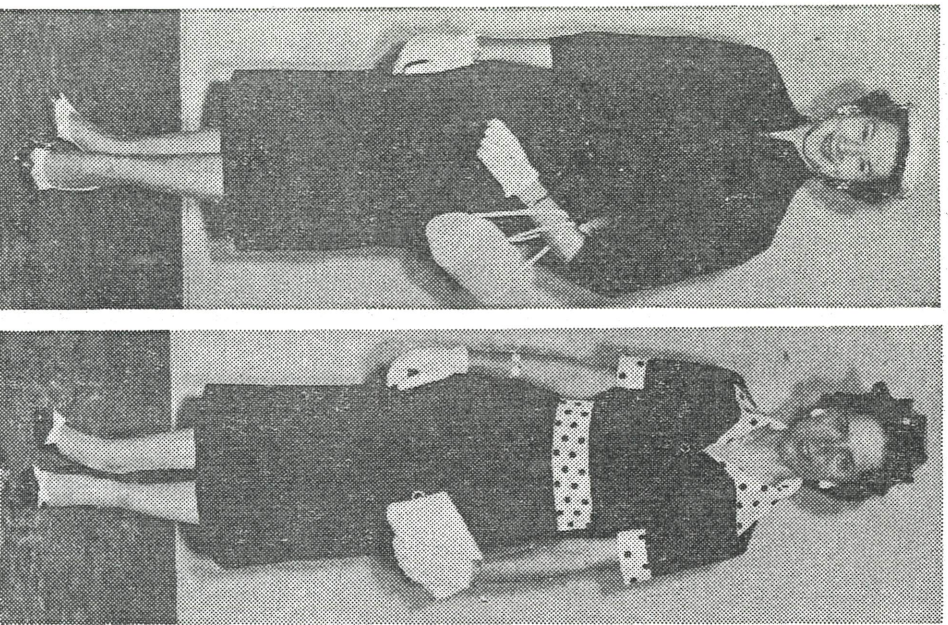
One brother, George W. Shoof, and one sister, Mrs. D. B. Craven of Thomasville, Rt. 1, and two grandsons also survive.

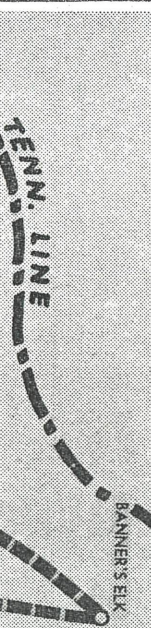

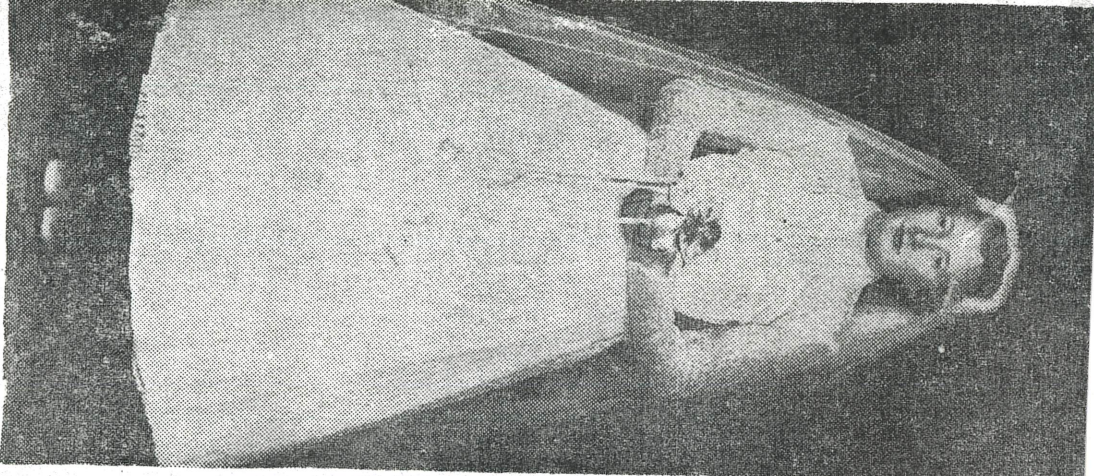

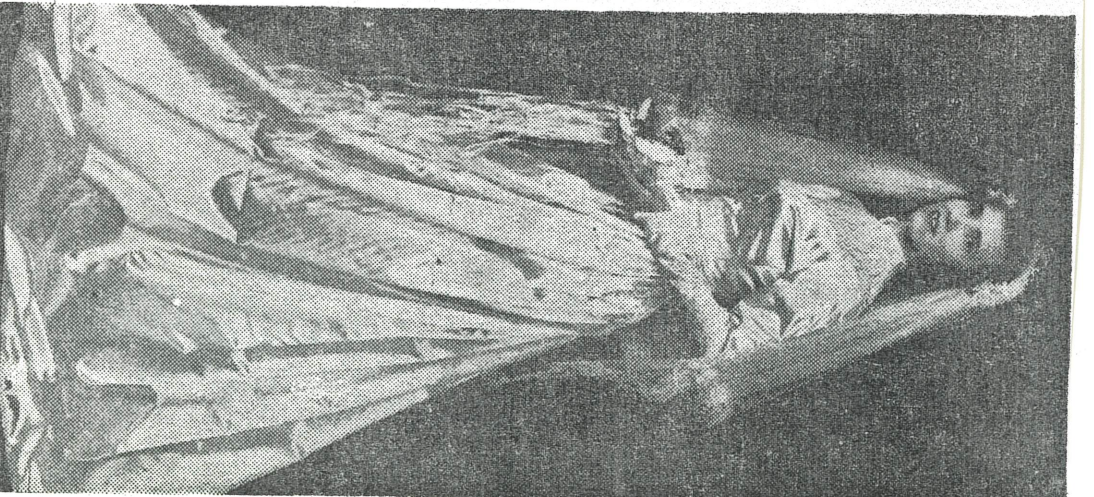

ABOARD SANTA'S HELICOPTER, Dec. 15—Santa Claus bucked a 60-knot snowstorm and a blinding helicopter crack-up to bring Christmas presents to 560 Western North Carolina orphans today, as the Ninth Air Force began its third Operation Christmas.

Snow and the accident—in which one man suffered a back injury—combined to thwart Santa's plans to drop in on the dozen children who live at Lost Cove. A tiny, isolated settlement on Toe River, Lost Cove is hemmed in by 4,000-foot peaks. It has no roads, no stores and no post office.

It may be reached by driving up a mountain road, parking one's car and hiking four miles through a river gorge. Then one climbs a steep hillside to see Lost Cove's 35 inhabitants.

To cover the story of Santa's three years ago, was aided visit to this cove, the Greensboro year by North Carolina Daily News sent this writer along with helicopter with Santa. Photographer Cletis Peacock drove his car as far as possible, then trudged the rest of the way with his camera.

Peacock was to take pictures of the landing there and give the photographic plates to the writer to bring back to Greensboro. The plates were to be flown back to Charlotte by helicopter and on to Greensboro in an Air Force C-45 piloted by Maj. John P. Cordova, Ninth Air Force public information officer.

Air Force officers said tonight that the trip to Lost Cove will be made, probably Wednesday, or Thursday, after repairs to the damaged helicopter.

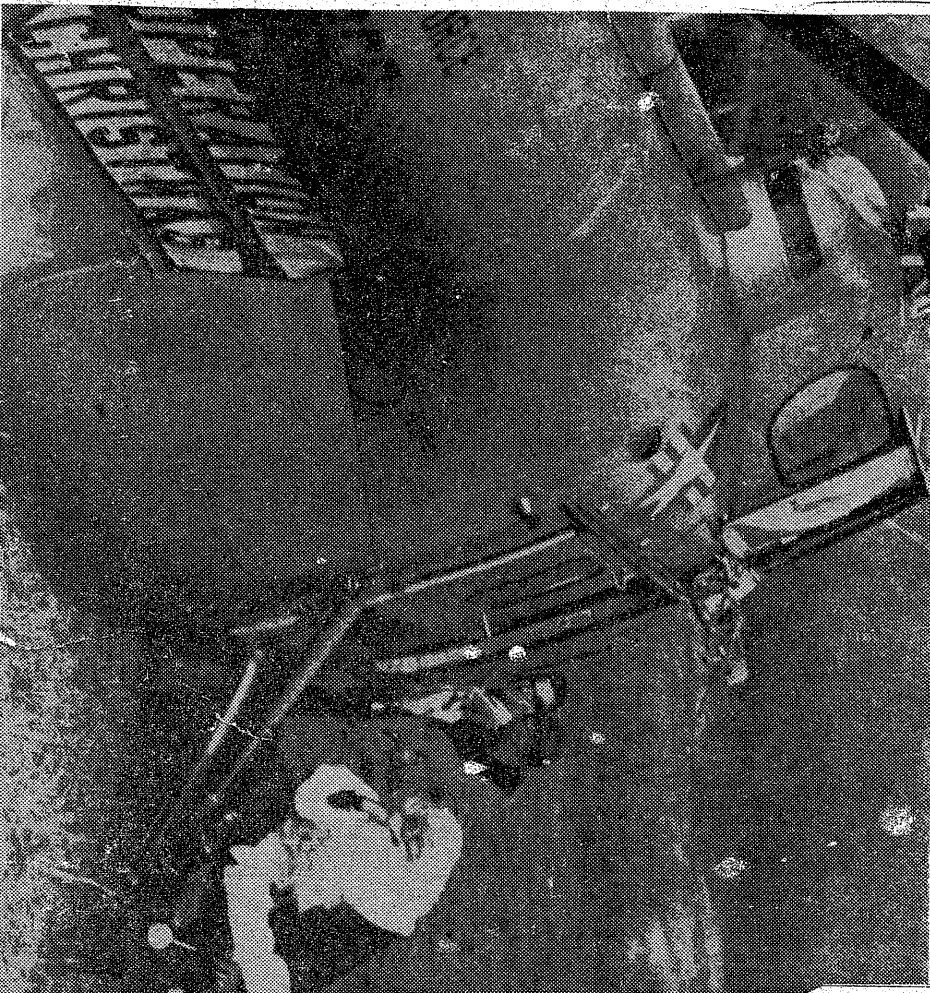

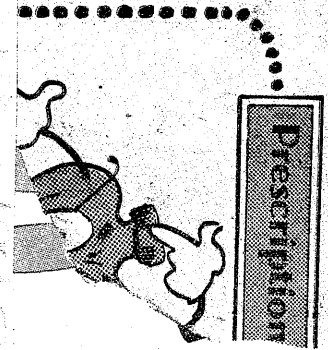

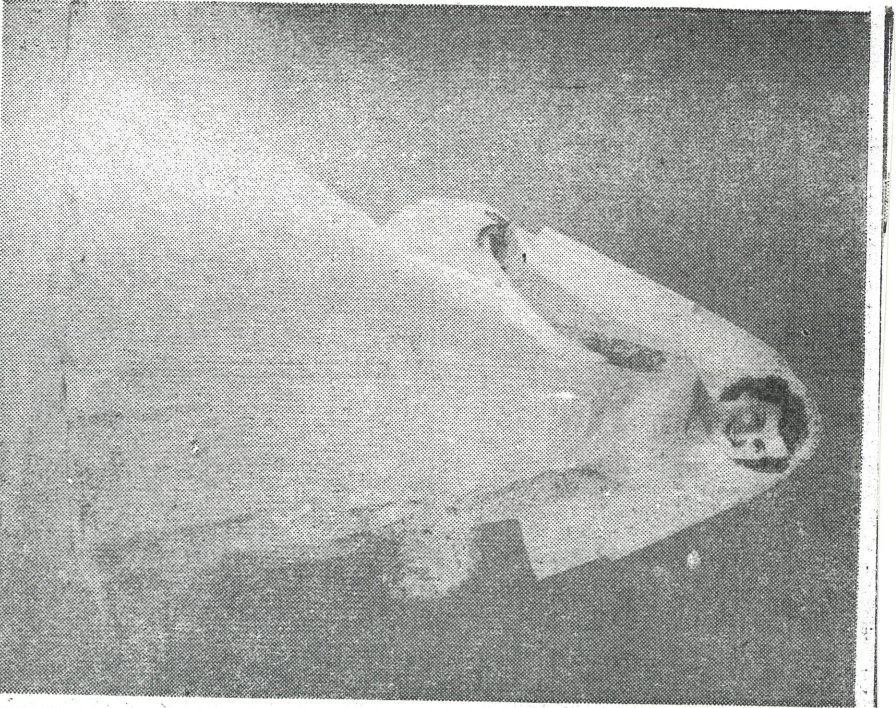

Youth Loses His Life By Drowning

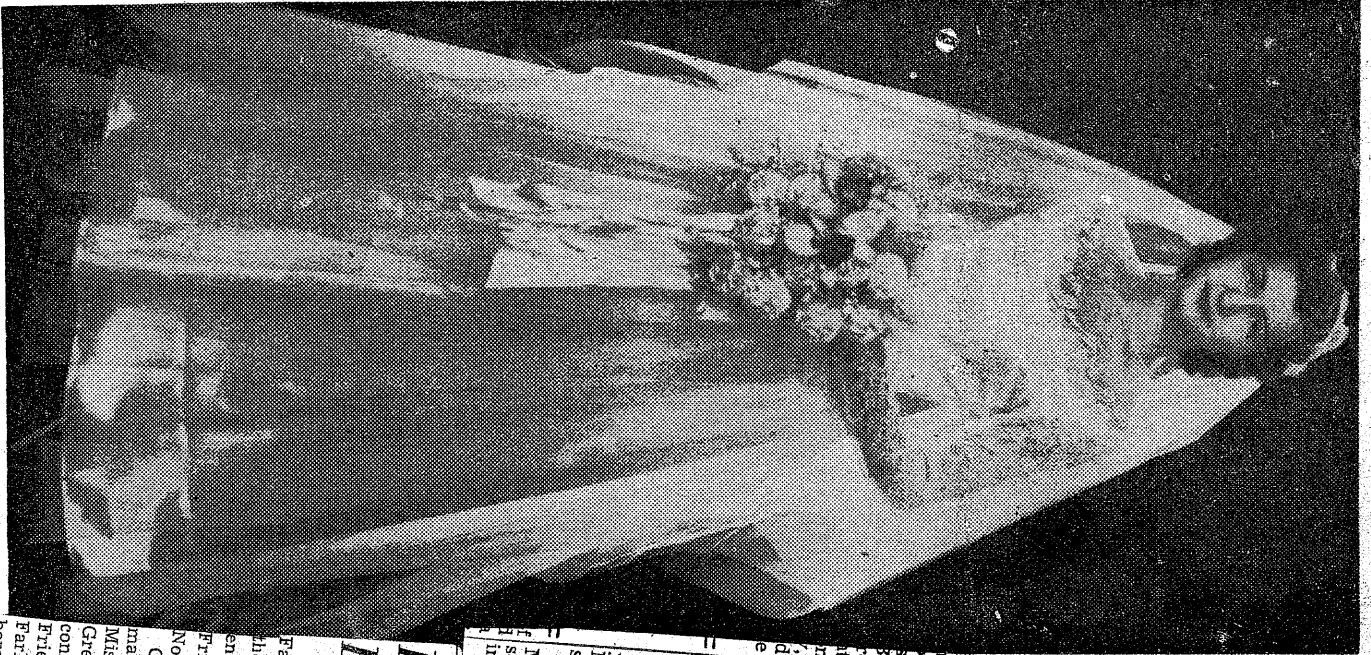

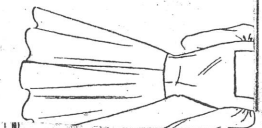
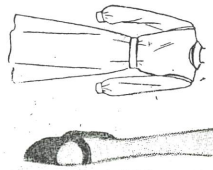

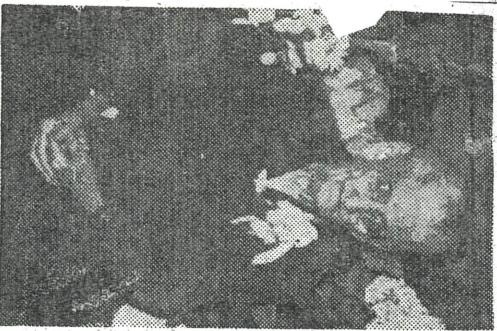

FARMING ONCE A RUGGED LIFE

Farming in the by-gone years was a rugged life. The farmer had none of the modern machinery and equipment with which to lighten his work. His plowing was done with a single stock plow. His planting and sowing was done by hand. He dropped his corn by hand one grain at a time. He sowed his wheat, barley, rye and oats hand full at a time. He picked his corn by hand. He shucked and shelled it by hand. He harvested his small grain handfull at a time. He flailed it out under the feet of horses or oxen. The first threshing machine the ground-hog left the wheat and chaff mixed together. He cut his hay with a scythe and raked it with a hand rake which had wooden teeth. By his slow methods of planting and cultivating his crops could not be large.

The farmer often started long before morning light and worked long after sundown. He did not have the modern clothing to protect him from the wind, the weather and the elements. He did not have a large variety of foods. His transportation was by wagon, buggy, sled or horse-back. He had been trained for this kind of life from babyhood. A real farmer could make an axe handle from a piece of hickory wood and put it in with a dull pocket knife. He could keep his harness together with withs, bark, sacks and raw hide strings for he did not have bal- and smith work.

It has been said that a farmer was a man who started out with nothing. Lost on everything he grew and came out even at the end of the year. It was never found out how he did it for he did not know himself. The modern agriculture teacher would stave to death trying it. Without commercial fertilizer, modern machinery or government loans, aids or hand outs he did it. It was a rugged life but the farmer in the past loved it.

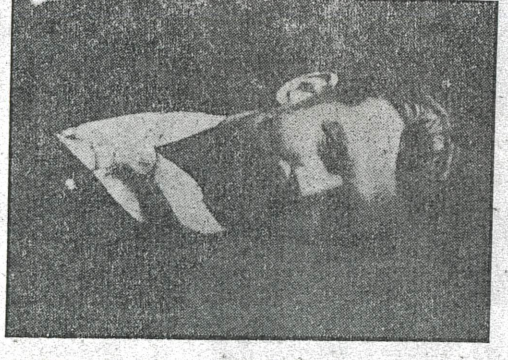

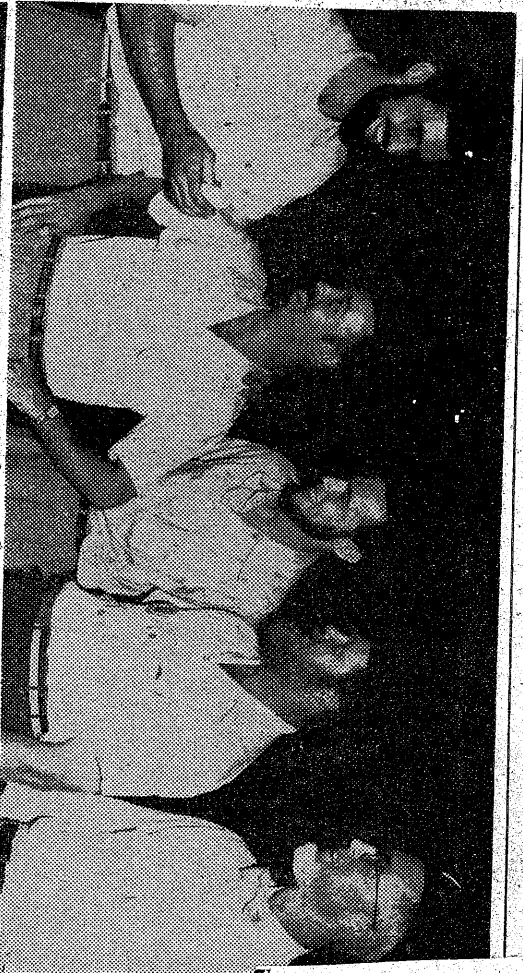

Fiery Object Sighted Here

GREENSBORO (P)—Explosion of a huge meteorite north-northeast of Greensboro-High Point airport was reported today by J. F. Molen, meteorologist of the United States Weather Bureau there.

Later Molen said he had heard an unconfirmed report that the explosion was a jet plane exploding at high altitude, but he dismissed this theory.

Molen said the explosion occurred at 11:33 a. m. He estimated the height of the falling body at 40,000 to 80,000 feet and the distance away from the airport at 100 miles or more.

Reports reached The Enterprise early this afternoon that a flaming object, thought to be either a meteor or a burning jet plane, was sighted zooming across the skies over High Point in the general direction of Hickory.

The object was sighted by a High Point resident at about 11:30. A short time later it was seen in the vicinity of the Thomville By-pass and Highway 109 by State Highway Patrolman C. R. Kirkman.

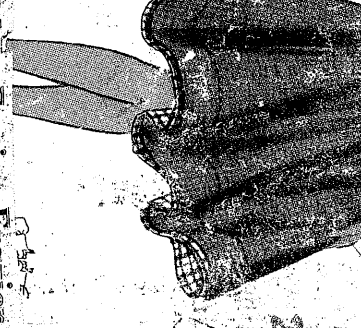
When last seen the object was traveling southwestward in the vicinity of Gold Hill and Conestoga.

Mail Carrier To Retire After 35 Years On Job

RAMSEUR, July 6.—D. Edgar Highhill has worn out 18 cars, three buggies, and one mail wagon since 1917.

In November, he must take the steelines himself.

Although the 69-year-old rural mail carrier is ready to retire, one thing bothers him. "I hate to leave my people," Highhill says.

During his 35 years of service to the district southeast and south of Ramsaur, a deep affection has grown between Highhill and "my people."

Some of the folk on his route have offered to petition the postal authorities to permit him to work past November and his 70th birthday. But he has tried to dissuade them.

"It's time for a man to quit when he becomes 70," Highhill remarks as he loads the mail into his car for one of the few runs left to him. The 55 miles of Randolph County roads are full of memories and friends.

Haltting his car at the approach to the covered bridge across Mill Creek, he tells of the time he saw water standing three feet deep above the flooring. Then to the miller of the nearby water-powered grinding mill, he asks, "What year was that, Raymond?"

"1945," Raymond Cox refreshes the mailman's memory. Then concerning Highhill, he says, "I sure hate to see him go. He's a good mail carrier."

Express Sentiments
Those same sentiments are expressed in different ways and methods by other people as Highhill stops at the mailboxes of what he terms "one of the best farming sections we have."

Little Brenda Sue Gatliff who meets Highhill every morning will hate to see him go. So will 99-year-old Anderson Barker and C. L. Beane, a storekeeper on the route. Beane's daughter, in particular, will miss the mailman. "She used to write a note to Santa Claus every year," Highhill explains as he waves to her. "I would take them and leave her a little something in the mailbox. Had her fooled like that for years."

And there is Mollie, the blind dog who carries mail from Highhill's hand to her master's house.

As he drives along his route, half of which is paved now, Highhill tells of his 35 years work.

He made his first mail run on April 2, 1917. He had to buy his own horses and buggy for the route which was 27 miles long then. "I used to take one horse one day and the other the next," he recalls.

Those are the days which he remembers the best, perhaps because they were the hardest.

"Take the roads. They were axle-

deep in mud during the winter months," Highhill means buggy-axe-deep, too. And where there are bridges today, fords used to flood so that he had to detour for miles.

And the winters. "I had a long mule-skin coat lined with sheepskin which reached to my knees. And I had a fur cap. I'd put them on and place a hot brick between my feet when I set out. There have been times when I would come back from my route with a solid sheet of ice on the upper part of my body."

Despite his arduous work the veteran mail carrier has had good health. His accumulated sick leave—at 10 days a year—would amount to 143 days if he could collect it.

From his horse and buggy days, through the Model-T era, until today, Highhill has been more than a mailman to "his people." If a family wants to tell someone down the road of an illness, they know who will carry the message.

Often he takes prescriptions Ramsaur to be filled and then brings the medicine out the next day. But the best medicine is his smile and hearty greeting. "His there, doodlebug," he calls to passengers.

"Hey, Grasshopper" is the reply of Highhill's meriment.

"That's the part of my work that I enjoy best, seeing those little kids come out to get the mail," he laughs. An alert, cheerful man, Highhill doesn't look anywhere near 69 years old.

The son of a Methodist preacher, he was born near Liberty on November 21, 1882. After attending the Liberty Normal College, he taught school for 10 years. He was principal of the old Coleridge Graded School for six years.

Then came the offer of a rural mail route at a salary of \$100 a month—no expenses paid.

Members of 350 families are mighty glad that he took the job.

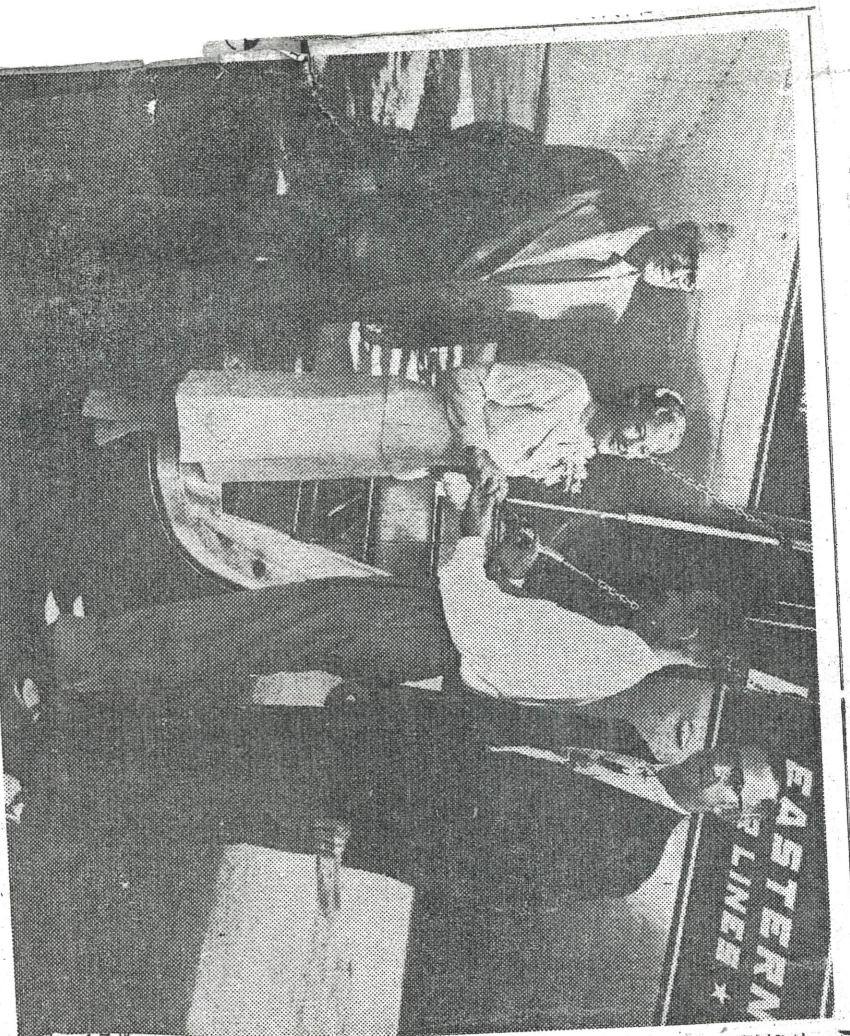

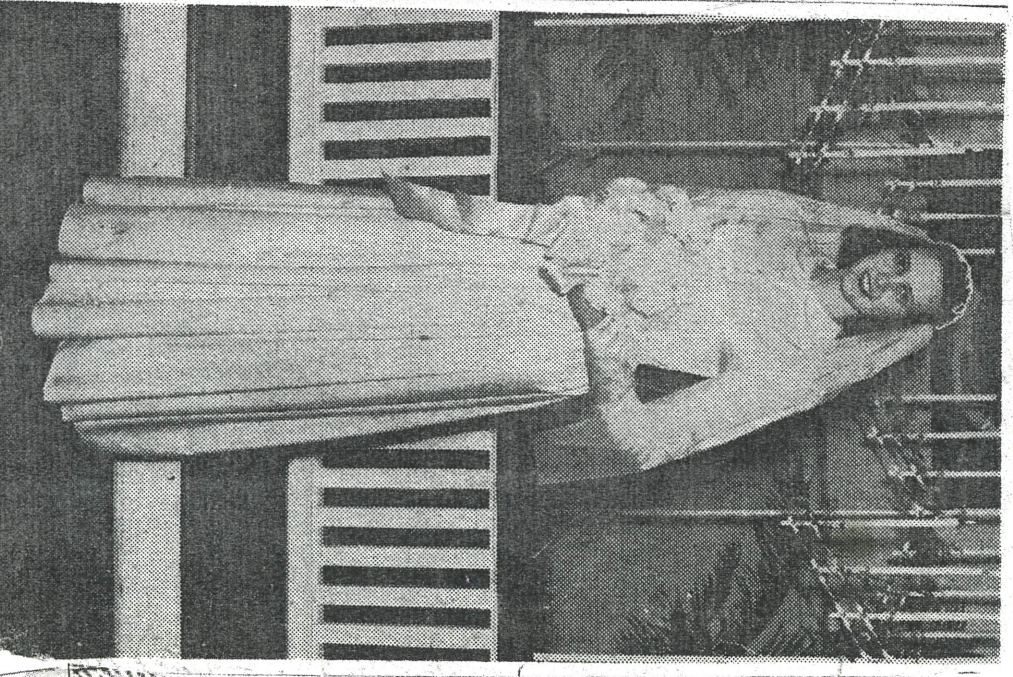

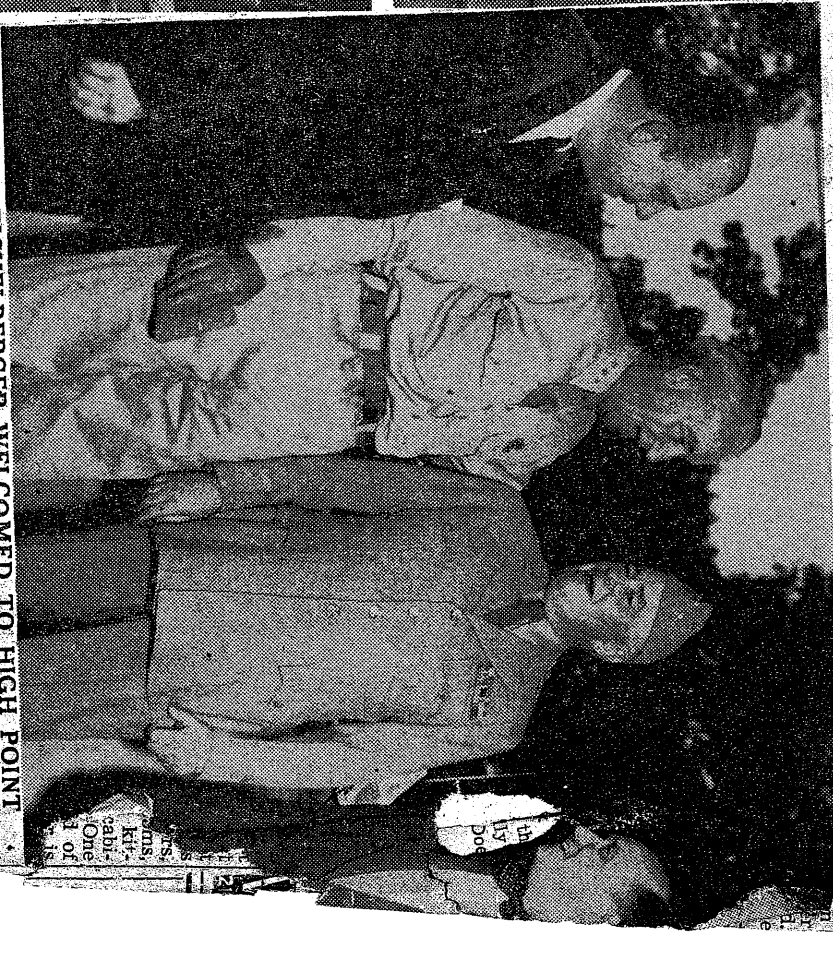

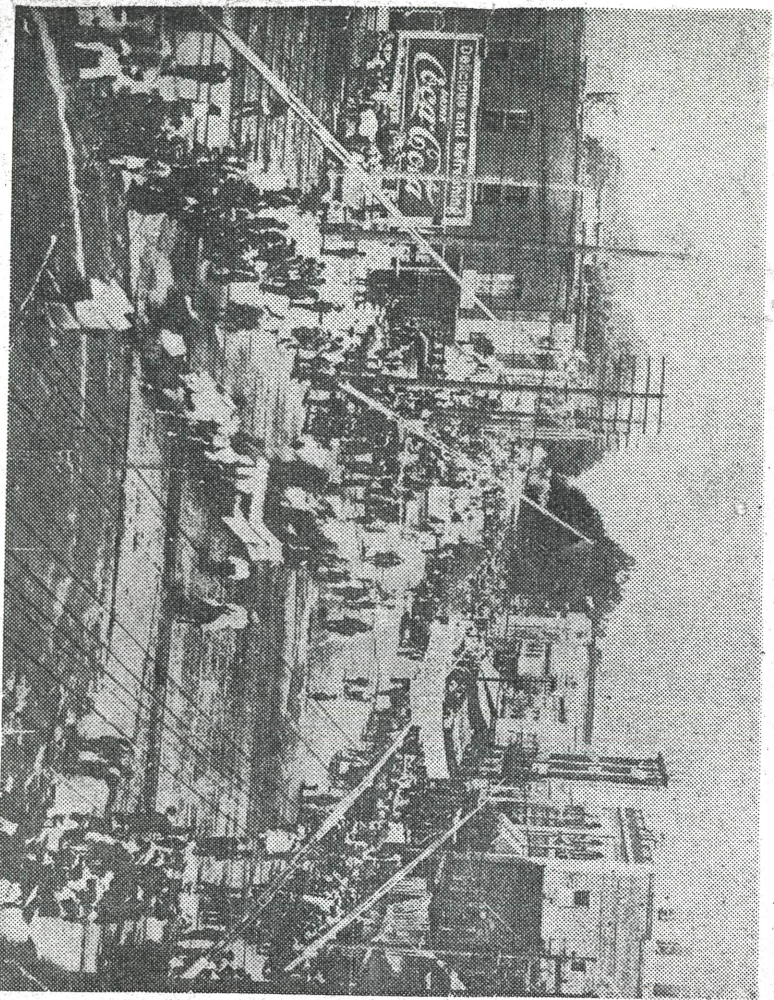
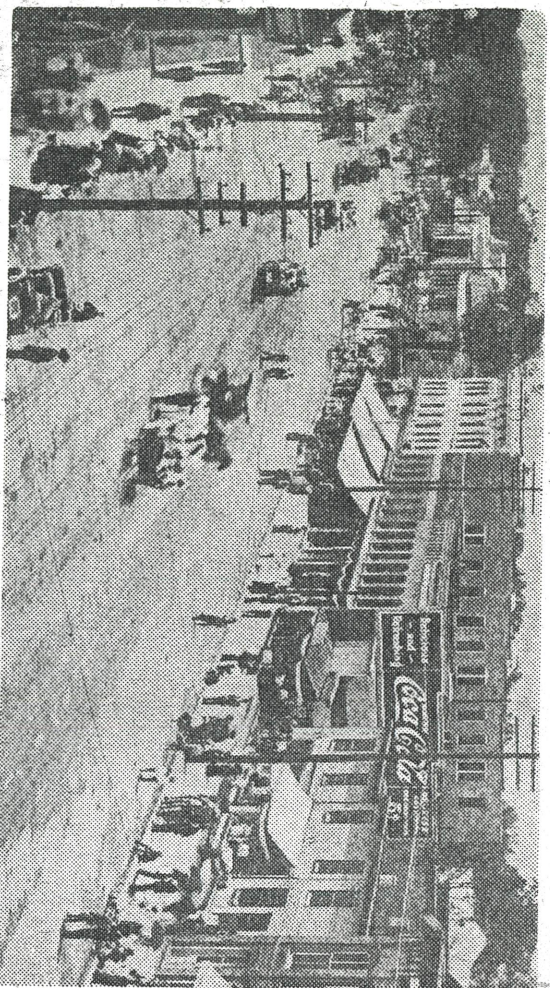
CHARLES W. BRILES

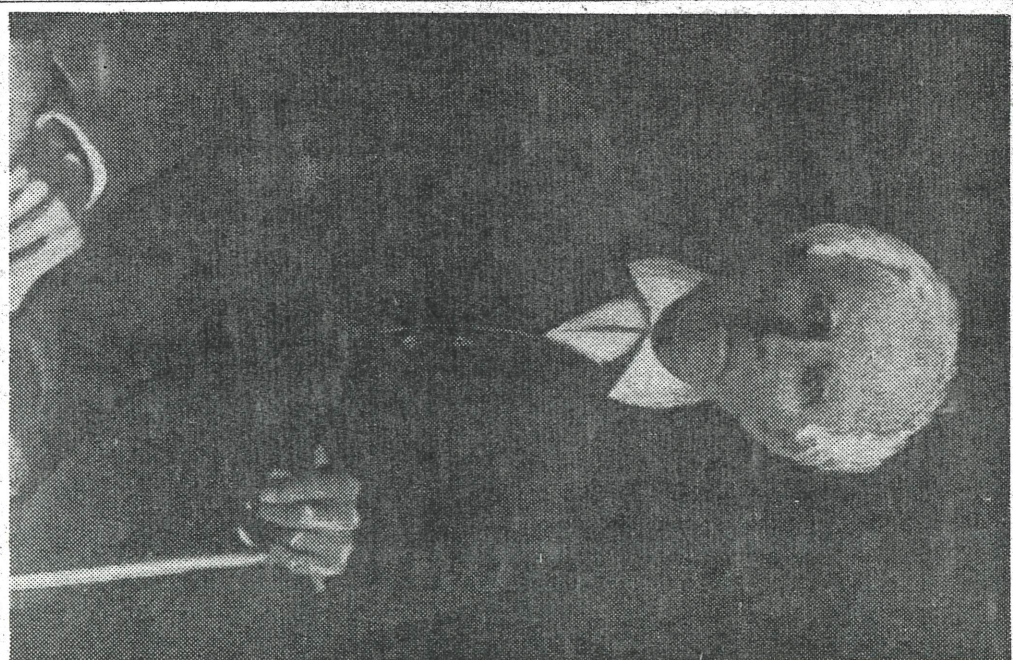

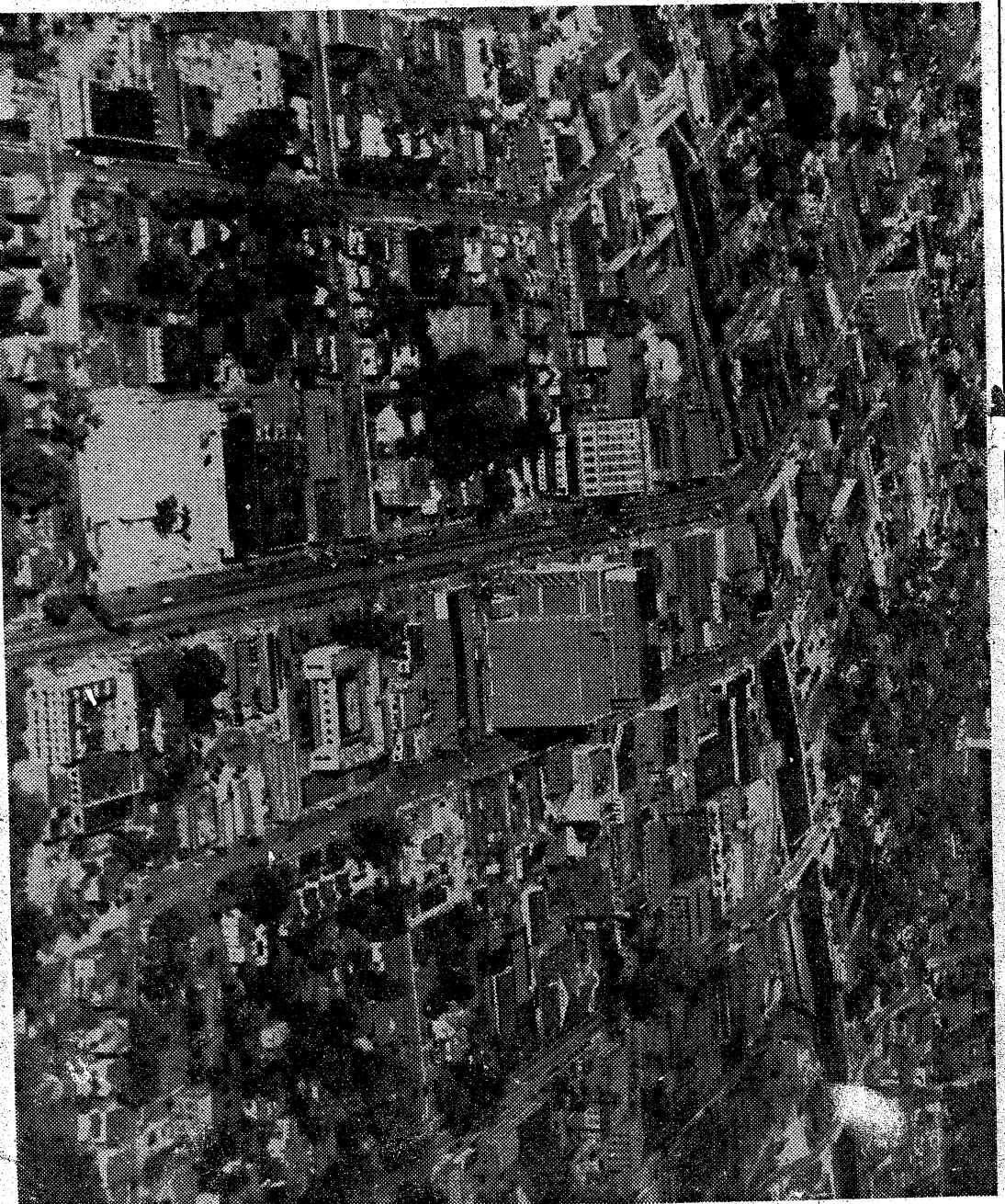

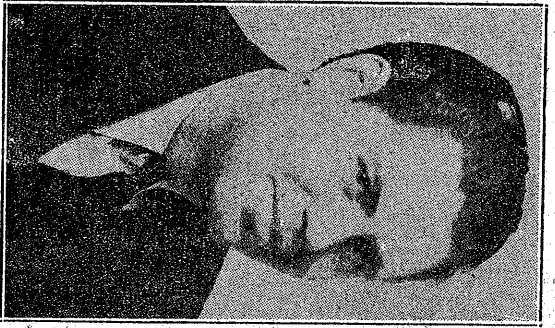
