GERMANY HAS SIGNED THE ALLIES TERMS SURRENDER.

THE END CAME AT 6 A. M., MONDAY, NOVEMBER, 11, 1918.





Big Rattlesnake Killed On Canoy Farm Near Sophia

Another big rattlesnake is reported to have been killed recently in Randolph. T. S. Canoy killed the snake on the farm of his father, D. W. Canoy, on Mt. Fork stream near Sophia where he has been working this summer.

The rattlesnake measured 55 inches long and three inches thick, and had 13 rattles. It was the largest rattlesnake killed on the Canoy farm since several years ago when Mr. Canoy's uncle killed a rattle-snake with 29 rattles.

The young man was counting young pigs when his attention was attracted by a chicken's excited cackling to his right. Glancing in that direction, he thought he saw a log, but on closer examination observed it was a rattlesnake.

Unarmed and clad only in swimming trunks which he frequently wears about the farm, Canoy was scared, he is frank to admit. He says he was never so scared during the five years he was in service, not even when a whale nearly swamped a raft he was on.

Having nothing better, he picked up a stick that was not seeded in killing the reptile with that.

It was not the first rattle-snake he had seen this summer. About a month ago he killed one found by his dog.




